At the end of each year, we celebrate the contribution, achievements and friendships our Year 12 boys have made during their time at Hutchins. For some, this time marks the end of 14 years at Hutchins. Boys have shared rich experiences together, from the classroom, on stage in music, drama or dance, on the sporting field and as

friends spending time together in and out of the classroom. As the year comes to an end, the Year 12 boys leave the comfort of a routine that they have known for most of their lives, and they move away from a support network and head off on different pathways to forge their own future. This can be daunting. Some may not know what they want to do; others may be nervous or excited about the opportunities and challenges

ahead, while some simply have not thought much about what the future holds. What will remain common is that all Year 12 boys will continue to be part of this special community. They will all be Hutchins Old Boys. One of the highlights of my role as Headmaster is the opportunity to connect with our extended community, not only our current boys, families and staff but also importantly the extensive Old Boy community. This year I have enjoyed meeting Old Boys at reunions in Canberra, Sydney, Melbourne, Hobart, Launceston and the United Kingdom. At each of these reunions, Old Boys share fond memories and speak of the wide range of opportunities that were available to them as students. At the recent London reunion, Director of Advancement, Mr John Groom ('86), and I met some inspiring graduates now at the pinnacle of their respective careers. The diversity of career pathways was striking, from very high-level finance and business roles to designing inspiring internationally award-winning furniture and teaching some of the brightest young minds in the world as senior academics at Oxford and Cambridge Universities.

This diversity of talents and interests highlights the importance of an education that provides breadth of opportunity; opportunities for boys to discover their own God given talent or passion through a high quality and diverse curriculum and extensive co-curricular program. All of the men spoke fondly and with gratitude of the opportunities and friendships they enjoyed during their formative years as students at Hutchins. It is clear a Hutchins education prepares boys for the future.



At the time of writing this article we are currently hosting the International Student Science Conference which has students from three different continents coming together to share ideas, listen to outstanding speakers and visit sites around Hobart – all around the theme of climate change. At the same time as this, we have Dr Adam Grover investigating a possible membership for Hutchins of the 'Round Square Schools' (a group of internationally-minded schools from around the world that share ideas, set up exchanges and examine pedagogy) and Mr Patrick Twyford leading a group of students from St Michael's Collegiate and Hutchins in some community work in Nepal on the World Challenge.

The theme that underpins these three things is that the same strength lies at the core of each project and that is diversity. It is an area that is seen as increasingly important in schools, colleges and workplaces, whether it be in the board room of a leading ASX company or the Kindergarten group in our ELC. Diversity of thought, knowledge base and background are seen increasingly as strengths rather than something to be feared.

A podcast I listened to recently looked at the high number of breakthroughs made by interdisciplinary groups of scientists and sociologists compared to the more traditional siloed methodology often employed in the 20th century.

It is an area that our students are becoming more aware of – more events with St Michael's Collegiate and Fahan School have been very helpful to our boys thinking simply in terms of gender diversity, and the speech that the Head Girl of Fahan School and our School Captain, Oliver Burrows-Cheng, made at International Women's Day earlier this year demonstrated the impact of this. Likewise, the conversations in the boarding house with some of our international students during the political trouble in Hong Kong have been extremely eye-opening for our more local boys. The challenge and opportunity for us moving forward is to continue to provide these opportunities for students to learn and grow, and to value this diversity more and more.

As technology develops, we have to be careful that our relationship with it is not replacing our connection with the real world and, specifically, the outdoors. According to Angela Hansen – an American Occupational Therapist – a child of the 70s/80s spent four to six hours in unstructured play outside every day. For a child now, the western world statistic is just 48 minutes!

For children to be engaged, inquisitive learners they need to learn outside the classroom as well as inside; to use the real world to support learning in authentic ways.

Learning outside

IS fun The outdoors provides a change of pace and increases enthusiasm, interest, engagement and accessibility for a variety of learning styles, particularly for the kinaesthetic learner.

Movement is important

PE, Sport, Get Active and Outdoor Education programs all help the development of gross motor skills, handeye co-ordination and the learning of new skills.

Unstructured time outside supports these things too – play that involves running, rolling, hanging upside down, balancing and climbing on surfaces that are unpredictable and textured.



Creativity

Outdoors, children make up activities and games on the spot with what is around them, encouraging creative thinking; a log can be a pirate ship, a sandpit can turn into sharkinfested waters.

Wellbeing

Studies have shown that playing and working outside has positive effects on wellbeing, resulting in decreased anxiety, stress and negative behaviours. The freedom of playing outdoors with more space helps children to feel happier and calmer. It encourages them to get rid of built-up energy, resulting in more focused students inside.




Social skills

Outdoor spaces are usually less crowded and so less intimidating, helping children to come out of their shells and be more social: they are often more likely to talk to different children and make new friends when they are outside. This encourages children to learn how to interact with other children away from direct adult supervision - they gain independence as they learn to play by themselves, to take turns, to pick themselves up literally and figuratively when they fall, to negotiate to be independent and self-reliant.

Student voice has a significant role in modern schooling. Whether it be a self-reflection in class, presenting work, talking to fellow students at an assembly, reciting a poem, debating or making a podcast, students have a great deal to learn through expressing themselves. Similarly, they have much to give. Young minds are creative, innovative and see things from a unique perspective.





Through providing feedback, suggestions on how to improve school facilities or even surveys on teacher effectiveness, students can engage with and help shape school culture. Interestingly, middle years provide the perfect time for students to have a voice as it can help them to develop a sense of identity and purpose.

One of the current initiatives in our Middle School that has enabled student voice is the development of the Audio Hub. An enthusiastic group of Year 7 boys meet each Tuesday to talk about issues that interest or concern them and produce a regular podcast.

I was involved in an interview discussion with the boys, reflecting upon the recent Character Development Camps. A highlight of producing the podcast was observing the students lead the discussion. Recording their ideas and feedback focused their attention and the conversation flowed naturally. The boys learnt how to manage a discussion and interview, and will share their thoughts with the wider community through the podcast.

We also do our best to provide students with opportunities to manage, host and contribute to our assemblies and chapel. It is a goal that their voice is heard as much as staff. They are provided with great role models in Senior School, where they see the Prefects and school leaders do this regularly. One of the most powerful role-modelling has been the 'Keynote Addresses' at Headmaster's Assembly. Many of the Prefects have inspired the Middle School students with their 'Ted Talk' style addresses. It is my hope that our Middle School leaders will have the same opportunities next year.

With exciting new redevelopments next year, student voice will be important in shaping our new Middle School for 2021. Not only will we be a Year 6–8 Middle School, but we hope to have state of the art facilities and a refreshed curriculum to match. Student input will be an important part of shaping our new Middle School. Whether it be ideas for creating learning spaces, playground layout or ways to engage in the classroom, student input will be essential. It is my hope that the Middle School will provide a learning environment where boys are encouraged to speak up but also know that their voice will be heard.



Music at Hutchins has continued to grow and develop in the second half of the school year, following on from the highly successful Music Showcase concerts at the UTAS Stanley Burbury theatre showcasing 18 ensembles of choral and instrumental music with boys from Years 1–12 taking the stage over two evenings. The continued growth of these ensembles is a key part of our plan to continue to develop the Hutchins community of musicians and is supported by the work done in instrumental classes and private lessons.





Every week, in addition to classroom music and rehearsals, approximately 300 lessons take place in our building with boys of all ages coming and going with instruments of all shapes and sizes. It is not uncommon to see older boys checking in with the younger ones about their progress and the odd high five or fist bump happening in the corridors.

This sense of a community of musicians is also evident in ensembles which feature boys from the Middle and Senior Schools rehearsing together, and at lunchtime sessions where the boys from across year levels use practice rooms to rehearse and practice in groups.

The Audio Hub is another area that is developing a sense of identity in our building and we look forward to seeing where Hutchins Radio and Podcasting takes the boys next year. Senior School and Middle Audio crews have been established and we will be hearing much more from these teams as they continue to work on their new initiatives. 🕊

Clive was born in Hobart on 6 October 1889 and by the age of 22 he was Honorary Secretary of the Tasmanian Field Naturalists Club. Clive became an architect and practised in Hobart and was made a Fellow of the Tasmanian Institution of Architects.

In 1917 he was appointed Curator and Director of the Tasmanian Museum. Clive was at the forefront of establishing a National Park for Tasmania, including the reservation of Cradle Mountain - Lake St Clair area. He was a founder member of the Hobart Rotary Club, Secretary for the Botanical Gardens and President of the Royal Australian Ornithologists Union.

He was elected a Fellow of the Linnean Society (London) and a member of the Zoological Society of London, and also served on the Australasian Association for the Advancement of Science.

Clive was a Member of the Royal Society of Tasmania, serving as Secretary for the last 15 years of his life and was presented with the Royal Society Medal. Mrs Jenny Inglis was appointed an Honorary Associate Member of the Hutchins School Old Boys' Association. We thanked Jenny for her many years of service to The Hutchins School. Unfortunately, Jenny was unwell on the day so her son Jeremy ('01) accepted the award on her behalf. Sadly, Jenny passed away on 31 August.

The Hutchins Foundation Follow Your Dreams Awards were also presented at the lunch. The awards are an opportunity for students to apply for financial support from The Hutchins Foundation to assist them in achieving and pursuing their dreams and goals. Our Headmaster, Dr Rob McEwan, recently visited the University of Oxford and had the privilege of meeting with Dr Graeme Salmon ('51), our earliest living Rhodes Scholar, who received his scholarship in 1957.

Dr Salmon, a former Senior Prefect and Dux, is

College, University of Oxford, joining the academic staff
at the Department of Physics following the completion
of his Rhodes. He retired in the late 1990s. What made
the visit even more extraordinary was that Dr Henry
West was able to join the Headmaster and Dr Salmon
for lunch. Dr McEwan described the occasion as a
wonderful celebration of the many achievements of, not
just our Rhodes recipients, but of Old Boys generally.

are achieving all over the world".






MR JARRED CLAYDON Audio, Visual and Lighting Technician

In September this year, we were very excited to announce the launch of our new Audio Hub which is located upstairs in the Music Faculty in a newly remodeled space. The space houses an audio suite and comprises a recording, podcast and radio studio.

The recording studio operates from a main mixing desk which is patched into two band rooms and a vocal suite. Students have the opportunity to learn audio design, mixing and remixing and live recording skills through club-based activities and formal music technology courses.

Hutchins Podcast operates out of a custom-designed space and is the home base for recording and editing podcasts. Student driven topic areas are set up and this facility will also be available across the entire school curriculum. Hutchins Podcast is your number one destination for additional news on events and co-curricular activities around the School. At the lunch, the Hutchins School Old Boys' Association present the **Ivied Tower Award**, which is awarded to an Old Boy that has made an outstanding achievement in their chosen field of endeavour.

This year we were delighted to present the Ivied Tower Award to David Brammall ('56) who attended the lunch with his son Robbie ('93).

David has provided enormous service to The Hutchins School and the wider community for 74 years. David commenced as a student at Hutchins in 1945 and was School Captain in 1955 and 1956. He was a resident Boarding House Tutor in 1958 and 1959 before moving to Melbourne in 1960. He was a Foundation member of The Peninsula School in 1961 and held several senior positions including Foundation Boarding Housemaster, Head of History Faculty, Head of Discipline and Assistant to Headmaster and Sportsmaster.





In 1973 David was appointed Deputy Headmaster and Head of Senior School at Hutchins. He was instrumental in establishing the co-operating schools arrangement with St Michael's Collegiate, Fahan School and Mount Carmel College. David was appointed Acting Headmaster in Term 3 of 1996 and completed his career at Hutchins as Registrar in 2000.

David coached the First XI for 17 years, was Master in Charge for 22 years and was very involved in hockey, athletics, football and debating. He was also the Hutchins representative for SATIS for 15 years. David has served on a multitude of committees at Hutchins, the latest being the newly instituted Over 80's Club.

Service has always been one of David's strong suits. He was a member and President of Kingston Rotary, Vice Chairman of the Hutchins Capital Appeal in 1990, the Independent School Representative on the Tasmanian Schools Registration Board for five years, the Hutchins representative on the Christ College Trust Board for seven years and is a very active member of the Hobart Men's Probus Club including holding the position of Chairman.

David still reads at St David's Cathedral after 40 years and is actively involved at the School by providing assistance to our Archivist/Historian, Ms Margaret Mason-Cox.

David is a true gentleman and an incredible contributor to the Hutchins and Hobart communities. We congratulate him on being this year's recipient of the Ivied Tower Award.



Headmaster Seminar Series

Webber Lecture - Professor Rufus Black

Each year, The Hutchins School presents a series of free public seminars including the Webber Lecture. The Webber Lecture is an annual address given by a leading presenter whose topic is always one of ethics. The Webber Lecture is named in honour of The Reverend Michael Webber, former Dean of Hobart.

On Wednesday 19 June 2019 Hutchins held the annual Webber Lecture. This year's speaker, Professor Rufus Black, Vice-Chancellor and President at the University of Tasmania, delivered an inspiring, thought provoking address. He challenged those in attendance to consider an alternative ethical paradigm where place shapes our identity and our way of thinking.

The ideas presented resonated strongly with all in attendance, from our own city of Hobart and its heritage buildings, our beautiful landscape and natural environment though to our personal place of birth, where we live and go to school. Our understanding of the world and ourselves starts with an understanding of place – where we are shapes who we are, even what we are obligated to do.



Dr Judith Locke

Dr Judith Locke from Confident and Capable, was our guest speaker over two nights as part of our Headmaster Seminar Series.

Judith addressed our staff and Junior, Middle and Senior School parents and carers about 'Helping your child or teen become confident and capable in their schooling'. In her work as a clinical psychologist and researcher, Judith sees a disturbing link between high-effort parenting and poor outcomes for children. She believes parents and carers make their children's lives too easy by doing too much for them and giving too much to them. This type of parenting produces 'the bonsai child', an apparently perfect child raised in a protected environment and nurtured on attention to their every need. Dependent on constant care, the bonsai child can remain confined by their ideal conditions, incapable of coping in the real world.

The sessions were very well received and parents and carers took away some great strategies to assist their child's development. A key takeaway of Judith's was 'Parents: Step back so they step up!'



MR PETER CROFTS Head of Science

The previous Chief Scientist of Australia, Professor Ian Chubb, said that the 'world's challenges are our challenges – international collaboration is essential to address them.'

The 15th International Student Science Conference (ISSC), hosted by The Hutchins School in the first week of the Term 3 holidays, was an opportunity for over 60 students from Italy, China, Sydney, Hong Kong, Taiwan and Hobart to hear about some these challenges in an international forum in a shared science and cultural experience.

The theme for this year's conference 'Human Impacts on the environment: science informing prevention and mitigation' was explored through student research presentations, expert guest speakers and excursions to places around Hobart of scientific, environmental or cultural significance.

The guest speakers spoke on topics such as: Dr Rebecca Harris - ecosystem tipping points; Greg Irons ('01) - the effect small changes in our daily lives can have on wildlife; Dr Lila Landowski - stress and the brain; Dr Stas Shabala - the link between black holes and sea-level rise; and Dr Clare Hawkins - Citizen Science.

Hutchins hosts <u>15th</u> <u>International Student</u> <u>Science Conference</u> The 11 student presentations included: the effect of fire on soils (Hamish McDougall – Hutchins, Year 10), the effect of micro plastics on zebrafish eggs (China), the breakdown of plastic with mealworms (Sydney), the pollution of waterways in the Veneto region (Italy), and the testing of natural dyes in clothing to replace synthetic dyes (Taiwan).

The first excursion of the week was to the University of Tasmania with activities in the areas of Life Sciences, Geography and Architecture, Chemistry, Engineering and Earth Sciences.

Later in the week there was also an Indigenous Science workshop at the Waterworks Reserve, and visits to Bonorong Wildlife Sanctuary, the Radio-telescope, IMAS, *Aurora Australis*, the Sustainability Centre and the Museum of Old and New Art.

The conference was a great opportunity for Hutchins boys and other young scientists, from different countries and cultures, to meet and to form friendships, and in the process experience some of the things that makes Tasmania distinctive: our science; our natural environment; and our culture.

The schools participating were Fahan School (Hobart, Tasmania), Tianjin Nankai High School (China), Liceo Foscarni (Venice, Italy), Presbyterian Ladies' College (Sydney), St Paul's Co-educational College (Hong Kong) and Stella Matutina Girls' High School (Taichung, Taiwan). ■





As part of our commitment to character development at Hutchins, during Term 3 130 boys and men, camping gear in tow, embarked on an experience together. Over two weekends at 'The Lea', we focused on building community, engaging fathers and adult mentors and building strong intergenerational relationships. We were fortunate to have the expert facilitation of Joel Hines and team from The Rites of Passage Institute, our own pastoral care staff, as well as the able assistance of Year 11 Character Development mentors. It was great to see men of all ages joining forces to build good men.

The camp was an opportunity for fathers, adult mentors and sons to connect, get away from the normal distractions and be immersed in some meaningful conversations, challenges and fun. I know that many of the conversations started during these camps will continue well into the future for the men and boys involved.

Boys had an opportunity to listen, share and reflect on growing up and the challenges they face. Adults shared stories, listened to others, got to know other dads and mentors as well as interacted with their son and his peers.

At an age where it can be challenging discovering your strengths, connecting with others and maintaining strong family relationships, our young men took up the challenge and showed a commitment to be their best. Dads also took a step outside their comfort zone, shared their own experiences and made a commitment to being there for their son, their friends and other fathers.

I was inspired by the commitment and courage of our community of men young and old who participated in our Year 7 Character Development Camps.

These camps will become an important part of the 'character conversation' as boys transition through the School on their pathway to be the best version of themselves they can.

Lifelong friendships and a strong foundation

Oliver Mellers ('03) commenced Year 3 at Hutchins in 1994. Oliver was the Cross Country U9 Champion in 1994, he competed in National English, Science and Mathematics Competitions and in 2002 and 2003 was a member of the First XV rugby team. In 2003 Oliver was Tutor Group Captain, House Whip, House Cultural Leader, Captain of House Rugby, and received Thorold House Colours, Rugby First Colours and Second Colours for Basketball and Waterpolo.

Oliver's food journey started in the kitchens of his parents' restaurants. His passion for food took him to London where he learnt traditional French cooking techniques and worked in Michelin-starred European restaurants. Oliver returned to Hobart and after several years in the positions of Executive Chef at Blundstone Arena and the Henry Jones Art Hotel's Landscape Restaurant and Grill he has returned to private catering alongside his wife Kezia. Oliver and Kezia's son Louis commenced at Hutchins in Pre-Kindergarten this year.

Oliver kindly took some time to share some of this memories from his time at Hutchins.

Tell us about your <u>life since graduating</u> from Hutchins

I started my chef's apprenticeship in Hobart working in a number of busy restaurants. Once signed off I headed to London as I had always wanted training in the Michelin system and the opportunity to travel and learn. I worked at Lord's Cricket Ground and eventually became Sous Chef there. Whilst in London I worked at Gordon Ramsay's Maze, the famous London Fish Markets, and finished my time in London working at Heston Blumenthal's The Fat Duck. From a young apprentice, getting to The Fat Duck was always a huge ambition, and it was the Number 2 Restaurant in the world while I was working there. We came back to Tassie and I took on a role as Executive Chef at Blundstone Arena, then Executive Chef at The Henry Jones, then launched my own company: Rhubarb Catering.



What are some of your Hutchins memories?

It was a lot of fun! I have great memories from the sporting field, the classroom, and the drama department. Everyone says it, but it's true: at Hutchins you do make lifelong friendships. I had a wonderful school experience, and my mates from school are still my best friends today. My teachers instilled confidence in me, and their dedication to the boys gave me the strong foundation for my life after school.

Who or what were your <u>main inspirational</u> <u>influences</u> during your time at Hutchins?

I had some great teachers who set an example of strong values that taught me so much. Mr Webber gave me confidence and taught me respect (and taught me the finer points of the rugby field!). Mr Rae had a huge commitment to us, and that kind of encouragement really brought out the best me. I'm really grateful that the School instilled values of community, respect and hard work in me from a young age.

What part do you think your time at Hutchins has played in <u>creating your interest</u> in your chosen field?

Certainly, a focus on community, connection and the courage to have a go. I was naturally a shy kid, but my time at Hutchins built a confidence which enabled me to be a leader in the kitchen, and a feeling of responsibility when teaching others, which is a large part of running a kitchen brigade.

What <u>advice</u> would you give to today's Hutchins students?

Enjoy it! Have a crack and look after each other.

Culinary dreams find Christian aloft

Christian Ryan ('04) commenced at Hutchins in Year 3 in 1994. Christian competed in the Poetry and Prose Competition in Years 7 and 8 as well as the Plan Your Own Enterprise competition in 2001. Christian commenced his career in Hobart before moving to Melbourne to work at Taxi Dining Room. He went on to work for Gordon Ramsay at the Savoy Grill before returning to Hobart to work at The Source at MONA and as Head Chef at Property: of Pilgrim. In 2015 Christian opened Aløft restaurant where you get a window seat to one of Hobart's most spectacular harbour views.

Tell us about your <u>life since graduating</u> from Hutchins

I commenced my chef's apprenticeship at Da Angelos in Battery point almost as soon as I finished Year 12. I then spend the next five years training in Hobart and Melbourne. 11 years ago I moved to London and spent a year and a half working for Gordon Ramsay while we reopened the Savoy Grill in the prestigious Savoy Hotel. Since returning to Hobart I have been lucky enough to open two businesses including Aløft restaurant which during its first four years has won some exciting awards including being named 89th best restaurant in the country by the *Australian Financial Review*. I also co-own a busy burger joint in Hobart called The Standard.

What are some of your Hutchins memories?

I have really fond memories of the time I spent at Hutchins and I had a great time while I was there. To be completely honest during most of my time I probably had a little too great of a time managing to be a frequent distraction to myself and those around me. That being said I have good memories of all of my classes, in particular the ones that involved being a little more hands on like art and drama. My favourite thing about my school years was the social aspect. I know that right now you're probably counting down the days until it's all over and you're free, but honestly just make the most of every day and every year you have at school. Looking back to my days at school, they really were was some of the best times I've ever had, enjoy being carefree and surrounded by amazing support, friendship and security. Also, don't stress if you have no idea what you want to do after school ends. I never really knew exactly what I wanted to do after school but things just have a way of falling into place.

News from the Archives

MS MARGARET MASON-COX Archivist/Historian

Phase One of our much-vaunted and long-awaited Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection online is almost ready to go live, with just a few technical issues still to be sorted out – the culmination of 13 years' work by Archives staff and volunteers. Keep your eyes peeled for an extravaganza of Hutchins history, based on items from the School's rich and varied collection of inherited and donated items dating back to 1798 (a London Times newspaper of unknown provenance). My sincere and grateful thanks go to all volunteers and others who have assisted us to get to this point.

This year has seen several anniversaries come and go without time to celebrate them all.

Junior School centenary

The Junior School celebrated its centenary, 100 years after the recycled Junior School building opened on 4 March 1919 at Macquarie Street. The former Franklin House School on the corner of Davey and Antill Streets had served as the Hutchins

Junior School since 1917, when that school affiliated with Hutchins on the resignation of its Headmaster, J A McElroy. Thus from 1919 Hutchins had its own Junior School onsite, which would serve – along with the Sub-Primary block opened at David Avenue, Sandy Bay, in 1946 – until the opening of the new Junior School building at Sandy Bay nearly 40 years later, in 1957.

90 years of The Hutchins School Parents' Association

The Hutchins School
Parents' Association also
celebrated a noteworthy
anniversary in September,
it being 90 years since the
formation of that body on
26 September 1929. In the
quaint wording of the time,
the Parents' Association
under inaugural President
Louis Dobson aimed to:

- bring parents and teachers more closely into touch and sympathy with each other
- further the interests of the school spiritually, educationally, socially and financially
- 3. organise such functions as may be deemed necessary in order to raise funds for the purpose of promoting any of the foregoing objects, and of purchasing requisites for the use of the school.

30 years later, in 1959, the Parents' Association would propose the idea of a 'Development Fund', foreshadowing the establishment of The Hutchins Foundation in 19

H G Baldwin (1919-2007)

The third anniversary worth noting is that of the birth of H G Baldwin (1919-2007), who attended Hutchins 1927-37, no. 2990. His generous beguest to the School made possible the construction of the H G Baldwin Wing incorporating the Nettlefold Library, offices and walk-in display case upstairs, plus the Max Darcey Room, offices and classrooms downstairs while also helping to build the Olga Braham Gallery, home to the School Museum. Henry Baldwin became Dux of Middle School in 1934, was promoted to Sergeant in the Hutchins School Cadet Corps two years later and in 1937 captained the rifle shooting team which represented Tasmania and came 3rd in the Earl Roberts Competition, open to all cadet units in the country.

160th anniversary of the Hutchins School Old Boys' Association

The Hutchins School Old Boys' Association is celebrating the 160th anniversary of its inaugural appearance on 22 November 1859, when a dinner was held at Webb's (now Hadley's) Hotel and a cricket match played between past and present students – for which Second Headmaster J V Buckland granted a holiday, a tradition that survived for many decades. The official founding of this august body of old scholars occurred at a meeting on 3 August 1892, when a committee was appointed and 38 former students signed up as members at five shillings per annum (\$10 in 1966 terms) – but again, this proved temporary.

The affiliation with Christ's College in 1912 and the formation of the Hutchins School Board of Management led directly to the enduring HSOBA, with former scholars who banded together to raise £1500 being rewarded with life membership of the Association and the privilege of electing three of the six representatives to the Board of Management. By the time Ray Vincent was elected Secretary in 1929, the HSOBA numbered 1052; his dedication and hard work ensured that numbers continued to climb.

60th anniversary of Hutchins first rugby premiership

Finally, another occasion worth noting was the 60th anniversary of Hutchins first rugby premiership, won in 1959 with the defeat of Robert Cosgrove School. Exactly 20 years later, the Hutchins U16 team soundly defeated Rosetta High School to win the School's second rugby premiership.

Jennifer Mary Inglis

J M Inglis was an extraordinary worker, who gave Hutchins the benefit of her boundless energy, legendary efficiency and relentless focus for more than 30 years.

From the time elder son Geoff started at Hutchins in 1986, both Jenny and her husband Bill threw themselves into the culture of the School, Bill as assistant Cub Pack leader and Jenny joining the Parents' Association (PA). By 1991 Jenny was the Southern Group's representative on the PA, organising the School's annual fair and commencing the flow of superlatives linking her name with fundraising activities. Gradually Jenny worked her way up through the Association hierarchy, becoming President in 1998 and joining the Foundation Board of Directors as its PA representative.

After leaving the PA in 2001 when younger son Jeremy finished at Hutchins, Jenny continued to work on behalf of the School in her position as a Director of The Hutchins Foundation for a further 22 years, 10 of them as President and five as Vice-President. When not holding either of the top positions Jenny led the Membership and Fundraising Committee in tireless fashion, producing new materials and information about the work of the Foundation and running its Annual Appeal.

On a personal basis Jenny was hugely supportive, both of the Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection and of the position of Archivist. Her generosity, enthusiasm and positive energy will be sorely missed by the Hutchins community. *Vivit Post Funera Virtus*.

Eric Jack Hayes A0 (1928–2019)

E J Hayes was a dedicated and long-serving member of the Hutchins community from the inception of The Hutchins Foundation in 1977. A Founding Member and Director of the Foundation until 1991, along the way he served as Chairman of both the Membership and the Planning and Development Committees, Deputy-Chairman of the Appeal Committee and President of the Board of Directors, 1984–88. During this period he also served the School directly as a regular Visiting Speaker at Lower Sixth Form assemblies 1981–83, lecturing on economics and small business.

After a record fundraising year in 1988 and a full term in the top job, Eric retired as President, noting that the most remarkable achievements during his term of office were the Ray Vincent Wing, the Stephen Hay Memorial Park at Southport, the creation of the office of Executive Director and the amassing of \$2.5 million for the School.

Eric remained a Member of the Foundation until 1998. By then he had joined the Board of Management, serving as Chairman of the Planning and Development Committee in 1991. In 2016 he became an ongoing sponsor of the School he had served so well, funding the Eric Hayes Prize for a student who shows kindness, generosity of spirit and contribution to their community in Years 7–12.

Anthony 'Tony' Ron Thiessen (1942-2019)

A R Thiessen attended Hutchins 1955–60, no. 4463. A prodigiously talented sportsman, he won awards for athletics, football and rowing, in 1960 becoming Captain of Boats and Vice-Captain of the Island Combined Premiership teams for both athletics and football. His prowess in the latter sport earned him the following accolade in the School Magazine of December 1960: 'Tony Thiessen so often revived us with his courage and refusal to acknowledge defeat. His tremendous leaps for marks, and amazing ground play, will never be forgotten.'

Tony was no academic slouch either: he scored three Higher Passes in his first year of matriculation, was awarded a Hutchins School Old Boys' Association Scholarship and the John Player Memorial Prize. In that year he was also a Prefect, Captain of School House and Boarding House Captain, and was one of three boys who were celebrated in the School record as Outstanding Present Students.

After beginning his football career at Sandy Bay, Tony played with Melbourne [1963], Carlton [1964], North Melbourne [1965] and Waverley [1966] in Victoria. He then returned to Tasmania to play on and represent his State, before transferring permanently to Melbourne in 1971. He died there on 3 September 2019 and is survived by his wife, three children and grandchildren, as well as two of his siblings.



Rodney Winston Harvey-Latham

(1935-2019)

R W Harvey-Latham attended Hutchins 1942–52, no. 3653. His interests and skills ranged from playing music – aged just



13, he won 2nd place in the All Tasmanian Violin Solo held at Launceston – to tennis, swimming and cricket. After leaving school and studying music – and playing valuable cricket for the HSOBA – he taught for several years at Education Department schools before joining the staff at Hutchins in 1972 as a teacher of Higher School Certificate Geography.



For many years Rod coached and assisted with tennis and badminton teams, musical and drama productions, and was a football umpire. In the boarding house he purchased and installed a cinemascope screen and organised film evenings. While teaching a non-academic course introduced for General Studies he purchased a Transit Van and took his class on a visit to the South Hobart Wrecker for the necessary parts to fit it out for the transportation of his charges. One year he even taught the flying course introduced in 1972 by former air force pilot, Headmaster Dudley Clarke.

In 1977 Rod was elected president of the Southern Tasmanian Lawn Tennis Association. The following year he moved from Senior to Middle School, where he became Master of Form III while continuing to coach tennis and badminton. Following his return from long service leave taken in 1982, his failing health led him to resign. His official farewell from the School, printed in the School Magazine of 1982, notes that 'he was a man of wide-ranging abilities, readily able to offer advice on a variety of matters. There have been few fields that he has not tackled and generally with success. As an orator he had few peers'.

Rod Harvey-Latham spent his last decades living in Queensland. He died there on 13 September 2019 and his life was celebrated with a memorial service in the Chapel of St Thomas shortly afterwards.
