
The three pictures show student artists, each with a piece of work completed during studies in pretertiary Art this year.




The Hutchins School

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Editorial



tutchins is so often said to be an experience, not just an education. Admittedly, it is easy to be sceptical about this statement. Indeed, one must be familiar with the school to fully appreciate the extent of its influence on the development of character. The school has a reputation to be proud of because Hutchins focuses firmly upon the underpinnings of character: the tree, not the shadow.

During our first days at Hutchins the Headmaster of the time, Mr John Bednall, emphasised the importance of honour, dignity, integrity and compassion to develop character. At the time, in playground discussion, we did not examine the virtues of these concepts; yet we are now convinced that these words echoed in our subconscious minds, and provided a stable guide throughout our developing years.

Hutchins has been the ideal ground upon which to develop and strengthen character. To begin with, we are provided with excellent role models - the staff. They have made a strong impact on students, through humour, discipline, philosophies, or personal experiences. Furthermore, our current Headmaster, Mr Bill Toppin, has given the school a fresh direction and new insights. Those of us who have been able to experience the eras of two Headmasters can be truly grateful for the different styles in leadership.

Hutchins students are encouraged to become involved in as many aspects of school life as possible. A school can only be as good as its students and the effect of their contributions is immeasurable. A Hutchins student stands to gain everything he puts in and more, but he has to be willing to 'get involved and do his best,' to use the words of the Deputy Headmaster, Mr David Brammall.

While the school provides many opportunities for students to develop a breadth of experience, further involvement in the wider community is encouraged. As two of the Hutchins delegates at the Youth Parliament this year we had the opportunity not only to extend our understanding of community issues but to meet a variety of people, ranging from fellow students to political leaders. It was an unmatched learning experience for us, and one that not only enhanced our awareness in so many areas but also opened our minds to new ideas.

We must be careful not to be satisfied in seeking a comfortably sheltered existence. Although we can learn much from our teachers and our parents, we also need to experience things for ourselves. Remembering Lincoln's words, we must put emphasis on growing the tree, not the shadow. Reputation can be easily changed, but a broad range of opportunities must be made available and seized, if the goal of building character is to be achieved.

Life at Hutchins is an all-encompassing experience. Leaving school for the Year 12s will be a challenge for some and a big change for everyone. However, the Hutchins experience enables us to start our adult lives knowing we have been given the best opportunities to develop character. As Lincoln might have said, no matter what people see as our shadow, we have to be confident in the knowledge that the tree is there.

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SCHOOL ADMINISTRATION

The Headmaster

he year 1998 has been a year in which Hutchins has not stood still. Physically, I suspect the changes to the landscape on the city side of Nelson Road have been the most dramatic for many years. As wonderful as they are, those building changes are but the outward symbol of still far greater change in the fabric of Hutchins.

The Strategic Planning Committee is a new body charged by the Board of Management to make recommendations to the Board on key strategic directions. The Committee will be recommending evolution (not revolution): the continuation of Hutchins as an all-boys' school, maintenance of the K-12 structure, and the continuing evolution of the mini-school concept. 'Do your best, join in, be accountable,' an injunction often made to boys, is becoming a motto. It is a succinct summary of what we expect. We will continue, too, to insist on the little things – greetings from boys, courtesy to visitors, uniform and punctuality. Much remains the same – it is a successful formula and Hutchins' reputation for producing outstanding young men will continue.

In preparing for change, the School's rewriting of its Mission and Aims has been completed. That statement forms the basis for all that we do. One of the main aims is to challenge boys intellectually. I am sure it has been apparent that a major focus has occurred to ensure each boy does his best.

The changes that we are introducing formed the basis of a paper I delivered at the International Coalition of Boys' Schools Conference on improving academic achievement in a school.

Complementing the outstanding Middle School environment created by School Architect John Button, in consultation with the staff, there have been major changes in the culture and ethos of Middle School. The School was fortunate to be successful in obtaining a substantial research grant from DEETYA to evaluate the success of the Middle School changes.

We believe that the changes to be implemented in Prep School will bring similar improvements to those experienced in Middle School. A new building, new curriculum and changed behaviour management policies are the key structures to help us focus on boys. We also look forward to welcoming Cathleen Gieselman from University School, Cleveland, Ohio, who will be with us for a year on exchange.


Our ties with University School continue to strengthen. Shortly, we will be committing ourselves to a formal brother-school relationship. It is now possible for Hutchins boys to form part of the biennial exchange program or to go and study at University School for a period of time of their choice. Mr Kent Moore has won an Exchange Scholarship and will accompany boys to Cleveland next year. Currently we are investigating other staff exchanges.

work above and beyond the call of duty and their concern and care for students is a hallmark of this School. It is true that one of the major indicators of a school's success can be measured in the quality of the relationships between people.

The success of each mini school ultimately will rest with the Head of School. Mr Irons, Mr Hodge, Mr Morton and Mr Kelly all are strategic and lateral thinkers who continually strive

Each of them has been responsible for overseeing major changes in their area of responsibility. Walking into each mini-school is different and that is as it should be. Each school reflects the needs of the boys and to a certain degree the personality of the person in charge.



To the non-teaching ranks we welcomed Miss Helen-Marie Hart (Child Care), Mrs Anna Kirkland (Centre for Excellence), Mrs Jenny Mawbey (School Shop), Mrs Dawn Frankcombe (Assistant Bursar), Mr Denis Bishop (bus driver), Mr Kim Rainbird (Curator of Grounds), and Mr Shane Pinnington (Caretaker).

This year Mr Stuart Cripps stood down as Head of Humanities and Mr Andrew Webber was appointed Head of Humanities and Religious Studies; Mr Alan Morley was appointed Director of Boarding, Mr Chris Manning became Deputy Director of Boarding and Mrs Liz McQuilkin was appointed as Acting Head of English in Term 3, replacing Dr Allan Pride, who was appointed to the position of Head of English at Trinity Grammar School in Sydney. We sadly farewelled him at the end of Term 2.

We farewell Mr David Brammall at the end of this year and a testimony to him is found later. On a personal note, I could not have wished for a more supportive, loyal Deputy Head. He has made my job so much easier.

In 1999 Mr Barrie Irons will take up his position as Deputy Headmaster, and I feel very fortunate to have his invaluable support. Mr David Brammall

t might be argued that David Brammall's association with The Hutchins School had two beginnings. The first was in 1855, when on Wednesday, February 16, 1855 a young English gentleman took up teaching duties at the Hutchins School, two days after arriving on the ship Fortitude. Charles Joseph Brammall, a mathematics teacher, began a long family tradition and since then, the family has maintained a strong link with the School – as a glance through the enrolment book readily shows. The second beginning was in 1945, when David was enrolled at Macquarie Street, a year before the School celebrated its centenary.

As a student, David soon showed qualities of leadership and a willingness to involve himself fully in the life of the School - sporting and academic; characteristics he has continued to encourage as a teacher and Deputy Headmaster, always insisting that students at Hutchins take full advantage of the many opportunities available to them. Already in 1949, David was Captain of cricket and House Captain of Nixon in the Junior School, marking the beginning of a truly impressive decade as a student. In 1951 David was in the athletics team, had been awarded Second Colours for athletics and in 1952 was Vice Captain of House Drama. In 1953 he became Captain of House Drama, and something few others have achieved at his year level - he was made a Probationary Prefect. Also in that year, he again received Second Colours for athletics, and was on the School Magazine Committee, as well as playing for the First XI and First XVIII. David was made a Prefect in 1954, was on the Games Committee, the Magazine Committee, a Lance Corporal in the Cadets and, once again, Captain of House Drama. It seems that with each passing year, he took on more, finishing his schooling at Hutchins in 1956 as Captain of Buckland, CUO in the Cadets, Captain of Games, Senior Prefect, Captain of the First XVIII, member of the Library Committee, the Magazine Committee and the Games Committee, and receiving an Honour Badge for tennis, athletics, football and cricket.

David returned to Hutchins as a resident tutor in the Boarding House, working from 1958 to 1959. In 1960, he was a resident tutor at Geelong Grammar School while studying at Melbourne University. In 1961, after becoming a qualified teacher, David was invited to join

the staff of the newly formed Peninsula School, under the leadership of the Reverend Dudley Clarke. David took responsibility for sport and in addition to his teaching responsibilities coached cricket, football and athletics. David has always been passionate about his sport. In October 1964, Peninsula was invited to join the Associated Grammar Schools' organisation to participate in its sporting program. This was quite an achievement and one for which David Brammall was responsible.

In 1973, David returned to Hutchins, taking up the position of Deputy Headmaster, one he has held for the past twenty-six years with short spells as Headmaster. During this time, he coached the First XI for seventeen years and was Master in charge of cricket from 1973 until 1995, with a record of wins in seven State finals. David's contribution to the School can never be truly measured. For him the little things have always been important. Attention to detail such as uniform, exchanging pleasantries and punctuality are the things that make a difference. Boys need clear limits, an understanding of consequences and to know that they will be held accountable for what they do. David is a master of that art, of instilling the admirable kind of qualities in the boys of Hutchins, qualities which are as much a reflection upon those who guide them as they are upon themselves.

Thankfully, David does not leave us completely just yet, nor is the Brammall tradition about to end. David returns next year – albeit in a part-time capacity – to

continue his invaluable work with enrolments and parent interviews. Jenny Brewster (David's niece) joins the staff of Hutchins next year and it looks as if the long tradition may continue after all. Jenny will be the fifth generation 'Brammall' to have taught at Hutchins. (Her brother, Tim, also taught at Hutchins for a short while in the 1980s.) The School community extends its best wishes to David for the future, as he enters this new stage of his life.

It was with
much shock and
sadness that the
Hutchins Community
felt the sudden death
of Geoff Stevens.

eoff came to Hutchins in 1987, commencing as a Craft teacher. He was educated in NSW and graduated from Sydney Teachers, College in 1967, continuing his study with a Bachelor of Arts with Honours and certificate courses in trade subjects. He began working in Parkes at the Small Arms Factory before moving into teaching, firstly with the NSW Education Department and then in Tasmania. Geoff was awarded a Commonwealth University Scholarship and a Tasmanian Education Travelling Scholarship.

Geoff did not allow time to pass idly by. He was responsible for a number of publications, including Hand Book of Trade Calculations for Secondary Teachers, as well as assorted papers. He was a foundation member, committee member and past President of the Hobart Miniature Steam Locomotive Society. We saw his enthusiasm for model steam trains at Hutchins when he fired up and ran the Hutchins steam train in Middle School. He was an active model engineer and a very keen tennis player.

While at Hutchins, Geoff made many contributions to the life of the school. As a teacher of Metal and Design, he was committed to doing what was best for his boys.



He was a stickler for detail and he took pains to ensure that his reports were accurate and that his words expressed correctly what needed saying. He set high standards for the boys he taught. Geoff's concern for the boys also extended to staff. He was genuinely concerned about



people and he would go out of his way to enquire about their well-being.

This year Geoff extended his teaching to Year 4. This was a big step for him, but one he undertook willingly. It was soon apparent that the move was a success and his two periods a week with Mr Morrisby's class was a popular move.

He gave generously of his time, especially if something needed building. He willingly made up items when asked and evidence of his work is around the school: the trays in the Chapel for holding candles and the volleyball net posts and cricket stumps are but a small number of examples.

Tennis, where he was Master in Charge, was certainly an important part of Geoff's contribution to Hutchins. He spent much time coaching and encouraging boys to extend themselves as far as they could and the boys enjoyed many successes in Tennis competitions.

Geoff had a keen sense of Hutchins. He was proud to be here and had a very good sense of what it means to be part of this community. He leaves behind his wife Suzy, stepsons Robert and Greg Otto (Years 8 and 6), and his four daughters. Our condolences are extended to Geoff's family. He will be sadly missed.

Hutchins and Collegiate, began Collegiate involvement in Hutchins clubs, and ran the very successful Clubs and Societies Day.

The Activities Committee, with President Luke Doyle and Secretary Jamie Chung Gong, ran several very successful activities throughout the year, including Torporama, the Battle of the Bands, a Three-on-Three Basketball Competition, the House Challenge and the Hutchins Gift.

The General Secretary of the SRC has two main functions: one is to act as the link between the two sections of the SRC Executive; the other is to run the 40-hour Famine. Under James' leadership this year, the school was able to raise a massive \$2514, which is a record and is \$700 more than last year.

The Student Tribunal

The role of the Student Tribunal was again reinforced in the school in 1998. There were only seven instances when the Tribunal sat, the lowest figure since its inception in 1993. This figure clearly indicates an increased level of maturity exhibited by the students and respect for the rights of each student to feel happy and achieve success in the school.

The idea of being accountable to your peers was a message which the tribunal encouraged to those students who had failed to uphold their responsibilities to their peers and to the school.

The decrease in the number of Tribunal cases in 1998 was due in part to the implementation of Peer Mediation. Following several courses conducted by the School Counselor, Mr Alan Dear, there are now in excess of thirty trained peer mediators in every section of the school. This year was the first full year of Peer Mediation and the number of sessions was quite high, an indication that students are more willing to sort through their problems with the assistance of their peers instead of teachers.

THE CHAPEL OF ST THOMAS

From the Chaplain

e have an old huon pine stump which is ancient, gnarled and beautiful. A friend of ours brought out the shape that was there, a body with the head of an eagle. When we were unpacked in New Zealand by burly Maori men, they all stopped work when this was off-loaded, and they stroked it. Maori visitors to our house would also stop and stroke it. We learned that in their culture wood is seen as special, because it contains spirit, and 'mana' – a presence which commands respect. We also learned that the Maoris have a special reverence for the humble tribal carver, because this man has the sacred task of bringing out of wood the hidden form that is waiting to be revealed.

I see our task at Hutchins as being similar to that of the humble Maori carver – to uncover in each student what is waiting to be revealed: that which is great and God-given. This is a sacred task and we often stand on holy ground.

I have been greatly encouraged in my first year by helpful and friendly staff (ancient, gnarled and beautiful?!), and by gently spirited and good humoured students. I am grateful to those who have added much to the fabric and tone of the Chapel this year: Mr T. Turbett donated and crafted a huon pine stand for the Paschal Candle; and Mr R. Servant designed and created out of brass and wood a processional cross and candles on behalf of the Brammall family in memory of the late Paddy Brammall. Those who have preached, acted, and read, and the musicians including the fine Chapel Choir, must be thanked for adding great sparkle to our worship.

We can hear much that is depressing about the future of the Church but when I see a group of boys coming from the Junior School to an early Friday morning eucharist: when I see boys of all ages and creeds keen to take part in services; and when I look at the kinder/preps who are so full of life (sometimes too full!), in the pews and whose eyes are wide with


wonder; then I have high hopes for the lively and continuing growth of Christian witness in this place.

They were witnesses, and when they were asked, "Whence shines this light, where is the source of this power?" they knew what to answer and where to lead men.'





The Hutchins Foundation

he major activity of the Development Office in 1998 has been marketing, to ensure that the enrolments at the School are maintained. The single greatest aspect of marketing has been the Open Day, held in 1998 on Sunday 17 May, when many hundreds of parents, boys, Grandparents and other visitors enjoyed a range of concerts, classroom and other displays presented by the boys of all areas of the School. Open Day is an important part of the School year, not only from the enrolments aspect, but also because it affords us a chance to display the many aspects of the School of which we are proud.

Other major marketing thrusts this year have been the participation by the School in displays at Wrest Point - the Careers Expo and the Kids' Expo - and at the Campbell Town Show. At each of these venues, information on Hutchins was presented to an enquiring public and, more to the point, the School flag was being metaphorically flown to remind people of the School's existence: although we are aware of Hutchins' long and illustrious century and a half, for people new to Tasmania, or from different parts of Hobart, it is necessary occasionally to state what many feel to be the obvious. Another aspect of this has been the two 'mail box campaigns' where over 50,000 pamphlets were delivered by Australia Post into the letterboxes of homes in selected suburbs, to tell them of the Open Day or of the new Prep School - an exciting new development which will be open in time for the start on the new year. We have received a number of enrolments as a direct result of these campaigns - and not a few comments from other people...

The popular Roadshows, commenced a year or two ago, have been resumed and are proving to be profitable in two areas. They have increased enrolments, and they have given parents an opportunity to share with others their excitement and pleasures of their sons' school. For the Roadshows, a parent is selected in an appropriate area, and asked by the School to be host to other parents and to prospective parents at an evening where senior staff members present details on the School, and answer

any questions the guests may have. If other parents would like to offer their homes for such Roadshows in Hobart or in rural areas - they are invited to call me on 6221 4246.

The Foundation has had an active year too. As the Foundation is the fund-raising arm of the School, it is important that funds are raised to support the School - not only in the short-term but also, and arguably more importantly, in the long-term. Special events are staged; goods and services are offered for sale; and our investments are carefully managed to ensure an appropriate level of growth. The popular Chicago Nights dinner dance held at Hadley's Hotel, the May Day Drinks and other events were successful fund-raisers - and also

enabled patrons to have a great time! In 1999 a Dinner Auction will be held at Wrest Point. This is likely to be the major social and fund-raising event of the School year. The bequest campaign is one of the most important aspects of the Foundation's work. Parents, Grandparents and Old Boys are encouraged to remember the School in their Wills, and through these methods, a significant amount has been raised for the Endowment Fund. Interest and other earnings from investments of the Endowment Fund help to provide several Scholarships and Academic Prizes, as well as assisting the School with special projects which could not be otherwise funded.

Public relations events are an important aspect of managing the School's image, as well as being of flow-on importance as 'friend-raising' and fund-raising events. The very popular Grandparents' Days have grown to such an extent that in 1999 there will be four (rather than the three to date); and will offer Grandparents of boys in the Prep School, in the Junior, Middle and Senior Schools to share with their grandsons the special magic and excitement of their part of the School. We have also been involved in activities such as the organisation and administration of Speech Night, the Parents' Association School Fair, the public farewell function to say 'Goodbye and Thank you' to Mr David Brammall who retires as Deputy Headmaster at the end of 1998, the opening of the splendid new Middle School, the inaugural Webber Lecture, a series of Headmaster's Seminars, guided tours around the campus for visiting Old Boys, prospective parents and other guests, exchange visits from Trinity Grammar (Kew) and Oita Tomei High School (Japan), and Old Boys' reunions in Launceston, Brisbane, Adelaide, Melbourne, Sydney - and Hobart.

The year has been an exciting, busy and happy thirteen months.

A further major commitment from 1997 was \$50000 plus the first annual grant of \$20000 to fund the building of the new Junior/Middle School Tuckshop and cover for the Junior School Terrace. \$20000 is committed each year for the next three years to complete the funding. However, the new tuckshop and the adjacent covered terrace and spectacular sails makes every dollar raised worthwhile. This area has become a major asset for our sons in the school. Together with the magnificent new Middle School courtyard it became the focus of our first Twilight School Fair on Friday 9th October. The Fair was a great success, raising over \$19000. It is an event which brings together all sections of the school community and

many thanks are due to those who worked together to make it all possible.

The Parents' Association also assists with the Family BBQ held in November to welcome students into Year 7.

There are many other areas outside PA activities where Hutchins also benefits from the support and expertise of parents, including assistance in the libraries, Junior School classrooms, Centre for Excellence, tuckshops, Foundation, career talks and displays.

The Clothing Pool is organised as a voluntary service by a group of dedicated parents, who give hours of their time to process, price and sell secondhand uniforms. We are also indebted to the many parents who coach and manage sports teams and those who are involved in Parent Support Groups for various sports.

A further group of parents have formed a new Working Party with Mr Howard Kelly to develop ideas for the devlopment of better outdoor facilities for the Junior School. After a long series of meetings and consultations exciting concepts have been developed. These rely on student and parent involvement to off-set some of the costs. The Parents' Association has agreed to fund Stage 1 of the JS Outdoor Space Redevelopment with up to \$15000. The new courtyard area outside Years 3 and 4 was planned to be completed by the end of 1998, transforming a dark, gloomy area into a vibrant, inviting space with pavers decorated by every boy in Junior School to celebrate the Year of the Ocean.

There are always projects for parents to support and we greatly appreciate the time and effort which so many parents freely give; the school and your sons benefit from your support.

The Archives – Making Records Accessible

Tith huge amounts of information stored in the School Archives and with a steady stream of documents, photographs and other items of memorabilia expanding this collection every year, two areas become increasingly important: storage and retrieval. Not only is it vital that the collection be adequately housed and protected, it is also essential for us to be able to access material quickly and comprehensively. Data bases provide the means by which information is readily at hand and where it can be accessed efficiently and effectively. Computers are an invaluable tool for these kinds of collections, and they provide unique opportunities for combining a variety of areas. For some years now, the School Roll has been on data base and in conjunction with the enrolment book (updated for the School Sesquicentenary in 1996) it provides a valuable source of reference, both for the School and the wider Hutchins community.

One of the Archives' long-term projects is the copying of the photographic collection which will then be converted to digital images and copied onto CD Rom. Currently, the early photographs are being recatalogued and details from them are being transferred to the main data base – the one listing current and past students of Hutchins and other schools incorporated into Hutchins, such as Queen's College. Once completed, it will vastly improve the quality of the resource and the manner in which information can be accessed. At present, if there is an inquiry concerning an Old Boy, each photograph needs to be removed from storage and studied to determine who is in it and, particularly, whether or not the subject of the search is in the photograph.

When the process of including these details on the main data base is complete, it will no longer be necessary to refer to the original photographs, a process which is both time-consuming and detrimental to the records, as each print must be taken out of storage, examined and then replaced. Ideally, the originals should be removed only when absolutely necessary, as their condition might easily be affected adversely by exposure to light, dust or frequent handling.

The 1915 Football photograph included with this article can illustrate the process. Early in 1995, we received an inquiry from a relative of one of the players – Roy Barnett (far right, second row). The enquiry was one relating to photographs and, specifically, whether or not there were any in the Hutchins collection depicting the subject. With the data base set up as it now is, to answer a question like that is simply a matter of opening the Old Boy data base on the computer. One of the cells is set aside for photographs. Each photo has a catalogue number and if photos exist, they will be listed alongside the name. Each photograph can be linked back to another data base which had details of the photographs – year, names, location, condition etc.

The next step is incorporating the CDs so that not only the relevant details can be accessed, but also the photographic images can be brought up on the screen, either for printing, copying, or for reference. Given time, more information will be cross-referenced in this way, permitting greater ease of access to a broader cross-section of our records. Documents, photographs, items of memorabilia, video and film extracts and other records will be virtually at our fingertips.

In Term 3 the Inter-House and Interschool Athletics Carnivals were held, Buckland House again leaving no doubt as to who would be Cock House in 1998.





At lunch two people from Australian Newsprint Mills, Christine and Kerry, came to look at our classroom and after lunch they came to make recycled paper with us. One group went but half way through two lieutenants from the U.S.S. John C. Stennis came to visit us. One flew an F18 which has an ejector seat, guns, missiles and bombs and the other one flew a Greyhound which has missiles, bombs and room for 30 people, not including the pilot. I learnt about three types of ejector seats. One, the canopy pops off and then the seat shoots out. Another has a metal bar over the pilot's head and it smashes the canopy. MIDDLE SCHOOL

Middle School Totally Rebuilt

he vision of the Board of Management under the Chairmanship of Dr Stephen Gumley and the drive of the Headmaster Mr Bill Toppin bore dramatic fruit this year in a complete rebuild of the Middle School.

Established as a separate mini-school in 1959 under the leadership of the late Frank Williams, the Middle School has managed for some years now in increasingly dated facilities with small, dark rooms, little suitable play space and no real 'centre.' In the planning stages of the development undertaken by architect John Button from the Hobart firm of Heffernan Button Voss, the decision was taken to remove four of the oldest rooms to make space for basketball and other hard surface play areas, and to renovate the interesting and historic Frank Williams Room, converting it and adjacent areas to an Art teaching space. The next decision taken was to lengthen and reorient some of the newer, 20 year-old rooms under the Auditorium, with window walls on the eastern side opening into a newly created courtyard. Finally, an entirely new two storey building of more than 600 square metres was planned for the southern side of the newly created courtyard, providing six huge classrooms, a spacious foyer and numerous offices and meeting rooms.

Planning involved students and staff at all stages, the boys making particularly valuable contributions in the design of the play areas around the buildings. The Headmaster and Dr Gumley visited recently built schools on the mainland. The staff made intricate calculations about everything from the size of lockers and desks to window heights, cabling for possible developments in information technology and the sizes

of classrooms required for the cooperative learning mode so suited to Middle School boys. The architect was instructed to ensure that interesting features would spring into view around every corner. The Spreyton-based building firm of Fairbrothers won the tender and work began in earnest over the summer of 1997-98.

The area beneath the Auditorium originally consisted of six small classrooms, an office and a staff work area. The renovation produced three enlarged classrooms, a fourth room for technology projects, a flight simulator room complete with the fuselage and one wing of a real aircraft, a fully equipped computer laboratory, a new staff work room, two offices, a generous changeroom and much improved toilet and shower facilities.

The courtyard, named the Megaquad by architect Button, provided covered cloisters on three sides, a 5 inch gauge railway track, a racing car track, seats and tables, handball courts, large chess board, pond with stepping stones and a spectacular spiral staircase with a sail covering reaching to the second floor.

The completed facility, generously furnished and carpeted in spectacular fashion, including a huge yellow carpet lion in the foyer, was officially opened by the former Chairman of the Board, Dr Gumley, in a simple ceremony during Anniversary Week, 3 August 1998. The Dean of Hobart and Vicar General for Tasmania, the Very Rev'd Dr Stuart Blackler, dedicated the complex. Significantly, the large, double room on the ground floor was named for Mr John Millington who served tirelessly as Master of the Middle School for twenty-five years until the end of 1994.

'The school's culture is based on a combination of modern thought, and also organisational memory the shared myths and legends, role models, stories and experiences that are handed down through the generations. The golden lion on the carpet is a tangible symbol of that heritage.

After paying tribute to the many people involved in the project, Dr Gumley concluded:


Andrew Deane and Tim Carolan were two of the boys who did well in soccer.

Physical fabric

Buildings and outdoor recreation facilities are the most obvious and dramatic improvements this year. The construction and opening of the new Middle School is reported elsewhere, but there was a most significant lift in morale, both of boys and staff, when the new facilities came on-line. It is hard to overstate the improvements. The sense of Middle School having a real heart, the lack of crowding with its attendant stress on the social fabric, the quality of the finishes and furniture to which the students respond with extra care, these and more are perhaps key factors in the way Middle School sees itself.

At the same time as the buildings went up, hard surface play areas were laid down, providing numerous handball courts with interesting rebound walls, an outdoor basketball court, more stand-alone basketball rings, significant areas under cover and seating.

One further development had particular significance for our boys. The School built a new tuck shop, midway between Middle and Junior Schools, with a spectacular sail for shelter. The siting of the tuck shop allows for the possibility of its being used for refreshments during weekend functions such as sporting matches, and has enormously eased the pressure on the Auditorium where the old tuck shop was situated.

Academic programs

Potentially of greater significance than the new physical facilities are the major curriculum changes introduced to Year 8 this year. As a result of the work of Mr McCammon and the Middle School Subject Coordinators, the Year 8 curriculum has been entirely unitized, and a unique degree of choice introduced at this level of the School. While reflecting the School's commitment to national frameworks, the Year 8 curriculum allows boys to fine-tune their course of study to suit their interests. Boys can build up their exposure to areas of particular interest to them, such as Design and Technology, Art, Music, Drama, Studies of Society and the Environment, Extension Science and Values Education. In the future we hope to extend this further with choice in Physical and Health Education and the addition of some integrated units of study, which draw on a number of disciplines.

Year 7 courses, too, have been unitized, and there is a growing degree of collaboration between subjects, such as the coincidence of building medieval siege engines, or 'trebuchets' with the study of the Middle Ages in SOSE. Staff teams are being set up for 1999, which will further encourage integrative themes in Year 7.

Boys have responded very warmly to the increased sense of ownership and tailoring of their courses to suit.

All Middle School boys have undertaken a short course in keyboard skills this year under the expert guidance of Mr Chris Manning, the hard-working Director of Information Technology for Middle and Junior Schools. The courses have precise goals in terms of accuracy and speed, which many have met or exceeded.

Co-Curricular Non-Sporting Programs

Debating has been a major enterprise in Middle School again this year, with three Year 8 and two Year 7 teams acquitting themselves very well indeed. Key Year 8 debaters have included Chris Jones, Alex Finnis and John Eland, the latter winning the Speech Night prize of Junior Orator because of his successes both in debating and the Poetry and Prose in Performance competition.


Interhouse debating this year resulted in a clear win to School House.

The Centre for Excellence has conducted a number of interesting and challenging programs for Middle School boys, one of the most interesting being the 'Artifacts' program which saw our boys acting as sleuths to discover from what part of the country a set of artifacts had been sent.

Lunchtime clubs were again a feature on Thursdays, with activities as varied as flying, fly tying, kite making and photography. Music featured prominently, with the new Middle School Choir making great strides under the direction of Mrs Robin Short. Year 7 class bands performed at end of term assemblies, and more than fifty boys undertook individual instrumental studies, either at School or privately.

House Competitions

The Inter-House competition this year was fiercely contested, the final outcome being a well-deserved win to School House. Stephens House won the Swimming in Term 1, while Thorold House won both the Athletics in Term 3 and the Winter Sports Day in Term 1. School House, showing a very wide range of skill, won the Summer Sports Day in Term 1, the Cross Country in Term 2 and the Debating in Term 3.



Events




Head of Year 8 and Athletics guru Mr Chris French in pensive mood





cademic accountability has been the major focus for the year. The emphasis has been on tight monitoring by Tutors and communication with parents. The call-over system of reporting was introduced. Staff insisted that students who were not performing well attend the Family Teacher conferences. This formal contact is so important as parents are kept informed about their son's progress. We must not, however, lose sight of the fact that each student is accountable for his own progress.

Conflict resolution is an important part of our society. With this in mind the Leaders Conference in 1998 proposed the introduction of a peer mediation program at the school. With the help of the School Counsellor, Mr Alan Dear, this has been successfully introduced. The training course has given a group of senior boys an insight into mediation and human relationships. This fits in very closely with our philosophy of making boys accountable to each other. Boys may be referred by staff for mediation or may make an approach themselves if they feel a situation is becoming tense. This initiative is already having a significant impact on the student culture.

A highlight of the year has undoubtedly been the remarkable mathematical success of William Moase who has won virtually every competition on offer in the State.



Having seven boys selected for a National team is also a rare distinction. Beau Mannix was selected in an Australian swimming team. Nathanial Symmons was selected to represent Australia in the Under 17 waterpolo on a tour of Europe. Simon Gardner made the Australian Schools team. Jamie Chung Gon was the Australian captain of the International Cadet Sailing Team, of which Finn Dorney and Stewart Wells were also members. Mathew Fish will be a national representative in motor cross on a tour to America.

Mr David Brammall, our guest of honour at the Awards Assembly, presented Honour Badges to Adrian Biggs, Matthew Irons, Nick Leitch and Rupert Pugsley. These badges go to boys who have been awarded three Caps in one year.

The Cock House Competition continues to be a dominant feature in the Senior School. It allows all boys to







INTERNATIONAL CONNECTIONS

he year 1998 started with the annual visit to Hutchins by the staff and students from the Oita Tomei High School in Japan.

Approximately twenty-five people come to Hobart each year, and share in lessons at Hutchins and Fahan, as well as seeing a little of the beauties of Tasmania on a bus tour to Bonorong Park (cuddle a koala!) and to Russell Falls (go for a bush walk!). For most, however, the real advantages are in the practising of their English and in the participation in the Home Stay program. The Japanese students are from a Year 11 International Business Studies class at their High School, and having even just a short time in an English-speaking environment is an invaluable aspect of their education. The Home Stay is just as important as it allows the students not only to work on their language skills, but also to see a little of the traditions and customs of Australian families.

Term Two also saw a visit to Hutchins by Naoki Fukushima, a Year 8 boy from a Tokyo Junior High School. Naoki spent approximately four weeks in classes and on camps with boys from the Middle School.

In the past eighteen months Hutchins has hosted Adam Pianka from Poland, sponsored by Rotary, and Nicola Cannizzaro from Italy, sponsored by Southern Cross Cultural Exchange.

The United States were well represented this year, with boys and staff from The University School, Cleveland, Ohio attending lessons at Hutchins for several weeks in Term Two. In 1999, several Hutchins boys and staff will be off to the States for the return visit, and one student will spend a full term in the US. Also next year, Southern Cross Cultural Exchange will be sponsoring Philip Vogel from South Africa and Christopher Sykes from Canada.

Mr Sam Wells joined us as a GAP student in Term 3, replacing Mr Ivor Leonard and Mr Stewart Swapp, both of whom returned to the UK earlier this year.

Our own International Students covered quite a lot of territory. Hutchins boys representing Hong Kong, Taiwan, Thailand, Jersey, Singapore and Indonesia added their invaluable contribution to life in Burbury House and the wider school. One student, Tod Sirawattananon from Thailand, has forged a remarkable niche for himself as the designer of the web pages for International students at Hutchins, and for Burbury House, the School's boarding house. In different 'international' escapades, Hutchins boys this year have been to New Zealand for skiing, to South Africa for a cricket tour, to the UK on the Choir tour, and to Indonesia.

The presence at Hutchins of boys from different countries, and the opportunity for Hutchins boys to travel to other countries are of immense importance as Hutchins finds its place in the international arena – and as its students find that there is life beyond the 40th parallel!

Overseas students

With political tension raging in Indonesia, the 1998 Indonesian tour was under threat of cancellation. However, we perservered and gathered at Hobart airport at 5.30am on Saturday May 23. Fourteen hours later, nine hours behind schedule, we arrived at our hotel.

Our two and a half week trip was to take us to the corners of Bali and to Lombok. Mas and Ubud in central Bali were the two places of refuge on our itinerary. We were immediately exposed to traditional Indonesian activities. We wood-carved, cooked, shopped and painted batik. Mas was also our first experience of Indonesian currency. It was a fantastic feeling to fill your wallet full – until you emptied it on a single transaction.

The last leg of our tour was spent attending Gamelan dances and plays, touring the countryside, visiting palaces, temples and villages. The rest of our time was spent in Timezone, on the beach or picking up bargains (or so we thought!). If there could possibility be a downside to Kuta Beach it is its extreme

commercialism and the noisy, loud and embarrassing behaviour of fellow compatriots. We discovered that if you don't like to be hassled then this is not the place to go. The novelty of the cheapest 'genuine' Rolex watches and Ray Bans wears a bit thin after the first few days. However, on the whole, it was fantastic place to end our trip.

No doubt the fantastic success of the trip was due to the efforts of our managers Mr Wilson and Mr Millhouse. They worked tirelessly in getting us there when the embassy looked like pulling the plug on us. I recommend this trip to anyone interested in Indonesia, their language, their culture or simply for an amazing experience.

Reflections on the Cricket Tour to South Africa

The cricket tour to South Africa was an exciting yet demanding undertaking. Our first stop was Cape Town where we were welcomed by Wynberg Boys' High. Our boys were billeted with South African families for the duration of the tour. This enabled them to enjoy the wonderful South African hospitality.

A win against Wynberg was a terrific tonic for a jetlagged team. Day three saw us journeying up Table Mountain, a trip of less than four minutes. As the cable car rose, the floor rotated so everyone had a chance to look out on the magnificent views. We made our way down to Cape Point, the southern most point of Africa. The atmosphere in Cape Town was relaxed and vibrant, and it was a great place to start the tour. A match against Paarl Boys High allowed us to experience Afrikaans hospitality at its best. This is one of the premier wine making area in the country and the traditional white gables of Cape Dutch architecture provide the backdrop for many wine farms with grape vines stretching for miles.

We then flew to Durban. From there our trips to Hilton College and Kearsney College were memorable, with the match against Kearsney being 'misted out' at about 4.15 pm. The mist was so thick that when a ball was struck into the covers no one could see where it went. The umpire felt everyone was in danger and declared 'that is enough, gentlemen.'

We took a four-day break from cricket for our trip to the Umfolosi Game Park. The Zulu chefs treated us royally. I organised for some of the boys to do a walk with an armed African game guard. One group had an amazing experience of being charged by a black rhino. The game guard immediately loaded his gun and told the boys and staff to 'please run.' They scuttled up the nearest trees, unfortunately thorn trees – a real African experience. We also did a night drive with spotlights, enabling the party to see the animals – lions, elephants, white rhino, two pythons, giraffe, buffalo and many forms of antelope.

Back to Durban and a victory against Durban High School, one of South Africa's premier cricketing schools, was the cricketing high point of the tour. Tom Murray snared 7 wickets with his leg spinners, to clinch the match. The match against Westville Boys High was narrowly lost. Our trip to Johannesburg followed and we were very conscious of the security systems there.

We played games against St Stithians and St Johns on the first two days with both Colleges proving too strong for our tiring party. Day three saw us travelling to Sun City. There is a casino resort, with two golf courses set up in the Pilansberg, about two and a half-hours' drive northwest of Johannesburg. What an amazing place this is with a man-made beach, wave-making machine, surfing, waterslides, life size replicas of elephants, a 'volcanic eruption' and of course the gaming rooms. We did not have time to play golf but in the 38-degree temperatures, the beach and water-slides were welcome.

The final morning in Johannesburg was spent in Soweto on an organised tour known as The Soweto Experience. Leading the party were two delightful Africans who were able to give us a great deal of background on Soweto. We visited the homes of Nelson Mandela, Winnie Mandela and Bishop Tutu. Mandela's old four-roomed home, set up as a museum, is where he returned after his release from Robben Island. Our final moments in Soweto were quite exciting with a BMW hurtling past us, followed by a police car in hot pursuit. The car had been hijacked and the police were giving chase. Never a dull moment in South Africa.

We all arrived back safely with a host of memories of a country which is so rich in natural and human resources. We could not have been made more welcome.

THE CURRICULUM

The Director of Studies

ach year the boys are presented with a rich collection of curriculum and co-curriculum opportunities. As exciting as this is, it may be that we may have focussed too much on providing the diversity of opportunities rather than on the learning performance in each activity. This year we have renewed our emphasis on academics. This fits very well with our 'Teaching and Learning Project' and has also resulted in changes to assessment and reporting. A key development is the redefined role of the House Tutor in academic and pastoral support.

Year 12 TCE Results

Each year the results are analysed. It is interesting that many of the generalisations one hears about were found to be incorrect in the analysis of the 1997 results. An example is the claim sometimes heard that Hutchins boys do worse than the female students in their classes do. While this is true for some boys it is certainly not true for many. In fact, the performance varies across subjects from year to year depending who is in the class. So one cannot say that a particular subject is better at one school or another for more than one year. A reassuring comparison can be made between Hutchins results and state results in Year 12. Here we find results above state results in almost all subjects. In some the gap is very significant, particularly in the Sciences and Mathematics.

The boys continued to produce outstanding performances. Phil Bender, the Dux for 1997, deserves special congratulations for his fine score of 100. Other exceptionally high scores were achieved by Ben McCulloch (98), Adam Rumbold (97), Andrew Beck, Peter Lockett and Tim Beckett (96), Andrew Chung (95), and Richard Maddock (92). We wait with interest to learn of their successes at university this year.

Year 11 TCE Results

There were some very good and an unusual number of outstanding results by Year 11 boys last year. In particular: Chris Line (78), Martin Matthews (76), Stephen Catchpole and Marc Evenhuis (75), Roy Kwan and Marcus Yong (74) and William Moase (70). The previous best score in Year 11 was 77 three years ago. Along with strong results in major reports, the results in national Mathematics and Science competitions have been outstanding. This year's leavers are an exceptional group from whom we have no doubt there will be exceptional external results. They have worked very hard and deserve our congratulations.

A Focus on Academics

At Hutchins this year there has been a renewed effort to produce the very best academic results. By this I mean staff and students working together to enable each boy to achieve the best personal results of which he is capable. Each year the Academic Co-ordinators survey all the major reports to identify boys who should be awarded certificates for 'Academic Effort,' 'Academic Achievement' and 'Academic Excellence.' These commendations are based on work skills and subject criteria. This year Mr Fishburn (Academic Co-ordinator) conducted a review of performance over recent years. It is particularly gratifying to note that there was a 9% increase in the number of Year 11/12 boys qualifying for 'Academic Effort' awards compared with last year, using the same criteria. In addition, there was a record number of Year 11/12 boys who gained 'Academic Achievement' and Academic Excellence' commendations. This demonstrates superb achievement and application by this year's senior boys and is very encouraging for the end-of-year results.

To some extent we have administered academic matters separately from pastoral matters. Next year we are bringing these together in the role of the House Tutor. Tutors will now be directly involved in monitoring academic performance. There is a new section in the Student Diary for the boys to record their results. This will aid the Tutor/Parent partnership, which is so important for academic progress. Boys who wish to change subjects will need to see their Tutors first to ensure the change is well considered. Another aspect of bringing pastoral and academic matters together will be reflected in school reports. Next year parents will see an increase in the frequency and number of reports in most years. For Years 11/12 boys this will mean two reports in Term 1 and a major report following the Term 2 mid-year examinations. For boys in Years 7 to 12 there will be three reports before the major report at the end of the year.

The Teaching and Learning Project

The Teaching and Learning Project is driven by two over-riding concerns. The first is the unique nature of a single sex boys' school and how it can best meet the needs of developing boys. Are some teaching methods more effective than others in boys only classrooms? The second is a response to developing research on multiple intelligences and whole brain learning which suggests that teachers should broaden the range of teaching approaches to better cater for the diversity in student learning styles.

This year, through the staff's enthusiasm, commitment and professionalism, the project now involves all staff in twelve reflective teams, each one co-ordinated by a Key Teacher. The teams meet regularly to talk about teaching and learning, to share teaching practice and to make our understanding of boys' learning a more explicit part of teaching at Hutchins. Current research into change in schools makes it clear that collaboration between teachers is an essential component of successful implementation.

Information Technology

This year we established a central academic data-base and used it to introduce electronic reporting. As one might expect there were a few teething troubles. These troubles were particularly painful to those teachers who spent a weekend learning to enter all their reports only to discover that the computer had lost them when they returned to work on Monday. However, parents can now read all reports more easily. There are a number of significant additional features of the data-base. One feature enables a teacher to read an individual student record and to contribute to it from many sites across the School. The importance of this for medical records and special education needs is obvious. Another feature enables us to build up a progressive record of achievement, which can then be built into Tutor reports. A third feature is the recording of statistics for effort and achievement. This permits us over time to gain an accurate picture of individual and group performances across the whole school.

The exhibition could not have occurred without the generous spirit of the people who helped, from the mounting of all the work to the pulling down of the show. The boys themselves will remember for the rest of their lives the thrill of seeing their work in a professional gallery.


We have many boys applying for entry to the Art School in 1999 and I wish them all the best.

The Junior School classes were involved in two Art competitions this year. The first occurred in Term 1 and was titled 'Share the Spirit.' It was an Art program designed by the Sydney Organising Committee for the Olympic Games. Over 25,000 school children across the country participated in the competition and over 2,500 entries were received at the Sydney headquarters. The standard of the portrait entries was a great deal higher than the previous year and the judging process was made quite difficult.



Careers and Vocational Education

For many years now there has been debate about what education should cover in the various sectors of schooling: compulsory and post-compulsory and the blurring of the division between general and vocational education, the increasing retention rates into Years 11 and 12, competency based training, key learning areas, registered training organisations, national standards and the AQF [Australian Qualification Framework] and dozens of other acronyms. Add to this the increasing emphasis on key competencies, tertiary qualifications, lifelong learning, flexible employment structures, enterprise bargaining, world's best practice. globalisation, economic rationalism and whatever else our economic and political masters will think up to lead us into the millennium. The one real purpose of education and living should be to do the best with what you have, to make the most of the opportunities you are given and to help others do the same.

I remember a chorus I learnt as a child where the key word was 'JOY' and the words of the song said, 'Jesus first, yourself last and others in between.' This concept has stayed with me. Not that I would ever claim to always live up to it, but whatever your religious or philosophical beliefs may be, putting others before self should be the purpose in life. I am not denying that often you have to think of yourself, because if you don't you may go under. BUT in the world in which we now live, there is evidence of self interest, the 'me now' syndrome and 'if you want it charge it' mentality. We are all to blame for this. But how will it ultimately affect the young?

Where to then in the years of schooling? And what role should parents play in the development of their children? The School Mission Statement covers the following domains: spiritual, intellectual, cultural, physical, emotional, social and vocational. The School can only achieve so much in these areas; the rest is up to the boy and the wider community in which he is involved. In relation to careers and vocational development, we aim to assist boys to make a successful transition to the post-school world by providing a programme of careers counselling and associated lessonbased activities, the opportunity to be involved in work experience, structured vocational [VET] programmes and various enterprise activities, development of job-getting skills, post-school course options selection, and emphasis on the gathering together of a wide range of work related skills and competencies (many of which are developed across all teaching and learning areas). The value of all this to the individual boy is based on what he wants to make of it all. Some will realise the importance of these opportunities earlier than others.

The school is a learning community of boys, parents and teachers and the 'Common and Agreed National Goals for Schooling for the 21st Century' make interesting reading. Goal 10 states: to provide appropriate career education and knowledge of the world of work, including an understanding of the nature and place of work in our society. This we aim to do. What we must be watchful of is the economic imperative value of work-related studies not being allowed to overshadow all the other important educational, social and cultural things that happen in the development of young people while they are at school.

The Centre for Excellence continues to diversify and cater creatively for individuals within the school community. 'It was worth it!' and 'We learnt a lot,' comment Tournament of Minds team members, Thomas Ryan and Tim Jones (Year 5) upon the successful completion of their problem-solving in the State final.

Boys have also entered the Australia Artifacts
Exchange Program. 'It gets you thinking and you
do a lot of problem solving,' David Johnson, Year 8
observed. The first school in Tasmania to enter this
National program, three groups of boys from Junior and
Middle School have enjoyed the investigative process.
The Challenge Program is another more recent initiative
for Years 7 and 8 extension students. A future problemsolving endeavour, it challenges bright minds to be
the brains of the future! Currently thirty boys are
researching virtual reality in order to solve a possible
addiction problem set in the year 2021.

Within the classroom framework, bright students continue to be questioned and extended. Big issues are dissected, chewed up and spat forth. 'I have a better attitude to taking the recycling bin down the driveway. Before it was more like a chore. Now it is less of one because I understand how important it is to recycle so something else can be made.' (Ted Stoklosa, Year 4). Brainstorming, lateral thinking, community inquiry and academic controversy are amongst some of the strategies used to encourage the boys to transfer theory into practice.

The Centre continues to provide support for boys with special needs in literacy and numeracy as well as in the social and emotional arena. We are ever grateful to our

Each week the boys meet to discuss mathematical concepts and put theory into practice.

The Centre continues to be an integral part of the Hutchins community. Where else does one learn such valuable life lessons evidenced by Robert Tilt (Year 6) '... Design and Technology

1998 has seen a resurgence of individual design and flair that indicates a bright future for the design process within our Faculty. This year with the introduction of elective units in Year 8, we have seen an amazing lift in skill levels and results in the variety of options that we offer.

In Years 7 and 8, we have introduced the Intellecta computer interface software that allows our work with robotics and control situations to be linked with a PC. We have developed interlinked robots as well as a vertical interactive rat maze and we are continuing to set up an interfaced Hydroponics station. Design in Wood

The Year 9 groups have demonstrated a deep understanding of the design principles needed to develop interesting, innovative work. Andrew Morrisby has produced some complex designs. Kim Eijdenberg developed a very nice round table; Josh Marsh has demonstrated a strong feeling for design and working with timber. Brandon Servant and Rodney Smith have provided excellent leadership and initiative, while participating in the Design, Make and Appraise process.

Year 10 designed and constructed wooden birds, with some excellent work by Nathan How, Jason Ewen and Leith Walker. Travis Smith has developed a number of exceptional works which demonstrated his exceptional talent and tenacity, one piece being a unique open frame table. Nick Randall constructed an interesting CD which demonstrated his skill and attention to detail. Nathan How, Leith Walker and Adam Smith all made exceptional pieces. James Collins has had a very productive year, producing a range of work from a distressed cabinet with steel doors to a

Design in Metal

It was decided that Year 9 would design and build three full-sized working models similar to those in the Colonial Museum at Copping. A visit to the museum was arranged to enable the many working models to be examined. Many photos were taken and ideas were gained as to the set design and construction methods. Various types of motors and drives were tried and eventually two models were completed. The exercise was of immense value and a lot was learned for future use. In the second semester many interesting individual projects were designed and built. These included two well constructed toolboxes made by Richard Meaburn and David Brooks. Two trolleys were built by Robert Shoobridge and Anthony Weeding while Chris Wagner designed and completed a land sailer.

Year 10 class projects included: two excellent fire screens constructed by William Bignell; a robust trailer by Stuart Burbury; a tension wrench by Chris Button; a weight bench by Tom Gibson; a frame for a utility for spot lighting by Adam Jones; various cycle bar attachments by Joshua McDonald; and a stock crate for a utility by Richard Webster.

In Year 11-12, James McShane and James Johnston each designed and built a wood lathe. Angus Boyes designed and built several projects, including an outdoor recreational chair and some speaker stands while Steven Hore, Nicholas Denholm and Charles Cameron designed and built an electric locomotive for the railway in the new Middle School quadrangle.

Electronics

With the completion of the new Middle School came an opportunity to move the electronics lab to its permanent position. The Design Technology staff and several boys worked feverishly over a number of weekends to make this move a reality. The move has encouraged new vision and hope within the School for this subject. The program will extend to Stage 3 in 1999 followed by stage 4 in 2000. Several electrical units have been offered in Year 8 this year. There is an electrical bias in dealing with the Intellecta software package that is proving to be very interesting.

Technical Graphics

Design continues to provide our students with the ideal context for them to develop the many drawing skills associated with effective graphic communication. All the students in Years 9 and 10 have produced folios illustrating many techniques and effective solutions to

design problems. Geometry and structural engineering drawing continue to challenge the students, developing problem-solving skills, technical understanding and an appreciation of technical design principles. Michael Gozzi and Derek Flakelar have produced excellent work in these areas.

Several units of study this year have catered for a wide variety of special interests. These include car design and architectural design (including interiors and 'weekender' accommodation) and a range of pictorial drawing illustrating perspective and rendering techniques. Computer Aided Design and model making continue to offer our boys new and interesting challenges and are powerful media for communicating design ideas. Jason Ewan, Trent Strickland and Richard Headlam have enjoyed considerable success in these areas.

A group of boys who have pursued all set tasks with excellent application and achieved very high standards of work deserve special mention. They include Leith Walker, Brandon Servant, Jonathon De Hoog, Matthew Gardiner, Joshua Tomlin, Edward Webster and Nicholas Parker.

Computer Graphics and Design

Boys in Years 11 and 12 continue to develop excellent skills in the areas of design and communication, 3D surface modelling, animation and multimedia. They have produced a digital folio that includes many design solutions to a variety of design briefs. Particular design work related to Charles Mackintosh, a renowned architect at the turn of the century and also the application of pre-cast concrete in architectural projects. The briefs have provided our boys with ample opportunity to further enhance their technical and design expertise. There were outstanding major projects by Michael Ross, William Moase, Nicholas Bamford, Tom Larkey and Tim Pitman, all using the power and versatility of computer graphics to communicate their design ideas.

Digital Dimensions

This year a student enterprise group, 'Digital Dimensions,' was setup to offer the senior boys an opportunity to work with industry in Computer Graphics and Design. Terratec Asia Pacific – world leaders in full face mining technology – are our main partners. Through a joint agreement the group have assisted the company to produce 3-dimensional computer surface models of specialist mining machinery. A variety of other exercises included logo animation and web site design and production.

Terratec have sponsored the group with the installation of a high-powered computer graphics workstation. This enables the boys to produce high quality models and comprehensive animations. The relationship with Terratec is ongoing, and next year will provide as many challenges as this year, thanks to the support of Mr Tony Peach and Terratec Asia Pacific Pty. Ltd.

English Faculty

'The way to develop mastery over English is to live within a rich context of its lively use, by reading, listening and talking.'

These words by David Holbrook, sometime fellow at King's College Cambridge, are particularly apt as we listen to debates about literacy, and as we try to balance traditional studies in English with the new language of technological communication.

At Hutchins we believe that a good English student is one who reads widely, speaks clearly, writes accurately and imaginatively, researches discriminately and listens thoughtfully; someone who is challenged by ideas and the power and beauty of words to convey them. Computer literacy has developed rapidly but we must ensure that it does not mask other competencies. Students need to develop their oral and written language in the preadolescent years and build on these by an extensive reading programme that goes through to Year 12.

Of the 323 Middle and Senior School boys entered in this year's Australian National Schools English Competition, 79 gained Credits, 69 were awarded Distinctions and the following 9 gained High Distinctions: Ben Bones, Geoff Kelly, Joe Pemberton (MS), Edward Webster, Joe Aston, Oscar Potter, Nick Chapman, Richard Charlton, Matthew Smith (SS).

Poetry and Prose in Performance continues to grow in popularity. This year we included students from Years 3 and 4 in the Junior School programme and we had some wonderful performances from those chosen for the Years 3 to 6 Poetry in Performance evening. There were three more evenings of poetry and prose for Years 7 to 12,

culminating in the final which was judged by well-known ABC radio personality, Ric Paterson. The winners were John Eland and Mark Toppin (Junior), Richard Clark and Joe Aston (Intermediate) and Daniel Copping (Senior).

Well-known poet, James Charlton, generously agreed to judge the Hutchins Short Story and Poetry Writing Competitions. He also addressed the school at a Headmaster's assembly and spoke provocatively about what, for him, constitutes great literature, and about the importance of good writing. Short story winners were George Croft and Alex Norris (Junior), Alex Thompson (Intermediate) and Alex Playsted (Senior). The best poems were by Matthew Mulcahy and Alex Morris (Junior), Ben Robinson and Josh Tomlin (Intermediate) and Adam Smark (Senior).

In the Dorothea Mackellar National Poetry Competition Adam Smark, Anthony Bastick, Jamie Shearing and Tim Warren received special commendation for their poems and James Field was notified that his poem in last year's competition is to be published nationally.

The faculty is very grateful to Mrs Pru Tallboys who edited *Writing Fever*, a collection of poetry and short stories from Hutchins students over two years (1996 – 97).

We were very sorry to farewell Dr Allan Pride at the end of Term 2. His classes were taken in Term 3 by Mrs Janet Upcher, a highly respected English teacher whose wealth of knowledge and love of literature have been greatly appreciated by her students and her colleagues.

'At first I could see nothing, the hot air escaping from the chamber causing the candle flame to flicker, but presently, as my eyes grew accustomed to the light, details of the room within slowly emerged from the mist, strange animals, statues, and gold – everywhere the glint of gold. For the moment – an eternity it must have seemed to the others standing by – I was struck dumb with amazement, and when Lord Carnarvon, unable to stand the suspense any longer, inquired anxiously, 'Can you see anything?' it was all I could do to get the words, 'Yes, wonderful things.'

Like the famous archaeologist Howard Carter, who wrote these words after he finally broke into the tomb of Tutankhamun, the Faculty of Humanities hopes that its students will be excited by what they discover about events past and present. Like Carter, students of the Humanities are attempting to uncover information through intelligent detective work, to judge the value of evidence, to argue about facts and their significance, and to communicate their ideas. In SOSE, Religious Studies, Geography and a range of History subjects, students learn about the past and the present through inquiry and discussion – a process the ancient Greeks called 'historia'.

In the Social Sciences it has been a year of great change. In Years 7 and 8 boys have been happily involved in studying a number of new units: in Year 7, units include 'The Dawn of Man', 'Plotting your Way' and in Year 8 'From Dreamtime to Landrights', 'Castles and Knights' and 'Antarctica, the Final Frontier' and developing these new units. In Years 9 and 10 all students study a Humanities course made up of SOSE and Religious Studies and History and Geography become electives. As part of SOSE (a development of the old Australian

Studies), boys will spend more time on 'Civics.' They will make even more rounded and thoughtful citizens if they also choose electives in History and Geography. In Years 11 and 12 we have had good sized classes in Australia in Asia and the Pacific, Geography, Ancient History and Psychology. One student, Tim Pitman, is to be particularly commended for a project he did, 'Accessing Information on the Weather' – he made his own CD, recording his findings.

In Religious Studies we welcomed Father John Goodwin to our staff. He has brought great energy and enthusiasm to his teaching. He is planning with Mr Webber to take a party of boys to Melbourne, Fiji and New Zealand to see the religious cultures of Jews, Maoris and Fijian Hindus. They will also be able to give practical help to an Anglican community which supports orphans and other homeless people. The other highlight next year is a conference on Religious and Values Education to be conducted by Dr Peter Vardy, a well-known author, educationalist and academic from the University of London.

The most significant change this year has been the retirement of Mr Stuart Cripps as Head of Faculty. 'Daffa' or 'Crusty' has been a much-loved and respected teacher of Humanities for more years than he cares to remember – indeed he taught the present writer and passed on to him, as he did to generations of boys, his love of History and the Social Sciences. His knowledge of his subject is vast, his delivery of it is dry, spare, full of interest and on occasions astonishingly funny. One can just see him asking his students Lord Carnarvon's question 'Can you see anything?' and his students replying 'Yes, Mr Cripps, wonderful things.'

Mathematics

This year, Hutchins boys achieved success in several Mathematics competitions. In May, 168 students took part in The Tasmanian Schools' Mathematics Competition. William Moase (Year 12) won first prize in the Senior Section of this competition while Matthew Woolley (Year 11) won both the second prize and the prize for the Best Year 11 Student. As well as prizes for first, second and third, the judges gave four Outstanding Awards. Two of these Outstanding Awards went to Hutchins students, Aaron Buckland in Year 11 and Stephen Catchpole in Year 12. In the Intermediate Section, Nicholas Starkey won the first prize of \$100 while Richard Headlam and Robert Howell each received an Outstanding Award Certificate and a cheque for \$20.00. All three boys are in Year 10 at Hutchins. In the Junior Section, Jacob Christophersen and Dean Rollins (Year 7) and Andrew Simmons (Year 8) each won Outstanding Awards.

The Australian Mathematics Competition was held in August and 318 boys entered. William Moase and Matthew Woolley again won prizes in the Senior Section of this competition as did Nicholas Starkey in the Intermediate Section. Other Hutchins boys to be awarded prizes in this National Competition were Ian Pang (Year 9) and Ying Xiao and Lee Andrewartha (Year 7).

Also in August, The Mathematical Association of Tasmania conducted its Annual Mathematics Relay Competition. This competition involves teams, each made up of 4 or 5 students competing against one another in a problem-solving competition. The Senior Secondary Division of this competition was won by the Hutchins team of William Moase, Adam Eijdenberg, Stephen Catchpole and Simon Binny. This was the third year in a row that this team of boys had won their division of this competition and in recognition of this they received a special trophy from the organisers. In the Junior Secondary Division one of the Hutchins Year 8 teams came third. The team was made up of Isuru Amarasena, Christopher Jones, Jon-Ho Chan, Michael Jeffrey and Jesse Plumb.

Each year, a small group of Hutchins' most talented Mathematicians in Years 9 and 10 undertake an extension program called The Mathematics Challenge For Young Australians, conducted by The Australian Mathematics Olympiad Committee in Canberra. They do this under the tutelage of Mr Kevin Walsh, Hutchins' most senior Mathematics teacher. Ian Pang (Year 9) performed very well in this Mathematics Challenge program and the paper he presented was awarded a Distinction.

This year, we say farewell to William Moase who is one of Australia's most talented young Mathematicians. Not only has William won numerous prizes in Tasmanian and Australian Mathematics competitions in his time at the School, he had the rare honour this year to be selected as one of twenty young Australians to represent Australia at the 1998 Asian-Pacific Mathematics Olympiad in March. William also represented Hobart in another international Mathematics competition called The Tournament of the Towns and he was awarded a Distinction by the organising committee in Moscow. William's other major achievement this year was to win the M L Urquhart Prize, the most prestigious award presented each year by The Mathematical Association of Tasmania.

As a result of their successes this year, both William Moase and Matthew Woolley have been invited to attend the National Mathematics Summer School in Canberra in January, 1999. Only 75 students Australia-wide receive invitations to attend, so this is a very high honour for these young men.

Modern Languages

In 1998 the school had participants from Years 3 to 11 enter the state-run Alliance Française competition. Several boys received prizes and Honourable Mentions. Particular congratulations go to Nick Summers for Year 6/7 poetry, Ben Groom for Year 8 poetry and Bice Dibley for Stage 4 Aural Comprehension.

It has been a busy year for the faculty as we move to embrace technology more and more in our teaching. We were fortunate in that Ms Sally Young and I received some funding to pay for a week's conference on Computer Aided Language Learning. The developments in this field are proceeding at a staggering rate. We are fortunate at Hutchins that we have the facilities to accommodate these changes and integrate the computer into the language learning environment. Of course, we regard the computer technology as an adjunct to language teaching and learning, not as a replacement for the teacher. It will prove particularly useful for extension and remedial work within the classroom.

We were fortunate this year to get another school trip to Indonesia away during the May-June holidays. More about the trip itself appears elsewhere in *Virtus*. We were very fortunate in being able to visit Indonesia four days after its President of 30 years stepped down. We in Australia were bombarded with information about the changes happening in Indonesia during the first six

months of this year. My point is that information was arriving on our breakfast table about events happening in a 'foreign' country. An understanding of the language and people of that country makes such happenings more real to us. We can take a genuine interest in what is happening overseas. The study of a modern language and the peoples who speak it give us an extra insight into events happening in that particular country. This is important and people should be encouraged to pursue the study of other languages and cultures. The recent Commonwealth Games held in Malaysia is a fine example. The Malay and Indonesian languages are very similar. Every day boys were commenting to me that they had seen something in a broadcast or heard announcements in Malay that they understood. They said that this made the experience of the Games more real to them. The knowledge of a modern language added a new dimension to the Games for them. Adding a new dimension - this is something to be valued in its own right.

Physical Education and Recreational Studies

This year the faculty welcomed two new members of staff and a new GAP student. He has taught Years 7, 8, 9 and 10 Physical Education and Health, Year 9 Sport Science and Year 11/12 Health and Recreation. Mr Andrew Wirtz, a keen bushwalker and sportsman, has taken on the role of Junior School Sportsmaster and co-ordinator of Physical Education and Health in Years K - 6. Andrew has also taught year 10 Physical Education and Health. Mr Samuel Warren, a new GAP student, is from Worcester, and attended Old Swinford Hospital (est.1650) in Birmingham. During the year, we farewelled Mr Ivor Lennard and Mr Stuart Swapp. Both 'Gappies' gave the school tremendous service.

This year saw a number of significant improvements in the syllabuses offered by the faculty. Mr French and Mr McNamara developed a new unitised Year 7 and 8 PE course. The aim was to develop shorter end-points, thus giving the boys a better sense of achievement and direction. This has worked very well.

Health and Recreation was introduced at Hutchins to replace Adventure Education. It was a very successful year under Mr Mac's direction and the students enjoyed a variety of activities from go-carting to water aerobics and spring-board diving. After trialling a draft syllabus in 1997, Health Education has now become an essential part of all PE courses at Hutchins. The faculty has developed a sequential 7 - 10 course.

Year 10 Physical Education took on a new look with sixteen weeks of activities with Collegiate. Activities included lacrosse, aerobics, weight training, football, netball and softball, to name a few. Both the boys and the girls enjoyed the program and we hope that it will continue in 1999. Other activities with Collegiate included Year 8 activities and the Salamanca Dance Festival.

Resources

Nettlefold Library

The long process of establishing a single resource data base for the School is nearing completion. This year independent art, music and infant book collections have been established. The library catalogue can give a small glimpse into the school-wide collection.

The resource catalogue lists 49,192 items which circulate among the students and staff. The next stage of development of the resource catalogue will occur in 1999 when the catalogue takes the large step from the present PICK system to our school-wide Windows NT network. This will require a new software package and resource staff will be busy in the next six months stocktaking and weeding for the upgrade.

This year, the School Archive collection was expanded by almost 100 volumes when one of our Old Boys, Harold Neil Smith ISO (1907 – 1996), made a bequest of his personal library to the School. There is now a substantial collection of Tasmanian texts that will be accessible through the developments in our information technology organisation. This donation is a wonderful asset for future scholars.

Science

'Science liberates man from the terror of the gods.' [Lucretius, circa 80 BC]

We welcomed Mr Marcus Jones and Mr Andrew Jones at the beginning of the year. Mr Marcus Jones took over Mr McCammon's classes whilst he was on long service leave during Term 1. Mr Andrew Jones took a Year 10 Science class. We sincerely thank Mr Marcus Jones for his contributions to Hutchins Science education, especially for his organisation of the most successful Science Fair that was held at the end of Term 2.

Congratulations go to Dean Rollins (Year 7) Benjamin Groom, Paul McGough and Benjamin McKay (Year 8), Andrew Morrisby and Ian Pang, (Year 9), Richard Charlton, Arthur Pitman and Nick Starkey (Year 10) for gaining High Distinctions in the 1998 Australian Schools Science Competition. One hundred and thirtynine students in Years 7 to 10 entered the competition and there were 9 High Distinctions, 46 Distinctions and 43 Credits. One hundred and ninety-eight boys in Years 3 to 6 also entered this competition. Of these, 65 received Credits and 29 Distinctions. High Distinctions were awarded to Timothy Stoklosa (Year 3), Ken Pang, Charles Gard, Lachlan Hall, Grant Ashbarry, and Johnathan Gumley (Year 4), Timothy Jones and Andrew Cardan (Year 5) and Neil Godber, Rowan Fenton, Nicholas Graney and Phillip Cracknell (Year 6).

The Chemistry Quiz in 1998 encompassed 97,402 students from all Australian states and territories plus twelve Asian and Pacific countries. The results in this competition were also very pleasing. Seventy-six Hutchins boys entered. There were 18 High Distinctions, and six of these scored in the top 600 nationally and will each receive a plaque. Ying Xiao (Year 7) was equal first in the state. Geoffrey Kelly, Jon-Ho Chan and Tim Cooper (all Year 8) were respectively first, second and equal third in the state. Arthur Pitman (Grade 10) was fifth in the state. Matthew Woolley and Nicholas Dwyer (Year 11) were respectively second and fourth in the state. Stephen Catchpole and William Moase (Year 12) were equal sixth in the state.

In the 1998 Chemistry Titration Competition, Years 11/12 boys competed against other Tasmanian schools. A titration involves much skill with burettes and pipettes. The Hutchins team of Matthew Smith, Alistair Khan and Tim Starkey (Year 11) came second in the state and will represent Tasmania in the National Finals.

Tim Starkey (Year 10, 1997) was presented with the Soil Technology Award in the Tasmanian Science Talent Search at the Prize Giving for its 1997 competition held earlier this year. The Hutchins Double Helix Club has met fortnightly throughout the year in the Junior School. There is now an aviary set up in the yard near the Prep School.

Congratulations go to Peter Pakulski who was selected to attend the week long National Engineering Summer School in Brisbane in January this year. Andrew Greenhill and Christopher Halse-Rogers attended the inaugural APEC Youth Science Festival that was held in Seoul.

Hutchins students did exceedingly well in this year's Australian Institute of Physics Quiz. The members of the winning team were Stephen Catchpole, William Moase, Martin Matthews and Roy Kwan. Second Prizes were awarded to members of another Hutchins team, Tim Pitman, Michael Ross, Peter Pakulski, and Warwick Reed.



Sail Training

As an AYF approved training centre Hutchins has continued to provide its students, friends and family with skills in all aspects of seamanship, boat handling and coastal navigation. These skills complement those that can be acquired through the Hutchins Award bushwalking and kayaking activities.

Sail training has continued to grow as an activity within the School. A healthy number of students joined one of the various courses. The most popular is the AYF Introductory Course as it involves only eight hours instruction onboard the School's yacht, Aurora. A number of Years 5 and 6 boys were among the participants. Also, for the first time girls from Collegiate, Fahan and Mt Carmel signed up.

Aurora has been sailing up to four times a week to accommodate the numbers undertaking the practical course. Those new to sailing have found this the best way to get into the activity, giving them a practical background before they sit the theory courses. The Competent Crew Course requires ten days under sail as its experience component. To this end Aurora sails regularly during the week and has been on extended cruises overnight. Four boys qualified as Competent Crew this year: Andrew Greenhill, James Collins, Tim Starkey and Daniel Woods.

The Inshore Skipper Certificate is also offered and is the ultimate goal for those participating in sail training at school. Several boys are working towards this at present. Mr Kingston qualified as a Skipper and AYF Instructor through the course this year. Mr Stewart also qualified as an Instructor, having gained his Skipper's Certificate by direct entry due to his previous experience with sail training.

Socratic Society

The U16 and Open relay teams were successful in their races. Hutchins won the overall boys' trophy, as well as the senior boys' trophy. In the State Independent Schools Carnival, held in windy conditions at St Leonard's, our team had a sluggish start, with many athletes in the first hour not performing to the high standard they had reached the previous week. However, as the day progressed, our performance picked up and we managed to gain many minor placings. Wins came from John Andrews in the U14 long jump (5.65m), Neil Godbar in the U12 long jump (4.61m), Nick Gozzi in the Open 100m (11.33s), and Chris Sonneveld in the U14 High Jump (1.65m). The U15 relay team of Oliver Hallock, Brett Hasell, Nick Starkey and Scott Wells won their event in 46.86s. The U16 relay team of Nick Avery, Shaun King, Jamie McLoughlan, and Jeremy Scott did likewise in 45.52s. 

Australian Rules Football

Six teams were fielded this season, representing a new entity – The Hutchins Lions Football Club. The club has embraced the educational aims and objectives of the school and enshrined these in its memorandum of association.

The Under 13 team enjoyed their first victory on the War Memorial Oval. Coach, Grant Jackson, and Manager, Shane Rollins, have done a remarkable job in nurturing the future First XVIII of the club. Victories on the scoreboard may not have been as frequent as some may have wished. It does, however, represent a triumph that such a large squad of boys have had the opportunity to participate in the game and learn its skills.

The Under 14 team finished the season with only three wins. Remarkably, seven matches were lost by a margin of six points or less. Nonetheless, under the astute coaching of Jim Wilkinson, they kept their composure and finished the season with a seven-point victory over Claremont.

The Under 15 team endured a frustrating season. An already limited squad size was further depleted through injury. Coach, Damien Taplin, and Manager, John Windsor, can feel very proud of their efforts.

The team was rostered in the first division of the competition. Week in and week out they encountered remarkably strong competition. To their credit, they confronted these challenges manfully. The fruits of their efforts may not have been apparent this season, but they will reap the rewards in the future.

The Under 16 squad comfortably secured a finals berth. This was a remarkable effort, given that a number of their 'stars' had been playing with the First XVIII during the season. Rhys Long, Nick Avery, James Jenkins and Tom Gibson all became regular selections. Coaches Mark Herd and James Burbury had them primed for a successful finals campaign. Manager, Nick Griggs, did a remarkable job of juggling the team list during the season. The Under 16 team recorded a quite extraordinary fifty-two point victory over arch rivals Glenorchy in their first finals appearance. Ultimately, the team secured a berth in the Grand Final, only to have premiership hopes dashed by Clarence by two points. Open football continued a remarkable run of success. Following last year's premiership, the First XVIII again made the State final and lined up against Launceston Church Grammar School. It promised to be a close tussle. In the last three meetings the margin between the two sides has been no greater than fourteen points (in Hutchins favour), including one draw and a four point defeat. Coach, Chris Rae, had the team primed for a great contest. Our team enjoyed the lead for most of the match. Ten minutes into the last quarter the margin was

Canoe Polo





The Schools Sailing Championships were hosted by Derwent Sailing Squadron this year. Hutchins entered two strong teams. Marcus Ashley-Jones was Best Overall Boat and Best Sabot and Jamie Chung Gon was Best International Cadet.

Hutchins was able to enter two teams in the State Team Racing Championships at Montrose Bay Yacht Club this year. The experience Hutchins teams gain through House Sailing and the Thursday afternoon sessions showed through. The Second Team of Andrew Boot, Drew Latham, Tim Starkey, Charles Cunningham, Finn Dorney and Stuart Burbury, finished third from the eight team contest. For the sixth year in a row the First Team won the event and was selected to represent Tasmania at the Secondary Schools Team Sailing National Championship Regatta.

The Sailing Team, coached by Tim Muir and consisting of Greg Steedman (Captain), Matthew Banks, Charles Cameron, Mark Jeffrey, Michael Ashbolt and Marcus Jones, sailed in the premium youth sailing event, at Port Lincoln, South Australia.

The level of competition once again surpassed previous years, leading to some incredibly tight and tactical teams racing. The event consists of three rounds, each with 21 races. The six States and the ACT were represented by their selected schools. Round 1 was sailed over three days because of strong westerly winds intervening. The team was defeated in most races of Round 1 after some narrow losses. Round 2, held on day four in light to moderate north-westerly winds, was the day the team came alive, winning four out of the six races sailed. This fine performance continued into Round 3 on day five, with the team winning every race sailed: seven successive races! At this stage in the competition, the Tasmanians seemed assured of securing at least 3rd place overall. Unfortunately, strong westerly winds once again played havoc with the event, causing the remaining twelve races to be abandoned. This meant that only races from Round 1 and 2 were counted. Even so the team gained considerable respect from the others.

In August, three Hutchins boys competed in the World International Cadet Sailing Championships held in Holland. In a very competitive field of over 80 boats, our sailors performed very well. Stewart Wells (Year 8) finished eighth (which included third place in Race 1) and he is the top performing Australian boat. Finn Dorney (Year 10) finished ninth which included a second, a third and a fourth in Races 7, 8 and 9 respectively.
