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


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

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CHAIRMAN OF THE BOARD

2011 was another remarkable year for The Hutchins School. A year marked by the School's continued success in all its pursuits, be it academic, sporting, arts or service to the community. To all those who participated in, and contributed to, those successes a big thank you and sincere congratulations from the School Board.

While undoubtedly successful, from the Board's perspective the 2011 year has presented a full and challenging agenda.

Throughout the year your Board has continued to monitor and refine the School's strategic plan and similar to 2010, the Board conducted another full day's strategic day offsite, where the focus was firmly on the future. But while there was a consideration of how the School should adapt to take account of changes to technology, demographics, vocational trends and how it can attract and retain talent – it was the state of the economy that diverted the attention of the Board, particularly as the year has progressed. The clear objective of the Board is maintaining an operating and capital base that achieves the appropriate balance between the current and future needs of the School. This is made all the more challenging as the economy remains volatile, potentially impacting on enrolments and future Government funding arrangements for independent schools being uncertain, both at state and federal levels.

We have also seen the economic turmoil and high Australian dollar significantly reduce international student enrolments. While not wishing to be alarmist, the funding uncertainty has the potential to create an increased financial burden on our already stretched fee paying parents. Therefore, the Board continues to be diligent in controlling expenditure and prudently allocating capital to ensure a healthy balance sheet, particularly until clarity emerges on the future funding situation.

It is for this reason that the Board has determined that 2012 will be a year of consolidation. While 2011 saw the successful completion of the \$4.2 million Burbury House Boarding House redevelopment there will be no major building redevelopments undertaken in 2012. Instead the Board will be concentrating on finalising the Building Master Plan and renewing the School's information technology strategy.

Information technology continues to move at a rapid pace and the Board has determined that a thorough review is required with the objective of setting an IT strategy to meet the School's evolving educational, curricular and administrative needs as well as laying out the future capital investment requirements, which can be incorporated into the School's financial projections.

The Board intends to work with our close partners, The Hutchins Foundation, The Hutchins Old Boys' Association and the Parents' Association to determine how we can meet the challenging funding requirements to realise the ambitious aims of the Building Master Plan. This has already commenced with the Board having conducted a briefing to these bodies, updating them on the School's progress against the Strategic Plan. The ultimate objective is to develop a shared purpose where all these entities can work together with the School to deliver the School's objectives.

An area of increased Board focus in 2011 has been safety. While to some extent driven by the looming introduction of new harmonised occupational health and safety laws, the Board also has the objective of ensuring all staff and students are safe while at school and are able to return home safely at the end of the day. The School now maintains an OH&S Risk Register and the Board receives monthly safety reports and updates. While it is disappointing that the School incurred four staff lost time injuries for the year, the significant improvement in our OH&S process right across the School will go a long way toward meeting the Board's safety objectives.

Mr Barrie Irons is retiring as Deputy Headmaster and there have been many tributes paid to Barrie for his amazing contribution over his 23 years at the School, thirteen of those as Deputy Headmaster. On behalf of the current Board and all the Board's that he has served so capably over the years, I extend our heartfelt thanks. We wish Barrie and Di well for the future and look forward to seeing his positive energy and enthusiasm around the School as he embarks on his new role as School Registrar.

The Board's thanks and best wishes are also extended to Mr Andrew Webber who retires after 21 marvellous years of service to the School. We also welcome the appointment of Mr Alan Jones as Deputy Headmaster and look forward to Alan and his family joining our School community in 2012.

During the year the Board also reviewed its contractual arrangements with the Headmaster, Mr Dean. Following a review of the Headmaster's outstanding performance since his appointment and after discussing and agreeing his future objectives for the School, the Board unanimously elected to extend the Headmaster's appointment to July 2015. We are privileged to have secured the services of such an exceptional and dedicated individual as Mr Dean and we look forward to his continued inspiring and strong leadership. We extend our congratulations to Mr Dean on the extension of his tenure.

In 2011 the School undertook the challenging redevelopment of the Burbury House Boarding House. Apart from a demanding building timetable, the redevelopment was also challenging from a logistical perspective with the boarders being housed and transported to various temporary lodgings around Hobart while the project was progressing The Board would like to thank the boarders and their parents for their patience and understanding over this disruptive period and I am sure that we would all agree that the temporary displacement was absolutely worth it. To all involved in making the project a success, in particular Business Manager Ms Jenny Self, Board members Mr Chris Holloway and Mr Charles Brothers, Maintenance Manager Mr Ken Barnes, builders Fairbrother Constructions and their contractors, Architect Mr John Button, Scouts Tasmania for assisting with accommodation at The Lea, House staff members Mr Josh Hanek, Dr Peter Wilson, Mr Adrian Finch and Ms Andrea Kooyman the Board extends its sincere thanks for getting the job done on time, to budget and safely.

The success of The Hutchins School culminates from the efforts of all those people associated with the School, be they directly employed or part of the broad band of volunteers who contribute so capably to the many varied activities of the School. To our staff I extend the thanks of the Board for your continued dedication, assistance and guidance provided to the boys in 2011, particularly to those of you who volunteer your valuable time outside school hours over and above your normal roles. To our Headmaster Mr Dean, our outgoing Deputy Headmaster Mr Irons and Business Manager Ms Self I acknowledge your continued strong and committed leadership in attending to the affairs of the School and thank you for the support offered to me as Chairman and to the Board in 2011.

To all those volunteers of the School who contribute their valuable time in many spheres be it assisting with sport, the School Fair, fundraising, the Arts, in the classroom or via our important partners, The Hutchins Foundation, The Hutchins Old Boys' Association and the Parents' Association, on behalf of the Board I thank you. Without your continued efforts and provision of time, many of the activities you support simply would not happen, let alone achieve the successful outcomes which result from your efforts. To all those people who contributed financially I also extend my thanks. I assure you all funds contributed are put to good use and we look forward to your ongoing support.

I would also like to acknowledge my colleagues on the Board, Mrs Megan Ayliffe, Mr Charles Brothers, Mr John Groom, Mr Chris Holloway, Mr David Morris, Mrs Pam Windsor, Dr Marcus Haward and Mr Charlie Cottier. The School is privileged to have such a talented and committed team providing oversight to the affairs of the School. In a year of challenge they have continued to make significant contributions which extend well beyond their regular Board roles, providing valuable assistance and advice to the School's management in their respective areas of expertise.

During my year as Chairman I have had the privilege of attending many official and ceremonial events of the School. It is rare that I leave these functions without drawing inspiration from the boys who participate. Whether it is our outstanding School Captain Charles Haward speaking with such poise and leadership, our Orator Frank Burridge recalling his first 'bowl of fruit' encounter with Barrie Irons; watching a footy game or a bunch of rowers on their knees scooping sheep poop to fund their next set of oars; I can only gain the confidence that the School is 'doing it right' and feel justified in stating that the School continues to build on its proud traditions, while creating a world of opportunity for our students.

To the young men of Year 12, I congratulate you all for your respective contributions to the life of the School. As you head off in your new directions I encourage you to take advantage of every opportunity. To paraphrase the wise advice of Barrie Irons which was so eloquently recounted by Frank Burridge at this year's Awards Assembly;

'the rest of your life will be like eating from a platter of fruit, where the fruit represents the opportunities available to you. You can try a piece of fruit but if you don't like it at first, give it a red hot go. If you still don't like it, you can put it down and try something else. But if you do like something you try, then I encourage you to eat the whole fruit.' HEADMASTER'S REPORT



I am delighted to report our 165th year has been very successful but I wish to begin by congratulating the Year 12 graduating class of 2010 on their outstanding academic results. We note with pride that 34% of students in Year 12 achieved from a possible 99.95, scores of 90 or more. This is an outstanding achievement and underscores the continuing academic strength of The Hutchins School in state and national arenas.

In taking the opportunity to congratulate Thomas Lelong, Lachlan Lindoy and Christopher Ryba for being awarded the only three available perfect scores in Tasmania, I wish also to stress that the great body of last year's students were represented in first round offers to tertiary institutions of their preferred choice and our best students were recipients of International, national and state offers and scholarships from university and vocational training institutions. At the time of writing preliminary results for the 2011 TCE examinations indicate that Hutchins students have again achieved excellent results; 4.5% of students achieved 99 or more out of a possible 99.95, 24% of students achieved a score of 95 or more, 41.8% of students achieved a score of 90 or more and three Hutchins VET students were finalists in the Tasmanian Training Awards 2011.

We are proud of our teaching and learning outcomes across a deliberately diverse and challenging spectrum of academic, VET and co-curricular opportunities, and I wish to emphasise that Hutchins is a leader in demonstrating standards of academic excellence.

At Hutchins success has not only been achieved in classrooms and, while

academic pursuits are very important, so too is the careful attention to more holistic development of young boys as they develop into young men.

There have been many opportunities for involvement by students to participate in fields such as sports, community services, outdoor adventures, music, performing and visual arts and, importantly, opportunities for our students to happily seek out and make new friendships and, in a supportive and happy community, to enjoy just developing into a young man.

In this sense the launch of our Year 9 curriculum – the Power of 9 – has been an overwhelming success as we have taken the opportunity to commit to prepare better our younger men for their senior years. This is an exciting initiative in best practice teaching and learning at Hutchins.

The Power of 9 challenges students intellectually, physically, emotionally, and spiritually as they experience teaching and learning in classrooms, in the open environment and in other quite different communities and cultures. Special thanks go to Mr Ken Kingston, Mr Todd Blackhall, Mr Mark Oates and Mr Ben Duggan and all Year 9 staff for their extraordinary efforts and success in delivering this unique and exciting program.

Planning for the future of the School is the work of the Board of The Hutchins School and again in 2011 the Board has been a hard working and most supportive group. I thank Chairman Mr Lance Balcombe and the Board for their enduring support for the work we do. For example, this year with Board support and funding we completed a full internal rebuild of our boarding facility, Burbury House.



STAFF FAREWELL



Andrew Webber

The Hutchins community will be very sad to see the retirement of one of our most respected and professional teachers. Andrew was a student at Hutchins from 1959 – 1965. In his final year he was School Vice-Captain and also Captain of Thorold House. Interestingly his son, Michael, was Captain of Thorold House and second son, David, Vice-Captain of the School.

Andrew was a teacher at Hutchins from 1991 to 2011. He was House Master of School House, Head of Religious Studies and Tasmanian Qualifications Authority Studies in Religion Examiner, Moderator and also Chief Marking Examiner. He was also a supreme Rugby coach and mentor. In 2008 Andrew was awarded the Inspirational Teacher Award by NEITA, an honour he richly deserved as the consummate professional.

Andrew's philosophy for teaching was very simple – dedication and competence and a love of the subject resulted in enthusiasm from his inspired students. He also believed in the reward for achievement rather than detention for failure. He challenged his students academically and encouraged them to live life in a socially responsible manner. He left no stone unturned in preparing his senior students for their final assessments which often involved a full Sunday of revision and, of course, an enormous commitment to his marking and demanding the best from each one of them. His final lesson ended with his students forming a guard of honour as he left the room. What a dignified way to finish off the chapter.

As Head of School House Andrew was a firm believer in the importance of trust and strong relationships. He wanted boys to achieve, not just to win the Cock House Trophy, but to be men of substance. He generated a wonderful team spirit amongst the Mentors and students. Students were trained and encouraged to lead and take on responsibility, his steady hand at the helm. He liked healthy competition and this was symbolised by the establishment of the Beattie Trophy, in memory of Sam Beattie, for sporting competitions between the Mentor groups.

Andrew was the coach of five premiership Hutchins Rugby teams, always leading from the front. He was as fit as any of the boys in his squad and always demanded high standards of sportsmanship and commitment to the team. The development of their self esteem and health and fitness was as important as winning. I can remember one day his team returning from a run with snow on their collars and his comment was: "it is all character building".

He also believed in the absolute importance of community service. Many boys have travelled up the Midlands Highway with him in the School bus to build paths, plant trees or repair walking tracks. He also took Hutchins boys overseas, once with Alan Pride on the European tour of England, Italy and France, and the other time to Fiji with Father John and Jodie Schafferius. Here they worked for nearly two weeks at Saint Christopher's Orphanage in Suva after a whirlwind tour of New Zealand's North Island. Getting to know boys outside the classroom helped him build up that enormous respect he enjoyed.

Andrew has been one of the most dedicated and honourable members of staff I have ever been associated with, a genuine School Master. Andrew, I hope you will look back with fond memories on your days at Hutchins as student and teacher. We will certainly miss your total commitment to all you do; thank goodness you will continue to mentor for the Hutchins Graduation Religion and Philosophy course.

CHAPLAIN

There is a famous photograph of the September 11 attack on the Twin Towers in New York in 2001. It was only released in 2006 due to its controversial nature. It appears that a group of five people are enjoying a lazy day in the sunshine while the background of smoke emerging from the city tells the story that 3000 people are dying. It has become a symbol of indifference and complacency for Americans and we may also heed the warning.

I believe that all our best qualities have an 'evil twin' – a downside – that we must acknowledge and avoid. As Australians we are known worldwide as a laidback and relaxed race of people for whom tolerance is a fundamental quality. 'Live and let live' could easily be our national motto. This is a phenomenal quality in disasters like floods, cyclones and bushfires. We spend little time in coming to terms with loss, quickly roll up the sleeves and get on with the recovery.

However, the 'evil twin' of this tendency is to be complacent about our position of privilege in our world. Tasmanians are in a great place – especially Hutchins Tasmanians. We enjoy extraordinary wealth and privilege which would be easy to simply accept and exploit. This is not, as I regularly say to the boys, their fault but it is their responsibility. I encouraged the boys at the Year 12 Valedictory Service to respond in three ways to this challenge.

Acknowledge the great position in life into which you have been born. Gratitude for this gift – especially to the Giver – is a key to life.

Use your God-given gifts to the best of your ability – for the sake of others, for self and ultimately to the Giver.

Understand that you have an Eternal

purpose – the School's motto, *Vivit Post Funera Virtus* – 'Character Lives on After Death' – suggests this. The School's founders saw the role of the School in the light of their relationship with Jesus Christ and the knowledge that we will give account of our lives at the end.

Power of 9

The Spirituality component of the P9 program was valued highly by the boys. Although the program varied for each group, the desire was to target the key areas of life to bring a greater depth and first-hand experience of questions about our purpose and significance in this world. To discuss *Life*, we went to Cornelian Bay Cemetery, which included a tour of the Crematorium with Michael Anderson of Millingtons.

To investigate our *Freedom*, we toured the Ron Barwick Minimum Security Prison and met some inmates. The boys found this confronting but valued the opportunity to ponder the possibility of making that 'one mistake' and how an impulsive moment could change the course of their lives. Our thanks go to Rob McCafferty, the Correctional Manager at the prison, for assisting us, along with his team.

To speak of *Peace*, we visited Sabri Samson, the imam at Hobart Mosque along with a trip to St David's Cathedral to grasp our connection to the history of the Christian mission in our city.

Other events included a visit from Palawa Aboriginal Corporation and Darryl Cook from the Environment Protection Authority.

Chapel visitors

We have had a number of visitors, including second visits from Justus Miwanda (Uganda) and Abraham from Andong province (Cambodia), to assist the boys in gaining an awareness of the poverty around the globe as well as some inspiration to make a difference to the lives of others. Perhaps the most exciting was the visit from the Watoto Childrens Choir (Uganda) who were billeted with Hutchins families and gave us a wonderful performance in September. The Iron and Clay musical group also performed for the Junior School and Middle School chapels, making connections between bullying, self-image and the Christian walk.

Lunchtime Groups

JAFFA remained our key lunchtime groups for boys who wish to deepen their understanding of Jesus Christ. The senior group began with a musical focus and finished the year with a great core group of Year 9s who want to be a visible representation of Christ in the Senior School in 2012. The Middle School JAFFA group hosted the following annual events: Lolly Tasting Trophy (Jordan Hargrave), *MasterChef* (Nicholas Welling) and the JAFFA Cricket Cup (yet to be decided). Michael Young (Year 8) and Tom Beadle (Year 11) lent valuable leadership to these groups along with Rev Mark Holland, who has a knack with 'out there' youth group style games. His Junior School JAFFA group enjoyed great popularity assisted by the Year 6 Chapel team.

Two new events

Some initiatives also gave an opportunity to deepen our experience of the major events of the Christian calendar. At Easter, boys experienced *The Stations of the Cross* in the Auditorium run by the School Ministry Team. The Advent season was celebrated in the first Carols Service run by Hutchins for a number of years, with the wonderful assistance of the Choir, led by Mr Andrew Bainbridge.

School Mission Team

The School Mission Team was formerly called the Chapel Committee. We believed that we needed to widen our visibility in the School, so the name change seemed appropriate. The team comprised Tom Beadle (Warden 2011) and Daniel McQuillan (Buckland); Francis Pascal (Stephens); Anton Roberts and James Burgess (School); Jack Fizelle (Thorold); Michael Young (Middle School); and Matthew Scaife, David McQuillan for Year 9 chapel in Term 3.

FROM THE ARCHIVES

Much has been achieved in Archives during 2011.

The official opening of the Foundation Heritage Centre in March caused a flurry of activity in the preparation and finalisation of displays in and around the museum.

The biggest project was undoubtedly the honouring of the memory of WWII fighter pilot, Stuart Crosby Walch. Both his lionisation and the subsequent presentation of a memorial plaque on behalf of the Battle of Britain Historical Society were the culmination of many months of work. In the process, the Hutchins Lions Wall shifted location to the corridor outside the Olga Braham Gallery. We look forward to more distinguished old boys joining that elite group of Hutchins Lions, whose members have all excelled in their chosen fields of endeavour.

Digitisation of the photograph collection is proceeding well, with more than 2200 scanned images and photographs now accessible on our Sharepoint site. Concurrent work on school publications such as *Communiqué* and *Magenta & Black* has accelerated this process.

An exciting development was the increased number of year group visits

During Term 1 we had a visit from two curious and lively Kindergarten groups and assisted a Year 6 class with their research into some of the Hutchins soldiers who participated in World War I. In Term 2, an impromptu visit from Year 5 students resulted in an astonishing number of return visits from students for some weeks afterward. In addition, both Year 2 classes came for a brief tour of Hutchins history, via the bell tower and memorial pebble garden outside the Chapel. A Year 1 class from Lenah Valley Primary School visited as part of their unit of work on 'the olden days'. This was most enjoyable and stimulating for all concerned.

Old Boys' morning teas held regularly during the year resulted in many new visitors and repeat visits; frequent meetings held in the Margaret Driscoll Room adjoining the museum brought many more; and regular tours of prospective students and parents brought in others.

Professional events attended during the year include a workshop organised by the Roving Curators of Arts Tasmania, under the banner of Making Museums Work, focusing on the writing of successful grant applications.

The value and significance of the Hutchins Archives and Heritage Collection has been recognised by our professional body, the Australian Society of Archivists. In August, members the ASA (Tas branch) made their long-promised return visit to inspect our new facilities (postponed earlier in the year due to flood damage caused by excessive rains), after which they enjoyed Hutchins hospitality for the Society's Annual General Meeting.

It remains only to thank our dedicated volunteers. Mr David Brammall has again been a rock of support. Year 10 student Horace Lee has recently completed a list of Housemasters and Captains from the inception of the House system in 1918. Mr Ted Pitman has recently joined us as a volunteer. We are extremely grateful for their assistance – and for the help and support given by the Library, Technical and Development Office teams, without which life in the Archives would be infinitely more difficult and far less enjoyable.

Hutchins international exchanges

continue to grow with opportunities for students to be involved in programs in Scotland, India, France, Turkey, Italy, Thailand, China and South Africa.

In 2011 we welcomed a group of students from the Second High School Beijing attached to the normal University for a two week stay. Our students had travelled to Beijing as part of their Chinese pre-tertiary language studies in 2010 and 2011 was our turn to act as host. The students enjoyed a variety of experiences including Bonorong, Port Arthur, Mt Field and Salamanca Market. The most rewarding aspect was renewing friendships and building relationships between our two schools.

Our European exchanges saw students from Paris and Madrid join us for parts of the year. Having them here allowed us to learn about their language, culture and lifestyle. We discovered that the commonalities we share greatly outweigh our differences.

A highlight of our programs in 2011 was our new Turkish exchange. Throughout March and April this year and in conjunction with St Michael's Collegiate, Rangitoto College (NZ) and Istanbul Erkek Lisesi (Turkey), Hutchins students participated in the Tears of Gallipoli exchange. The emphasis of the exchange was to help foster closer relationships between countries that had once been enemies in war. Students were hosted by partnered students from Istanbul Lisesi and lived closely with them and their families for the duration of the stay. The historical significance and grandeur of Istanbul was remarkable and students and staff alike were captivated by the immense scale of the city as well as the magnificent architecture, some of which date back to Eastern Roman Empire times.

The tour of the Gallipoli peninsula was the culminating experience for the exchange participants and a clear highlight of the tour. Students from each of the four partner schools toured a number of WWI graveyards and battle sites with an overwhelming sense of reverence attributed to the important events which unfolded there almost one hundred years ago. The quiet respect that each member of the group was able to afford during this time was observed and will most likely be a palpable part of their remembrance for many years to come.

In the return leg of the exchange, students from Istanbul Lisesi flew to Australia and New Zealand to stay with their student partners where they participated in a number of activities. Doruk Akarçay, Cem Çavu and Berke Tekay were each hosted in turn by Hutchins students Samuel Cleary (Year 10), Patric Hindle (Year 10) and Damon Heather (Year 12). Students and staff participated in an Eco-cruise, went river rafting, toured historical sites and visited Bonorong wildlife reserve. All students took part in the 25 April ANZAC Day Services with attendance at the dawn service at the Hobart Cenotaph. After a breakfast provided by the Hobart RSL and a meeting with Tasmanian dignitaries at the Town Hall, all students marched as a combined group to the cenotaph for the final service of the day. It was a moving experience for those involved and a fitting end to what was a hugely successful and rewarding venture.

We look forward to increasing the exchange program in 2012 with opportunities for our boys to experience Scotland, England, Singapore, France, Spain, Costa Rica, Thailand, South Africa and China. As our boys learn about other cultures they learn much about themselves. The world is becoming a smaller place and our boys are increasingly becoming global citizens.

JOHN BEDNALL CENTRE FOR LEARNING SUPPORT

The John Bednall Centre has continued to be a vibrant learning space, offering learning support and programs for gifted and talented students from Prep to Year 12, individual support for students with disabilities and lunch time activities. The students attend the Centre in small groups and participate in a diverse range of activities. Mr Adam Palfreyman, Mr Nick Eaves, Mrs Sandra Paine, Mrs Pip Hale and Ms Jenny Johnston form the Learning Support teaching team, with Mrs Judy Scaife, Mrs Christine Russell and Ms Amanda Thomson providing individual support for students with high needs.

Year 3 and 4 students participated in a Physics based engineering challenge where students had to build a tower, reaching a specified height, using a set amount of paddle pop sticks to support as much weight as possible.

During the Centre Open Week, parents and grandparents were invited to attend the Centre classes and participate in their son's programs.

Year 2 students have become familiar with a new computer based program, Intrepica. This program supports literacy learning through spelling, phonics, reading and comprehension in a fun format. The activities are assigned to match the individual student's learning needs. Students can use their own login to access this program from any internet connected computer. We have encouraged students from Years 2 to 8 to continue to use the program during the summer break. Prep boys participated in a new literacy support program, 'Get Reading Right'. This program is based on the process of reading with synthetic phonics which involves breaking words into separate phonemes that can be blended together to read a word. On the other hand, the process of spelling requires the boys to identify all the phonemes in a word and then to use their knowledge of the alphabetic code to write it. Middle School students participated in elective programs to support their learning, focussing particularly on the acquisition of assistive technology. Programs for talented students included participation in the Australian Mathematics Challenge, creative and critical thinking training; Humanities extension activities and Writers' Workshop.

His is an empowering tale with so many lessons for our audience.

Li Cunxin touched the hearts of our audience and he is an enduring example of the questions of ethics which he had to

HUTCHINS ART PRIZE

The 12th Hutchins Art Prize was

regarded by many as the most varied and interesting exhibition since the event's inception in 1997. The imaginative possibilities for artists working on paper were on show for the delight of occasional art lovers and experts alike.

In his opening address, The Governor of Tasmania, His Excellency The Honourable Peter Underwood AC, paid Hutchins a glowing tribute for the School's foresight in staging a nationally recognised art prize that attracts entries from leading artists Australia-wide. His Excellency pointed out the extraordinary educational opportunity offered to students, staff and parents by the Hutchins Art Prize where the winning entry, a major piece of



contemporary art, is acquired and added to the Foundation Collection on display throughout the School.

The winner of the 2011 Hutchins Art Prize (\$15,000) was Tasmanian artist Helen Wright for her relief print 'The Exquisite Corpse of Seaweed Man'. Victorian artist Natasha Dusenjko won the Hillross Award for the Judges' Special Commendation (\$2,000) and Ashlee Irwin, a student at the UTAS School of Art, won the Artery Student Award (\$1,000 worth of art materials). Rew Hanks (NSW) won the Road Runners People's Choice Award (\$500). Of the 326 entries received, 63 were selected by the judging panel as finalists. Over 1,800 visitors saw the show.



The Long Gallery once again proved to be an ideal venue as, sited as it is in Salamanca Place, over half the visitors to the exhibition came from interstate or overseas. These people invariably left the show with a positive impression of Hutchins, a school they otherwise would not have heard about.

CURRICULUM

H-Learning: celebrating the learning and adventures of boys

Essential to the education of boys is building both their academic learning and their strength of character. The cornerstone of our school aim is the idea of 'what you do matters!' This is about assisting each young man to become intellectually rigorous, curious and self-disciplined, with a character that is strong, consistent, and courageous. I have heard it referred to as pursuing paths that develop 'brave hearts and bold minds.'

Our outstanding academic results over recent years has been no accident and a key has been this pursuit. It is testament to the success of our learning style. I call this 'H-Learning', or Hutchins Learning, which has, at its core, three key ingredients:

- mutually respectful relationships;
- rigorous, active and technology rich; teaching and learning, and
- an appetite for bold adventure.

Mutually respectful relationships

There is an old proverb that says 'It takes a village to raise a child'. I believe there is a Hutchins village, because day-in and day-out I have found the very

best outcomes in terms of building a boy's learning capacity occurs through a genuine partnership between a boy, his friends, his home and family, and our staff working closely and positively together.

Daily life at Hutchins is about building and strengthening these relationships. For at least seven hours a day, a boy interacts with his teachers, friends, other boys and support staff. This is how he learns about relationships. Those closest to him have a profound influence, caring not only about his intellectual wellbeing but also his physical wellbeing and emotional wellbeing. How often have I heard conversations around important questions as 'What must you do to understand Maths better?', 'What did your English teacher suggest about how to improve your essay writing?', 'How are you feeling?', 'Is everything all right at home?', 'Did you get a good night's sleep?'and 'How might we fix this challenge you are facing?'

Under the leadership of our Heads of School, I am constantly amazed by how the wellbeing of each student is viewed as paramount, by how much we show belief in him, by letting him know when he does something meaningful for others or shows a kindness and by how much effort he makes when tackling something new or difficult. On his journey through the School there are myriad opportunities for a student to demonstrate compassion, social justice and service which help to liberate his potential to grow leadership and make a positive contribution to the Hutchins village and his community. The School encourages an extensive civics involvement and there is an emphasis on rebuilding relationships through mediation and restorative justice.

Rigorous, active and technology-rich teaching and learning

In a structured, disciplined and ordered environment there is a focus on quality teaching in a technology-rich environment where personal academic success and achievement is a core value.

Our K-12 program is one of learning by seeing, hearing, thinking and doing – structured and sequential learning experiences, with an extensive range of intellectually rigorous academic subjects and, from Year 10, a vocational learning stream that allows a senior student to kick-start his career and complete his TCE at the same time. It provides a diverse and challenging curriculum and rich opportunities for a student to discover new talents and interests and to develop and follow his passions.

Aspects of this quality teaching and learning program include:

- a Science program with both global perspective and global participation;
- a rich language and creative expression program;
- a vibrant business and enterprise program that excels on the national stage;
- an independent inquiry project from Years 7-9, culminating with Tasmanian Qualification Authority's 'Student Direct Inquiry' at Years 11 and 12;
- an innovative Junior School home study program called 'This Matters Challenge';
- a co-curricular program of over 40 activities, ranging from sports to health and fitness options;



 a co-operating schools arrangement at Years 10-12, which exposes a boy to a diversity of ideas and differences in perspectives that can only improve his academic performance and emotional maturity at this crucial and formative stage of his learning journey.

This is enhanced by a co-curricular program of over 40 options ranging from individual and team sports to health and fitness options as well as a high performance creative arts program featuring musical theatre, drama, choir, soloists, ensembles and dance.

Hutchins is a technology-rich learning environment, with a web-based learning system, developing e-learning opportunities and a one-on-one laptop program in Power of 9.

An appetite for bold adventure

Dr Ian P M Lambert, Principal of The Scots College, is quoted as saying 'Adventure is a path. An appetite for bold adventures forces a boy to find that path, follow it in a self-determined fashion, and experience first-hand encounters with the world. Compelled to take risks, expand intellectual curiosity, and grapple

with the extremes of human kindness and cruelty, bold adventure leads boys along a path that unfolds the mysteries of the world in all its rawness and in all its beauty'.

He could easily be describing our Outdoor Education Program, of education through adventure, exploration and service, culminating in our powerful an integrated education experience at Year 9 which we have termed Power of 9, with adventures on board a tall ship and an extended walk in the Tasmanian wilderness, or committed service to a Central Australian aboriginal community, or working with a village school in the jungles north-west Thailand, or surviving on a remote Tasmanian off-shore island. Students in the senior years have the opportunity to participate in a range of expedition and adventure challenges, such as

- canyoning at Cradle Mountain;
- walking the Overland Track;
- skiing or snowboarding in New Zealand;
- cycling Bruny Island;
- a 'World Challenge' expedition overseas.

Hutchins encourages students to strive for success and to see personal achievement in a wide range of pursuits as a core value. Boys need opportunities to develop an understanding and experience of the world, of building character, resilience and integrity. Hutchins meets this challenge through respectful relationships, rigorous teaching and learning and exploration and service.

FACULTY OF BUSINESS, ENTERPRISE, SOSE AND ICT

The BEST Faculty undertook a diverse range of activities. Kinder and Prep investigated the environment in Lambert Park, Year 1 interviewed their grandparents, while Year 2 investigated the heritage of our school. Year 3 read Dreamtime stories to understand the connection our Tasmanian Aborigines have to the land. Year 4 were transported back to the early days of Australian settlement. Year 5 looked at the reasons why Sullivan's Cove was the chosen site for the current position of Hobart. Before travelling to Canberra to visit the War Memorial and National Museum, Year 6Bu visited our school archives to investigate old boys who had been ANZACS.

In the Year 7 Ancient Truths and Mysteries unit, students constructed costumes, dioramas, models and artefacts. Year 8 Beyond Belief students designed some brilliant inventions including a star picket applicator, a moveable bookmark and an automatic dog feeder.

The Year 11-12 Geography class analysed erosion and deposition at Sandy Bay Beach and studied changes in land use in the CBD since 2000. Henry West (Year 12) won the Senior Division of the Geography Competition. Year 10-11 Business Management students participated in the CPA Australia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition, with Samuel Padgett's (Year 10) plan being judged Best in the State. Year 11-12 Accounting students had the opportunity to Meet the Business Leader through the Institute of Chartered Accountants, Calum Mitchell (Year 11) was the state winner in the Junior Division of the Australian Economics Competition, with Andre Botha (Year 12) winning the Senior Division. Allen Chen (Year 12) was the state winner in the Junior Division of the Australian Business Studies Competition. Students from Years 7-12 participated in the ASX Schools Sharemarket Game, and some Year 11-12 Economics students were invited to attend a presentation by James Shugg (Economist and old boy).

C.9 Clarify and articulate your own ideas, attitudes and values through reflection and critical engagement with texts

A version of this criterion forms part of the assessment in each pre-tertiary English course. In this first Faculty article, I would like to reflect on what happens in language classrooms at the journey's end.

Australian author, Robert Dessaix visited Hutchins in 2009 and explained the advantage of being able to speak a variety of languages is that they give a person access to and the ability to express multiple ways of seeing the world. This year Hutchins welcomed a new teacher of French, Mr Justin Bowman-Shaw (who also speaks Spanish) and it was the first year that students have studied pre-tertiary Chinese at Hutchins. Our students acknowledge the truth of Mr Dessaix's words because our language enrolments are strong and students continue to take advantage of the College Language and High Achiever Programs. Cultural tours for Chinese and French students are being planned.

In English Studies, Daniel Westbury considered what it means to be a man and compared the dilemmas of whistleblower Simon Illingworth and Hamlet: [Illingworth's] expression of his duty as a 'nightmare' is similar to Hamlet's descriptions of life as 'an unweeded garden'. Both Illingworth and Hamlet had the option to leave their nightmares, Illingworth by leaving Victoria, and Hamlet by choosing death, which he 'devoutly' wished. Both elected to stay until their tasks were finished. I find this a very poignant expression of the acceptance of responsibility and honour, which is integral to being a man.

William Lord, in English Communications, responded strongly to the 2011 media controversy involving Andrew Bolt:

While I respect a journalist's right to publish biased-riddled, opinionated articles, publishing blatant inaccuracies is unacceptable; but most disturbing is when debate is shut down through censorship. As a consumer of Australian media, I like to be exposed to a diverse range of opinions and cultural representations from which to decide my own position, not to have opinions censored because the Australian public are too fragile to handle them; we're not.

In English Writing, students reflect on the process of creating their own texts. Alec Shea offered this interpretation of his allegorical poem, 'Directionless':

I feel my mind functions like a society, all of my interests contribute different ideas

when they are needed, to keep myself (the raft) on track but during the course of Year Twelve, I began to deviate...in the blink of an eye I had gone from being completely sure of everything I did and where it was taking me, to floating adrift in the middle of the ocean. The message behind this poem is one drawn from this experience, and is a reminder to myself: no matter how focused I am on a project or how cut off from the rest of the world I feel, I have to keep an eye on where the edge is to keep it from derailing me and losing track of the bigger picture.

At an assessment panel of English Studies teachers in December, we agreed that it is difficult to draw these complex, personal and socially responsible insights out of students who do not yet know they are there. Hard work – yes; tiresome – never. When students do English, they understand themselves and their world *through language*. Helping them clarify their understanding and communicate powerfully and precisely really is the best job in the world.

The particular achievements of students in English and Modern Languages are celebrated in the 'Debating, Speaking and Writing' article.

FACULTY OF HEALTH AND HUMAN MOVEMENT

2011 has been a busy and prosperous year for the Faculty:

FACULTY OF MUSIC

At Hutchins, we are fortunate to have a number of avenues that allow all our students to explore their musical potential. Through the Faculty of Music curriculum, students from Kindergarten to Year 7 experience music on various levels – composition, improvisation, arrangement, performance, conducting and responding. Those who feel they would like to continue with their musical learning have the option of doing so through the elective choice of music subjects from Years 8-12. It is during these years where they also encounter the technological side of the industry, including the recording and editing of live music.

At the co-curricular level, students have the chance to nurture their performing skills through the many well-established instrumental and vocal ensembles in the School. This allows them to perform various styles of music to live audiences in venues such as our Terence Butler Auditorium and St David's Cathedral, the Federation Concert Hall and the Hobart Town Hall. The ensemble experience teaches team building skills similar to that found on a sports field.

Finally, each student at Hutchins has the opportunity to take on the learning of an instrument in a more serious manner by engaging in private music tuition. Our team of visiting music tutors, who are experienced professionals in the industry, valuably assist this program. They have performed with internationally-acclaimed ensembles such as the Sydney, Melbourne, Adelaide and Tasmanian Symphony Orchestras, Opera Australia and the Rotterdam Philharmonic. On the contemporary side, many of our tutors have performed with such great musicians as James Morrison, Tommy Emmanuel, Olivia Newton-John, Rhonda Burchmore and Tom Burlinson. We are most fortunate to have these musicians on staff and they are ready and waiting to teach all students who are interested in learning.

There is a wealth of research to suggest that learning a musical instrument improves concentration, listening skills (both internal and external), reading and comprehension ability, mathematical perception, co-ordination, time management and the ability to remain relaxed and focussed. It does require a strong commitment to private practise, but it is also a great deal of fun.

If there is a genuine interest in the learning of a musical instrument, I strongly encourage all students at Hutchins to take the opportunity to talk to their parents, fill in an application form, pick up an instrument and learn to play.

Firstly, I thank the visiting music staff for their support of all the curricular and cocurricular programs within the School, along with their dedication to teaching those students who have taken a serious approach to their music through individual music lessons. 

It really put into practise that real learning experiences, with a real purpose, is when true learning flourishes.

This sense of enthusiasm has continued throughout 2011. Students have experienced painting, printmaking, drawing and sculpture units and have had the opportunity to respond in





VOCATIONAL EDUCATION AND TRAINING

The profile of VET at Hutchins received a boost in 2011 with three students attending the state finals of the 2011 Tasmanian Training Awards in August. James Norris (Certificate I in Hospitality), and David O'May (Certificate I in Construction) were finalists in the VET in Schools section and Aaron Zantuck (Certificate III in Agriculture) was a finalist and winner of the school-based trainee section.

While completing Year 12, Aaron worked 1½ days per week on a farming property outside Hobart. He was named 2011 School-based Trainee of the Year and as part of his prize in November attended the Australian Training Awards in Brisbane. This trip included a hectic four-day schedule of professional learning activities, judging panel interviews and networking with other state finalists from a range of industry areas. While Aaron did not take out the national award, he represented the School and the state with credit.

The training awards not only publicly acknowledge the achievements of our students, but the pathway into further training, or employment, that such a qualification provides. Equally as important, the inclusion of Hutchins students in these state awards sends a clear message to the community that Hutchins does provide quality vocational education programs for those who wish to undertake them.

In 2012 Hutchins will have approximately forty-five Year 10, 11 and 12 students participating in VET programs in the areas of Hospitality, Cooking, Maritime, Electro- technology, Construction, Retail and Agriculture. Not all of these programs are delivered at Hutchins – some are with partnership arrangements with other colleges. With some clever timetabling, students are able to pursue their interests in specific industry areas, with a view to beginning their career journey before they finish Year 12.

The program offered by the Marine

School has continued to grow with the addition of Boat Safety courses being run for Year 3 students. Unfortunately, the Royal Australian Navy co-operation programs have been unavailable due to funding cutbacks. It is hoped these can be reinstated soon.

Safe Boating

For the first time all Year 3 students participated in the Marine and Safety Tasmania's Safe Boating program. This consisted of a safety demonstration session at school and a skills session in the Aquatic Centre pool in lifejackets and a boat. The boys saw safety equipment and watched as its use was explained and demonstrated. In the pool they experienced firsthand the advantage of wearing a lifejacket if they were to fall in the water fully clothed.

Marine Science

Year 10 students continued the tide data project and studies in the D'Entrecasteaux Channel. Their snorkelling program was disrupted by frequent poor weather in first term. A highlight was the visit to the Tassal salmon hatchery at Russell Falls, where they tried to catch salmon with their bare hands and followed the process from egg to smolt.

Sail Training

Courses continued in seamanship as well as racing this year. The School is gearing up to offer the new Yachting Australia National Keelboat Scheme. Many students who tried sailing in Year 5 continued their training by taking on the introductory course this year.

Marine Industry Careers

Three Year 10 students, Daniel Feeger, Angus Pitt and Shaun McMillan, took up the opportunity to participate in the Working on Water career pathway program. They spent three days looking at the variety of jobs and careers that are available in and associated with the maritime world.

Mariners' Service

It was good to see an increasing number of Hutchins students participate in this community event. Joined by some Collegiate students, they provided a focal display in the procession of maritime flags.

Sea Voyages

Hutchins students undertook three sea voyages this year on the Windeward Bound. In April, Power of 9 students sailed to Port Davey to meet up with the students walking to Melaleuca. This year the trips to and from the South West experienced some of the weather that is notorious in that part of the coast. In November students participating in the Island Challenge were ferried between islands on the Windeward Bound and four students, Hugh Bell, Oscar Beattie, Darrel Russell and Daniel Feeger - set out up the East Coast on an expedition to the wreck site of the Sydney Cove. This was the first wreck on Australia's coastline after the colony was founded at Sydney Cove. The ship ran aground off Preservation Island in the Furneaux Group in 1793.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION









2011 saw some new introductions to the Outdoor Education program. Our first introduction was a new member of staff. Mr Mark Oates joined us from Victoria and has brought with him a deep knowledge of outdoor pursuits, a great depth of experience and a passion for sharing both with our students.

New introductions in the Junior School program, saw Year 6 students start the year with a three-day leadership and adventure camp held at Roches Beach. In Term 3 we offered a challenging combination of rock climbing and bike education partnered with surfing, orienteering and dance. The Year 5s ventured to Orford and Maria Island and showed they were up to the challenge of a program that used to be for the Year 6s. We also added canoeing and camp fire cooking. In Year 4 we introduced paddling inflatable rafts and walked the track to Mystery Creek Cave. The Year 3 group enjoyed cooking and eating damper, walked to Fishers Point and many camped out under tarps.

In our Middle School program the Year 7 students enjoyed exploring underground



cave spiders and tight squeezes as we reintroduced a caving session. After our action-packed program of biking, walking, kayaking and cooking, students left Southport armed and ready for Year 8. To this program we added sea kayaking on the day we weren't abseiling or hiking around Freycinet National Park.

What was the Year 9 Challenge has become the Power of 9 program. The training camps and expedition components of each P9 block are not only the newest but have become the largest of the outdoor experiences we offer. From the Ironbound Range to Crazy Horse Buttress in Chiang Mai, the decks of the *Windeward Bound* to Alice Springs and Trumpeter Bay, it is a rich journey the Year 9s of 2011 have taken.

In our Senior School program we introduced three layers of neoprene as we experienced canyoning at Cradle Mountain. We also clipped on our snow sliding devices in a new part of Australia, the snow fields of Mt Perisher (NSW). These new experiences were held either side of the iconic Overland Track walk that so many students are keen to tackle. Thanks to Mr Duggan, Mr Oates, Miss Stranger, Mr Tuck, Mr McDougall for their enormous efforts in 2011.

To the leavers of 2011, we first saw you to the top of Bishop and Clerk on Maria Island in 2005 and during the times since we have hoped to awaken a spirit of adventure in you. Take time to reflect on your trips, adventures and fun in the wilderness. Despite completing this journey there are so many more adventures to be had. We wish you well.

POWER OF 9

It is a little difficult to comprehend that the first year of the Power of 9 is over

already. It only seems like yesterday that the first group of students, building toward their Port Davey expedition, arrived at the Marieville Esplanade campus with its bare white internal walls. Now the walls are covered with a display of hundreds of pictures, colourful in variety, activity and landscape.

Four 'waves' of students have rolled through the Marieville Esplanade campus this year, each building towards the pinnacle of their experience, their expedition and taking back to Nelson Road enthusiasm, vigour, maturity and optimism. The journey has been one of encouraging these young men to seize the opportunity to learn and grow; to understand themselves and each other in order to make their passage through the senior years more focussed, relevant and real.

We had high expectations for this year and can say with pride that these expectations have been met. The plan for the year was optimistic in the variety and magnitude of activities and tasks planned, and it has been truly gratifying that all of the activities have been completed, with others added along the way.

Our students have, while undergoing their Spirituality unit with Rev Matt Gray, visited the operational Ron Barwick Minimum Security Prison at Risdon, and have had face-to-face meetings with current inmates. We have covered the distance from Southport to Hobart, approximately 100km, under our own steam in two days. We have swum ashore onto a mystery island from a boat and arrived home two weeks later. We have taken these young men to exotic locations, from remote islands, pristine



South West Tasmania, the mountain jungles of Northern Thailand to the red centre of Australia. The students have also experienced cultures as diverse and rich as our own indigenous culture through to the unique Thai hill tribes and Buddhist monks.

The four groups of students this year travelled to different destinations for the expeditions, and experienced different cultures and activities; however there was so much common ground in what they experienced and learned.

Port Davey Challenge

Twenty four students set out to spend twelve days journeying to remote south-western Tasmania and back. The South Coast track is world-renowned for its challenge and beauty, and this seven-day journey was accompanied by five days aboard the square rigged sail training vessel Windeward Bound, to complete their round trip of 400km. During this time, students came to appreciate the benefits and importance of self discipline, planning, teamwork and perseverance. Highs such as experiencing dolphins playing in the bow wave of the ship, coupled with lows such as dealing with knee deep mud for, at times, hours on end, culminated in the sense of achievement of knowing they had completed one of the world's most spectacular wilderness experiences.





Global Challenge

Journeying to the Chiang Mai area of north-western Thailand, our students experienced a new appreciation of their own culture, through experiencing one vastly different. We experienced the thrills of jungle trekking to remote hill tribes, white-water rafting, flying through the rainforest canopy on a zip-line, and seeing gibbons in the wild. This was tempered by experiencing how happy people can be when they have a lot less in the way of material possessions and technology than we are used to. It was particularly rewarding to spend two days working at a local school in tropical heat and sweating humidity to mix and pour concrete by hand, 25 x 18m, as an assembly and play area. Before we knew it, the day had arrived to venture home, and the hustle and bustle of the shopping plaza near Chiang Mai airport featured the first EFTPOS machine that any of us had seen in two weeks.



Central Australia Challenge

The Yipirinya School in Alice Springs is guite unique in that it embraces traditional Australian indigenous languages and culture as well as English, in its 'Teaching Two Ways' methodology. Our students experienced the breathtaking, stark beauty of Central Australia, and gained an appreciation of the mastery and connection that traditional Australian people have with their land, as well as the difficulties and adversity facing people who live in traditional ways in camps on the cusp of two communities. The highlights included staying with traditional owners at Watarrka, eating kangaroo cooked in coals, making spears and embracing the rich culture and knowledge that our indigenous people have carried with them for many millennia.

Island Challenge

Students arrived for the first day of their two-week expedition with a sleeping bag, raincoat, eating utensils and one change of clothes in a garbage bag, and the knowledge that they were to return two weeks later, and nothing else certain. They spent time on Maria and Bruny Islands, travelling between the two on Windeward Bound. Frequent questions and perceived need for information and certainty soon gave way to acceptance and perseverance. Each day saw them faced with group and individual challenges. The attitude and grace with which students responded to having limited equipment and basic foodstuffs, and ever-changing plans, distilled into an acceptance and understanding that they

would encounter much greater diversity later in life, and that the manner in which one deals with this has a large role in shaping one's future.

A program such as this can only work with the support of those involved. We would like to acknowledge the Headmaster, Mr Warwick Dean, whose leadership, vision and passion for the Power of 9 created the opportunity for change. Also, the School Board, for supporting such a departure in the traditional Year 9 curriculum. Mr Peter Symons deserves special mention as he has created a curriculum framework which can integrate the off-campus learning with the broader school curriculum objectives and at the same time be compatible with the Australian Curriculum requirements. Faculty Heads have also created new and exciting units and Year 9 electives to create connections and pathways for our students. The Marieville Esplanade curriculum has emerged as a new way of looking at teaching and learning. Thank you to all staff who have delivered these vibrant and dynamic units.

The expeditions were highlights of the year and were only possible due to our committed and experienced staff. Special mention must be made of Mr Duncan Warlters, who helped co-ordinate the Central Australia Challenge, Mr Peter Symons, who co-ordinates the Global Challenge and to our fantastic Outdoor Education staff – Mr Todd Blackhall, Mr Mark Oates and Mr Ben Duggan – who have been instrumental in expedition logistics and delivery. We would like to thank the Year 9 parents who have supported a very different school experience. Their ongoing enthusiasm, flexibility and willingness to be involved have been a highlight. Finally, thank you to the young men who have embraced the challenge to grow, learn and make the most of the opportunities that the Power of 9 has presented them with. I hope that the positives from the year continue to inspire them to be their best and make the most of the opportunities ahead.

We greatly look forward to 2012, and are confident that we will achieve similar life changing experiences for our next group of young men in Power of 9.

Libraries – One Common Goal

All three libraries at The Hutchins School – the ELC Library, the Stephens Library and the Nettlefold in the Library Learning Centre – have one common goal: to be an *i*Centre of learning. Supporting inquiry learning in the early years, the library learning spaces grow too, from a physical space to a virtual instructional zone, within and beyond school to provide a research environment for students, with the digital shift to be open and online 24/7.

Students can now download ebooks, audiobooks, videos and music for personalised learning. The Hutchins School Digital Library, (hutchins.lib. overdrive.com), using the world-class OverDrive service, went live in July. The service is an important part of the library's contribution to the School's vision to be a 'school of the future in using 21st century tools and eLearning strategies to engage and empower all students, staff and its wider community'. OverDrive delivers a 24/7 service for the whole school community and allows students, staff and parents who do not have easy access to public library services or are off campus to use the service. The use of ereaders is explained in full on the OverDrive site (www. overdrive.com.au), and on the 'Hutchins Central' Intranet website

In late 2011, work commenced on installing the self-service loan system in the Stephens Library, similar to that in the Nettlefold Library, specifically with the installation of the radio frequency (RFID) tags into resources. This service in the Nettlefold Library is popular as it allows instant borrowing of many resources at one time. Work has commenced in the ELC Library with plans to complete the RFID conversion for all library services K-8 by the end of 2012.

The libraries' online catalogue (OPAC) at the following Internet address info. hutchins.tas.edu.au/amlibweb/ is proving useful for all library users to search, research or renew loans, and enjoy the Amazon-type experience of the front book cover images in the process. All libraries face the challenge to make sure that the resources are available to students when and wherever they are doing their work – at school or home. One important online service at home is *Clickview2* (online.clickview.com.au) whereby students can stream thousands of curriculum support video programs. Another service is the UTAS *StepUp* program for Years 11-12 students to use the UTAS Library and its online resources.

Locally, the intranet pages are continually being updated with tips for developing good research skills, age-appropriate search engines and reference resources. They also provide access to book review sites to assist reading choices. This year has also seen the development of *Library 2.0* a library blog for classroom teachers across the whole school. The role of teacher librarians is to work with classroom teachers to promote a love of reading and develop an information literate school community. A blog provides a collaborative space where teacher librarians share great resources that teachers may want to incorporate into their lessons.

Continued participation in the *Premier's Reading Challenge* involved students from Prep to Year 6 reading a range of books to complete their goal of ten books in ten weeks. The aim of this challenge is to encourage the students to broaden their reading choices and for families to share in the reading experience with their children. It also helps to promote the importance of literacy and reading as an essential life skill.

Another celebration of literature also took place in May with students from Kindergarten to Year 2 gathering in the

Auditorium to share the wonderful book *Feathers for Phoebe* by Rod Clement. The theme of self-acceptance that is explored in this book is an important one for all of the students and through gentle humour there is a celebration of individual differences.

Weekly library lessons are about interdisciplinary teaching. Lessons for the ELC have focussed on encouraging an enjoyment of reading and literature. Junior School lessons have seen an emphasis on cybersafety, with students learning about the types of information it is okay to share online and how to keep themselves safe in various online environments. Dr Jill Abell and Mrs Kate Reid also conducted *Cybersafety* information evening sessions for parents and students covering these important issues. Other topics of study have included visual literacy, copyright and plagiarism, and research skills across all subject areas. Via Skype on the SMARTBoard, some students in Year 8 participated in a virtual author visit with Doug Macleod, CBCA Book Week winner (The Life of a Teenage Body-Snatcher, Viking Books, Penguin Group).

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

ICT and eLearning: connectivity, collaboration and community

The sixth driver of the School's Strategic Plan is that 'information and communications technology will be the enabler of our strategy'. The vision is that the School is a 'school of the future in using 21st century tools and eLearning strategies to engage and empower all students, staff and wider community'. A Co-ordinator of eLearning – Mr Kent Moore – was appointed to lead the e-learning team who have identified ICT as their major focus.

The School's external website provides continual evidence of online collaborative learning communities in the School with the enhancement of areas such as latest news by Ms Sarah Caddick, Marketing and Public Relations Manager as well as coming events through Ms Jenna Vance, Events and Relations Manager. Ms Katie Richardson, Librarian/Digital Rights Management provides careful review and updating of the entire website as well as custodian and online publication of the *Hutchins Communiqué*.

Improved ICT infrastructure including 'voice over Internet telephony' and particularly Wi-Fi connectivity across the School have been two highlights of several priorities for smooth implementation this year by the Information Technology Manager, Mr lan MacRae. Computer Systems Officer, Mr Matt Ralph led the applications management for many initiatives such as steering the students' email and document storage being migrated to cloud computing or the support of Internet capable portable devices. Computer Technician, Mr Patrick Moore, orchestrated computer support, software testing, and the helpdesk as the first line of help for students.

In 2011, the Student IT Leader team comprised George Duckett (Chairman of the Student IT Leader Committee), Andreas Souvleris, Andrew Flett, Andrew Mackay, Benjamin Robinson, Buddhaholy Siu, Campbell Whiteley, Daniel Feeger, David Lord, Dominic Prazak, Donald Holloway, Fergus Richardson, Gregory Graham, Henry Garrett, James Lelong, James Thompson, Jesse Usoalii, John Pereira, Jonathan Boadle [Library Leader], Lewis Nettlefold [Library Leader], Nicholas de Lacey, Oliver Mathot-Dewis, Ryan Ward and Timothy Craig. These students led many initiatives and provided immense feedback to the IT Team of Dr Jill Abell, Mr Ian MacRae, Mr Matt Ralph and Mr Patrick Moore. The student team ensured they had a presence at IT events, such as the Cybersafety Parent Information Evening or manning the Internet Café at a national conference for eLearning. Several events were squeezed into the year with Mr Kent Moore's generous and exacting organisational skill, including the fatherand-son 'build your own PC workshop' and two LAN gatherings.

The Commonwealth Government's Digital Education Revolution program funding for the implementation of a 1:1 student/computer ratio in the Senior School enabled the provision of a takehome netbook for Year 9s in addition to students' own purchase of an iPod Touch for mobile and personalised learning in the Power of 9 program. Students' ownership of Internet capable devices has meant that BYOD can be welcome and used to enhance learning experiences at school across the year groups. The Early Learning Centre and the John Bednall Centre for Learning Support have been trialling the use of iPads.

Telepresence using high definition video conferencing to link face-to-face with researchers in the field, or cultural and scientific experts and educators provided new opportunities to excite student learning and enrich existing curricula on weekly occasions to 'think global and act local'. Memorable link ups occurred for Mrs Sue Bullen's Year 6 with world-class schools on curriculum areas, such as DeforestACTION. Polycom's education team facilitated many unique and interactive lessons with experts like Professor Adrian Walters, Head of ANU's School of Music with our pre-tertiary Music class, an audio and video engineer who works with worldclass performers and a comic book writer and legend. Polycom hosted a connection with Hans Schlegel, a German and NASA Johnson Space Station Astronaut in the 90s. Students explored the impact of illegal file sharing which devalues society's support to music creators. Questacon introduced a Year 9 Science class online to Australia's latest Nobel Laureate. Professor Brian Schmidt.

In a first for any Australian school, the Hutchins Organiser application was launched from the School's network and the Apple App store. It provides ready access to students' personal timetables. reminders, own diary notes and a range of information sites on the intranet for requirements with work assigned, homework tasks or special school calendar dates. The mobile connection portal allows teachers and Mentors to send notices, reminders and updates and they can quickly identify unread notes. The eLearning team teachers, Mr Kent Moore, Mr James Seddon and Mr Brett Smith created a range of equally innovative iOS and Android apps for curriculum areas and beyond. The Coast Data app provides an avenue for students with a wealth of information when doing foreshore excursions and coastal studies. Students are able to export their data to import it into a spreadsheet back at school for analysis.

At the end of the year, work began for staff on utilising a virtual learning environment, Pearson's Fronter for students' online learning and teachers' access to a learning management system, digital content, reporting and assessment as well as access to shared state and national professional learning resources.

Mr David Gilkes is taking a year off to pursue his Masters in Early Childhood Education and to do some overseas travelling with his wife.

What achievements have we celebrated this year?

There have been many moments that we have celebrated. We have had strong NAPLAN results in all areas and numerous sporting successes at a school and interschool level. Our Year 4s came first in Tasmania for their Wakakirri performance and there have been many individual firsts or gold medals in a variety of academic and cultural pursuits. Within the community we have had our Kindergarten students advising the Lord Mayor on their plans for Hobart as well as our Environmental Leaders working with the University on a climate change trail. Our Charity Group also did a marvellous job in organising the Lap it Up afternoon where all of our students managed to raise over \$8,500 for various charities. Our Year 6 students also led the Junior School in a Get Active Program three days a week. Our revamped Homework Challenge Program has also been most successful as it celebrates the uniqueness of the individual as well as enabling the students to engage with family and community in a range of challenges and service activities.

We know that in life the small and humble achievements are often overlooked. Instead the media often promote celebrities such as Paris Hilton or the Kardashians who are famous merely for being famous but who appear to have achieved or contributed very little. Here at Hutchins, we know that it is just as important if not more important to celebrate the deeper more subtle achievements, such as the two boys who helped injured fellow competitors in the recent triathlon race, thus forfeiting their own 'winning positions' or the boy who quietly donated all his own pocket money to the Fred Hollows Foundation. This is what we celebrate – boys with character and substance.

Above all we need to encourage our boys to celebrate life, to be full of hope and optimism, to be good finders, to see the good in themselves, in others and in all situations of life.

There is an American father and son team, 'Team Hoyt,' who do just that. Rick Hoyt was diagnosed with cerebral palsy at birth. He was unable to walk and speak and his parents were told that Rick would be a vegetable and should be institutionalised. Rick's parents were good finders. They sought to find their son's uniqueness even though he was trapped inside a severely disabled body. They fitted Rick with a computer that enabled him to communicate. Rick grew up engaging with the world fearlessly and despite his own disadvantages he eventually went on to graduate from university with a degree in Special Education.

Rick grew up not only reaching his potential intellectually and physically but he had enormous compassion. When Rick was only 15 he wanted to participate in a charity fun run for a local lacrosse player who was paralysed in an accident. So in 1977 Rick and his father Dick participated in their first triathlon event. In the ironman triathlon event Dick pulled Rick for a 4km swim, pedalled him on a 180km bike ride and pushed him on a 42 km marathon.



Dick is now 70 and Rick is nearly 50 and together they have participated in over 1000 events and they are still competing! They have their own charity, the Hoyt Foundation, which encourages young disabled people to be active individuals and to follow their passions.

The students in the Junior School have certainly been very busy this year representing Hutchins in a wide variety of sports and activities.

We commenced our year with our annual Swimming Carnival at the Hobart Aquatic Centre. Record breaking performances on the day by the Stephens Year 6 medley relay team: Thomas Young, Thomas Dunbabin, Tom McTye and Willliam Clerk; Mitchell Rickards in the Year 5 50m breaststroke and butterfly, Patrick Betts in the Year 5 25m butterfly, Sajiv Rao in the Year 4 50m butterfly, Axel Moore in the Year 3 50m butterfly and Nicholas Westenberg in the Year 3 25m backstroke, set the scene for what was a fantastic day. When the points were tallied up Buckland were victorious followed closely by Stephens, School and Thorold. From the performances at this carnival a team was selected to represent Hutchins at the JSSATIS carnival.

Our Cross Country Carnival was not held this year due to heavy rain. The disappointment of missing this day did not dampen enthusiasm for selection trials for the Junior School Cross Country Team, with large numbers of students trying out from all year levels. The selected team competed in two events this year: the Tasmanian All Schools Cross Country at Symmons Plains and the JSSATIS Cross Country at Rokeby. Outstanding performances at Symmons Plains included; Christopher Law finishing in first place in the 9 year old boys, Torin Jones finishing first in the 10 year old boys and Owen Law finishing second in the 12 year old boys. These performances earned Torin and Owen a place in the Tasmanian team which competed in the National Championships in Canberra. They were joined in the team by Oscar Chau who finished in fifth place in the 10 year old boys event

at Symmons Plains. Our students put in another superb effort at the JSSATIS event with Hutchins featuring in the top finishers in all age groups. Special mention to Owen Law [1st] and Wilbur Lawrence [4th] in the Year 6 event; Torin Jones [1st], Spencer Reid [2nd] and Samuel Kokkoris [3rd] in Year 4; Christopher Law [1st] and Axel Moore [4th] in Year 3.

Poor weather also hampered our winter sport season with many games called off. Our boys still got in and gave it their all and it was pleasing to see many great individual and team performances on the soccer pitch, football field, water polo pool, basketball court, table tennis table and hockey pitch each week. A huge thank you to all of our volunteer coaches and team managers; without your time and effort we would not be able to provide this opportunity to our boys.

Luckily the sun was shining for our Athletics Carnival and we were more concerned about getting sunburnt than jumping puddles. Record breakers were Miles McTaggart in the Year 4 high jump and Torin Jones in the Year 4 800m. The final results saw School triumphant with Stephens, Buckland and Thorold not far behind. A very competitive team was selected to represent Hutchins at the JSSATIS Athletics Carnival and they lived up to expectations with some fantastic performances, highlights being record breaking performances by Owen Law in the 1500m and Torin Jones in the Year 4 400m and 800m.

Term 3 saw our boys back in action in our summer sport program. Boys have bushwalked, played cricket and touch football with teams from other schools, prepared for triathlons, been given an introduction to rowing, played t-ball, softball, tennis and touch.

Our boys have been busy and have certainly been active, doing their best to have a go at things and find ways to make being physically active a part of their lives. Three perfect examples of this can be found in; our boy's involvement in the Schools Triathlon Challenge, where 113 boys represented Hutchins; the introduction of the Get Active – Daily Physical Activity Program, where Year 6 boys lead classes in physical activities and games at the start of the day; and the successful introduction of Move Well, Eat Well – 'Part Way's OK' walking to school program. They will all be back next year, perhaps even bigger and better!



Lap it up



YEAR 6

Habits of Mind

This year in Year 6 we have been focusing on an area of leadership called the Habits of Mind. All sixteen of the Habits of Mind consist of strategies we use in our daily lives and help us in our lifelong learning. The sixteen habits of mind are: Taking responsible risks, Communicating with clarity and precision, Managing your impulsivity, Persisting, Questioning and problem solving, Applying past knowledge to new situations, Listening with empathy and understanding, Thinking about your thinking (metacognition), Finding humour, Creating imagining and innovating, Thinking interdependently, Thinking flexibly, Responding with wonderment and awe, Gathering data with all senses, Remaining open to continuous learning.

Some examples were evident in the following activities: Great 'persistence' was shown by those students who climbed to the top in our rock climbing activity. Students were 'Thinking interdependently' when working in groups during our leadership camp. 'Responsible risks' were taken throughout the year by students demonstrating their talents in front of their peers and to a wider audience. Many other Habits of Mind were demonstrated and we congratulate all Year 6s on their excellent efforts.

The Habits of Mind can be applied to almost any situation. There is no order of importance, as the qualities required in different situations will vary.

Canberra/Melbourne Trip

On 18 April, 2011, Year 6 met at Hobart Airport for a 6am departure for Melbourne. We were heading for Canberra! When we arrived in Melbourne, we boarded a bus and made our way to Ballarat, ready for our visit to Sovereign Hill. Most of the day was spent there before we hopped back on the bus and travelled back to Melbourne Airport. It was time for another plane trip, this time to our final destination, Canberra. The plane landed quite late at night. We were all very tired after a hard day. On the way to our destination we stopped and collected our dinner for the night before travelling the rest of the way to our accommodation, which was actually in NSW. After arrival at the accommodation, we had dinner and settled into our dorms for the night. We were up early the next morning ready for the day ahead of us. The next few days passed in a blur, a nonstop frenzy of visiting the local sites. We went to both Parliament Houses, the War Memorial, the National Art Gallery, shopping at Canberra Centre, a bike ride around Lake Burley Griffin, swimming at the AIS and spectacular mountain views atop Mt Ainslie, with souvenir collecting along the way. Everyone was ready to return home by the end as we had crammed a lot into four days. The plane touched down in Tassie late at night, and we were all extremely tired. Everyone enjoyed being away, and the whole trip was a magnificent experience!

Get Active

Get Active is a daily physical education program that started in Term 2. It was to improve leadership and maturity in Year 6 students as well as to improve the fitness and health of the whole Junior School. Three mornings a week we organised a range of games and activities such as aerobics, interval training, yoga and cross country as well as games like dodge ball, octopus and











relays. The activities were taken by a group of two or three Year 6 leaders. Over the terms, we have learnt how to run and participate in all these activities more efficiently. When we came close to the cross country and athletics we concentrated on certain attributes of running, jumping and throwing. Overall, we think everyone enjoyed this year's Get Active program, and we hope that the Year 6s next year, will enjoy running Get Active as much as we did.

Environmental Leaders

The Environmental Program has radically changed. Six dedicated boys, under the tuition of Ms Knight, who was always there if we needed help, banded together to come up with plans to make our school more sustainable.

We started off with a visit to the tip. Our aim: to reduce waste in our school. We focussed particularly on paper waste, because re-using is better than recycling. And then along came the Climate Change Trail. We teamed up with the University of Tasmania to create a trail that will showcase how climate change is affecting our everyday lives. We interviewed world-class climate and environmental scientists. These interviews were filmed, and will hopefully be compiled into an interactive iOS application. We then attended the Kids4Kids conference where we led Snug Primary School and Margate Primary along our trail. At certain spots there were scientists talking about the spot and its climate change significance.

Overall, 2011 has been a great year for the dedicated environmental leaders.

ICT Leaders

Our other tasks consisted of things like managing the tech box in assemblies, with leaders handing audio, slide shows/ videos and lights, tending to general maintenance, as well as just helping classes, teachers and students when they require it.

Other than JAFFA, the chapel services were also great fun. We had to get to chapel early so we could get everything prepared: writing prayers, practising readings and running the PowerPoint. People who wrote the prayers sometimes had assistance from the helpful hands of Mrs Hasenkam.

Letter from a sailor accompanying Abel Tasman in November, 1642.

Dear Mother and Father,

Today is Monday, 24th November and we have sighted land! Hibbs was in the crow's nest and was climbing down through the futtock shrouds when he sighted a land of rolling sand dunes leading up to the purple hills. There were mountains in the distance and some were capped in snow even though it is summer here.

We've had an eventful last few weeks. The sea was very rough a couple of days ago and we had to lie a-hull for two days. The storm was inspiring, the waves were massive; some must have been fifty feet high! The air was filled with flying spray and the wind shrieked through the rigging.

After sighting land (we called it Point Hibbs) we sailed for a day in lovely weather. The huge cliffs were incredible and there were sea birds all around the Zeehaen. On Thursday 27th we dropped anchor in a pristine bay. We rowed ashore and heard strange voices through the trees. We returned to the ship feeling very nervous.

We made a map of the area and, before we sailed, the carpenter swam ashore and planted the flag. At this moment we are heading east towards new lands.

Diary of a Free Settler at Risdon Cove, 1803

September 17th, 1803

5 days ago the Albion arrived with the rest of the supplies and crew, including Bowen. He instructed us to land the livestock by lashing two boats together. The shore was muddy and it was difficult to land. Pigs kept getting stuck in the mud and I was told to help.

On the 13th and 14th the stores were landed from the ships. The next few days were spent building and clearing the landscape. Just today, heavy rain fell turning the shore into a bog.

September 29th

The last ship has just left. Even with all of the other people here I cannot help but feel alone. If something were to happen we would be left here to die.

October 15th

Senior School Speech and Performance was inspiring and entertaining this year. Timothy McQueen won the Intermediate Poetry Prize for reciting Peter Porter's 'Mort aux Chats' and Matt Young won the Senior Poetry Prize for his haunting performance of Philip Larkin's 'Aubade'.

Frank Burridge distinguished himself by winning the prize for the best speech in consecutive years when he delivered an insight into the choices, emotions and values woven into 'The Fabric of Life'. He commended to us the 'integrity', 'reliability' and 'compassion' of fabrics such as denim and wool. He even extolled the 'tolerance' of lycra. He warned us about 'whimsical' chiffons, 'cheap and accessible' polyesters, as well as the 'liar', acrylic. Appropriately, he concluded by giving us an eloquent perspective on a big topic:

Every fabric of life is made up of the boundless possibilities of the warp of experience and the weft of emotions – the weave – and the cut and seams of the choices we make resulting in the final shape of your fabric – your life.

Writing

Winners in the Hutchins Poetry Competition were Matthew Behrens for *The Dark Storm*; Taylor Lidstone for *Love's Imprisonment*; and Benjamin Armstrong for *Under Black Bluff*, which was also Highly Commended by the judges of the Dorothea Mackellar Poetry Competition. Benjamin also



won the senior section of the Hutchins Short Story Competition. He used George Bush's term for Al Qaeda, 'The Evil Ones', as the title of his story to interrogate the American military presence in Afghanistan from the perspective of a young man living in the foothills of mountains in the north of the country.

The consistently strong enrolments in pre-tertiary English Writing classes

means that Hutchins students embrace the opportunity to develop themselves as writers throughout their time at school. Judging the speaking and writing competitions and prizes is a difficult, but very rewarding job, especially as it offers the teachers on adjudication panels and members of the audiences an insight into what *moves* our students. Hearing them tell their stories and give their feelings and expression is a privilege and

a delight. Alec Shea is this year's winner of the prize for Outstanding Literary Achievement. His poem, Trapped Inside Her Camera is an intuitively captured snapshot of life.










From the Head of House


indicators, not determinants, of a healthy house with happy participants.

Athletics

The Athletics season for Hutchins started off with huge success. This was apparent in the Southern SATIS in early October, with the School having a clean sweep, taking out the Boys Junior and Senior division, along with the Aggregate Shield. There were many outstanding performances across all age groups. In the very first race of the meet, Charles Haward placed first and Henry West third in the Open 3000 metres. This set the tone for the rest of the day. The calibre of the performances set by the junior age groups showcased incredible potential for Hutchins athletics.

Russel Taib in the U13 boys set the track alight in both the 100m and 200m with two very convincing wins. Caleb Berriman, Thomas Sonneveld, Patrick Lickiss and James Sonneveld secured the win in the U14 4x100m relay. In U15, the two power houses – Jesse Usoalii and Thomas Farmer – both had wins in the 100m/200m events along with Benjamin Robinson in the 1500m.

In the senior age groups, some of the highlight performances went to: Edward Burrows-Cheng in the 100m Hurdles, Matt Young in the high jump in the U16 age group and Rory Middleton in the Open Boys Shot Put.

The State Independent Schools Carnival took place at the Domain Athletics Centre a week later. A saturated track did not affect acceptable performances. The boys U15 team continued to impress, including their two second win in the 4x100m (Hamish Reeve, Nicholas Graver, Thomas Farmer and Jesse Usoalii). Once again, Russel Taib was the stand out performer, by winning all of his sprinting events (100m/200m/4x100m relay).

In the State School Knockouts Hutchins excelled, with all age groups performing exceptionally well. They placed first, providing the School with the opportunity to compete in the National Schools Knockout Final, held in Brisbane.

This was the first year that all three age groups represented Hutchins at a national knockout. Even though conditions did not accommodate the athletes, many performances were again memorable. Charles Haward's final run in the 1500m for Hutchins left him with a personal best wearing magenta and black for the last time. George Gavalas stormed down the track in the 100m. Thomas Whitton endured the pain in the 400m and climbed up the places in the final 100m to fourth and Alec Simpson cleared 180cm in the high jump. All relays showed great teamwork, with the Junior 4x200m Relay team placing first with the prodigy Russel Taib anchoring the team to victory. The senior age group in the Medley Relay placed a very comfortable third with the anchor leg being Ross Welling. In the intermediate boys, a good lasting effort by Hutchins 400m runner Brendan Hay cleared a path by placing his team in second place. The relay secured the national knockouts title for the Intermediate Boys team. Even

though none of the intermediate athletes placed first in their events, it showed that consistency was the key.

These exceptional performances across all age groups would not have been possible without the teachers' knowledge and commitment. Special thanks to Mr Adrian Finch and Mr Michael Conacher for their continued dedication and commitment to Hutchins Athletics. The Hutchins teams also extend their thanks to Mr Wayne Brown. On a personal note, I would like to thank the teachers and all the athletes in the Hutchins team for being so co-operative and supportive.

First and Second XVIII Australian Rules Football

To coin a cliché the season of 2011 was always going to be a 'rebuilding phase' for the Hutchins First and Second XVIII. After two highly successful previous years where we were the reigning state premiers in both divisions, the reality was that 2011 was going to be tougher. Sixteen of our 2010 First XVIII premiership players had moved on and over half of our 2010 Second XVIII had done the same. This left us with a core group of highly dedicated, committed and focussed young men. If our measure of success this year was in maintaining and nuturing the passionate culture of Hutchins pride, then these young men certainly made the grade. Particular mention must be made early to the leadership group of Bradley Tilbury (Captain), George Gavalas and Alexander Hay (Co Vice-Captains) who were instrumental in encouraging many of our younger, less experienced players .

Our other goals this year were to be competitive through supreme fitness and strength where we may have been outdone on size and experience. We certainly achieved the high levels of fitness and strength required and we still managed to play above our size and experience. We underwent a rigorous pre-season training through sprints, fartlek and endurance running in and amongst our skills and drills. The core group of more experienced players also engaged in additional weights and running sessions with Coach Mr Josh Hanek.

With lots of 13 point margins throughout the season, for those of us who are superstitious this was an ominous sign for our luck. Our first game of the season was a trip to Launceston to play St Patrick's College and although we were fully prepared in terms of our fitness and strength we were underprepared for the final result. St Patrick's College smashed us by 129 points and were far superior on the day. Similarly in the Seconds we had a bench of one and a half dozen first time players. We were a group of young and inexperienced players playing above their potential. It was all about restoring pride and being competitive and that is exactly what we did for the rest of the season.

Another drubbing of 50 points a week later by Scotch Oakburn College was another telling sign that we were well below par. Yet the Seconds recorded their first win of the season. The following week we had numbers and players back to full strength and we turned the season around and showed the potential that we have to come through over the next few years. The Hutchins First XVIII beat Launceston Church Grammar School by 70 points and the Second XVIII won 22-21-153 to 1-3-9.

A week later we played a newcomer to the competition in the Launceston Football Rookie Colts Team at the WMO running out winners by 53 points while the Magoos had a midweek game under lights at Brighton versus St Patrick's College Thirds team where we went down fighting by only 30 points. This was followed by a return away game against Scotch Oakburn College where the First XVIII closed the gap between the two teams by a half. The Seconds recorded their second win to post a solidly improved 34 point win.

In the next round we erased any memories of our start to the season when we again played St Patrick's College. We lost by just 11 points. The Seconds played a similar role in also going down narrowly by 13 points. The next week in Launceston against Launceston Church Grammar School the First XVIII dispatched the opposition by 13 points and the Second XVIII came home in a canter by 56 points. Following this the First XVIII lost narrowly to a combination of Launceston Football Club Rookie Colts and Reserves Players by 13 points and a depleted Second XVIII of only 17 players went down to St Patrick's College Thirds by 130 points. Regardless of the two last results both the First and Second XVIII Hutchins Football Teams had still qualified for the finals.

One of Ron Barassi's favourite quotes is 'Luck is what you have left over after you give 100%'. In the semi-final we played our best footy of the year and gave 100% but unfortunately the luck did not run our way all day. We fought out a gallant







battle with Scotch Oakburn College to go down narrowly by 28 points. The Seconds saw a similar luckless result whereby they were 9 points down at three quarter time only to run out of legs and have St Patrick's College win by 42 points. Although we were disappointed in both grades with the result no one could question our hardness or our heart.

Many thanks go to our Seconds Coach Mike Hunnibell, Assistant Coaches Adrian Finch and Chris Rae, our dedicated Trainer Ross Nichols, Midfield Advisor Stephen Hay, Match Day Managers Wayne Brown, Mike Conacher and Paul Heerey, Runner Dan Luck and of course the Mums – who tirelessly toiled in the Pavilion to ensure we were well looked after – Katina Gavalas, Ray Hay and Caroline McCreary. Thank you all for a great season and remember the greatest pride you will play with is the pride of your peers particularly in the Pride of Hutchins Lions.

Cycling



In 2011, the Cycling Program successfully brought new students into the sport while furthering the success of those who were prepared to enter the fray of competition.

During the gruelling Kellevie eight hour endurance MTB race, competitors and spectators alike bore witness to the steely resolve of Year 10s, Connor Dobie, Kaelan Durbin, William Stephenson and William White. The boys' teams raced against 300 other competitors on a treacherous and often morale-destroying course. Battling mechanical and physical adversity, all Hutchins riders completed the eight hours. Events such as this often take weeks to recover from, so the boys deserve full respect for preparing and participating!

A crowd of 5000 spectators gathered in Launceston for the Stan Seijka Classic Criterium. Criterium racing is a spectacular, fast paced and often dangerous form of road racing that is typically held on a closed-loop circuit on city streets. In this particular edition, cyclists and spectators encountered torrential downpours throughout the event. In a brave display of riding, Hutchins Year 9 student Gerald Evans marshalled his bike handling skills and rapidly developing power to win the hotly contested U17 category race. Typically, the race was somewhat marred by a high speed crash brought on by desperation towards the end of the race: It really started to bunch up on the second-to-last corner, I went wide and there was a pileup behind me,' said Gerald at the finish, after putting several bike lengths into his main rivals who had also managed to thread their way through the pile of bikes and bodies to stay upright.

Gerald entered the race during the base phase of his training, and therefore had to approach the race accordingly. Gerald's consistent training in treacherous weather provided him with bike handling skills that gave him confidence on race day. Gerald combined these attributes to take the win. A member of the Cycling Australia, Tasmanian Development Program, Gerald will be competing in regional and national track and road cycling events in 2012.

In their last week of school, a selection of the new generation of Hutchins



cyclists, Year 7s Matthew Behrens, Angus Hine and Hamish Taylor, tackled the olympic format cross country mountain biking course held at the Tolosa MTB park. Racing upon a course that has been described as among the most challenging in the country, it having challenged olympic and national representatives, the boys were successful in completing their specified race distances in what was their first ever mountain bike race.

The Hutchins First VIII went back-to-back taking out the U19 Men's Eight and 2nd in the prestigious Schoolboys Eight race. Sam Heron won the Men's U19 Single Scull and Nicholas Edwards won gold and silver coxing the Tasmanian Lightweight Eight and Men's Senior Coxed Four. At the Head of the River the First VIII took out the major race of the day, finishing ahead of Scotch Oakburn College by a comfortable three lengths, extending the Hutchins reign of the Golden Fleece Cup another year. The depth of this age group was shown with six boys from the Second VIII travelling to the nationals, finishing a close fourth in the U19 Coxed Four and being competitive in a number of other events.

The Hutchins School Boat Club really dominated in both the state and national competitions. With the success achieved throughout all the age groups it has provided the proof necessary for Hutchins to be seen as the most successful school in rowing in the country. It is a real credit to all the coaches, supporters, parents and of course the boys for the effort and early hours endured in order to be the successful club that we have become. With strong youth coming through the underage it is providing a strong foundation for success in the years to come.
