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

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# School Management

#### Board of Management

his year has again been one of activity and change as we position Hutchins to educate boys to be part of the new global environment.

The Headmaster and the Bursar have worked very hard to consolidate the School's financial position. We are confident the School is in excellent shape to face the vagaries of our economic climate. One of the vital areas of school funding is the level of Government assistance and although we are not able to accurately quantify the new measures announced in the last Federal Budget, we are optimistic they will be more realistic than the previous system. The focus on parents' ability to pay, rather than the wealth of schools, is to be applauded and I am hopeful of some savings for Hutchins parents when the system is phased in over four years, beginning in 2001.

This year we have been able to trim a number of expenses in order to keep fee rises to a minimum, whilst maintaining the quality of a Hutchins education. Parents should be aware

that we do have a principle of including all extraneous items within the total fee structure, rather than have additional charges for items such as computers, fee insurance, excursions and sport.

The Planning and Development Committee has commissioned or approved a number of significant projects. The highlight was definitely the opening of the Early Learning Centre in February. The Centre is a fantastic facility and is a credit to the vision of the former Board Chairman, Steve Gumley, and the Headmaster. Architect, John Button, and builder, Jackmans, are to be commended for the quality of their work. The Committee has planned a number of projects for next year. The most important of these is the Nelson Road underpass. The Board regards this project as a priority. The present arrangements are not satisfactory and expose boys, parents and staff to unacceptable risks. We expect that the new underpass will be opened in time for the return to school in February 2000. The Board thanks Ian Johnston and his dedicated staff for the time and effort they have put into this project.

The Strategic Planning Committee has made

a thorough investigation into boarding at Hutchins. Following these investigations, the Board has decided that Burbury House is an integral part of the School campus and it is proposed to refurbish the facility in the coming year. Other projects we intend to complete in the coming year include: The Nettlefold Library, which is in great need of upgrading; repair and renovation works to the Brammall Pavilion; a new watering system for the War Memorial Oval; improvement to the Board Room and Conference Centre in the Ray Vincent Wing; repainting the Junior School and improvements to the Administration block.

Two long serving members of the Board retired this year. Jim Grant made a significant contribution to the School during his five-year term. His advice on real estate matters and chairing of the Planning and Development Committee were very much appreciated. John Clennett retired in August after ten years of dedicated service to the School. John was an exceptional Chairman and Board Member and his dedication to the School is unsurpassed. I thank him for his huge contribution. I would also like to thank most sincerely the Bishop of Tasmania, the Right Reverend Phillip Newell, who retires this year. His contribution as Visitor to the Board has been very much appreciated and I wish him well in his retirement. We are fortunate to gain the services of Ian Johnston. Elizabeth Hope and Peter Shelley, all of whom I am sure will make excellent Board Members. I thank all of the Board for their support during the year, and in particular Committee Chairmen Graham Woodward, Harvey Gibson, Nick Heath and Tim Grant.

The School's most valuable resource is its teachers. The Board is indebted to them for their diligence and hard work in achieving excellent results in the past year. Boys' results in the TCE were exceptional and there have also been many boys featuring prominently in state and national competitions. The focus on each boy doing his best in all his endeavours is achieving results and proving the value of a Hutchins education.

The retirement of Stuart Cripps and John Anderson marks the end of an era; they made huge contributions to Hutchins and I wish them well in their retirement. The appointment of Derek Woolley as Head of Junior School is a fitting one and I am confident his style will build on the excellence we are already achieving in Junior School education. I congratulate Miss Jenny Brewster on her appointment as Head of the Early Learning Centre and commend the other members of the Headmaster's management team, Barrie Irons, Father John, Russell Morton and Peter Hodge, for an excellent year.

We were saddened in September with the passing of Ray Vincent. Ray's contribution to Hutchins over his whole lifetime was extraordinary. His influence on the School during most of this century is legendary and he was instrumental in developing the Hutchins community. The Old Boys' Association is an important part of Hutchins. I thank President, Tim Johnstone, and Secretary, Darby Munro, for their support during the year.

The Parents' Association continues to provide valuable assistance in development of the school campus. I thank all those involved in making Hutchins a better place.

The Hutchins Foundation makes a significant contribution to the running of the School, both in recurrent expenditure and in owning many buildings around the school campus. I thank President, David Catchpole, and Executive Officer, Christopher Hall, and their hard working team who manage this vital part of the school community. The Headmaster, Mr Toppin, has shown exceptional leadership and his energy, planning skills and hard work are taking Hutchins to a higher level. I thank him for his support. The Board's Minutes Secretary, Lyn Peach, and the Bursar, Lewis Prince, are very competent employees and I thank them for their assistance throughout the year.


#### New Board Members

# School Administration

#### The Headmaster

999 started with a healthier enrolment than expected and numbers continued to grow L slightly during the year, averaging approximately 1110 students. The decline in school age children and Tasmania's economic situation continues to place great pressure on enrolments at Hutchins. Hardly a month goes by without a family giving notice that it is moving to the mainland. While Hobart's total population remains relatively stable, the decline of the professional class is certainly having its effect here.

Intensive marketing campaigns have, I believe, been successful in allowing us to maintain enrolments. Roadshows, Open Days, Seminars, follow up of enquiries and Mr Brammall's careful enrolment procedures, ably assisted by Mrs Emma Griffiths, has ensured that we have maximised our enrolment base. Teachers are more aware of the important role they play in marketing the school and they have willingly contributed whenever possible to our marketing strategies. However, the difficult economic position of many rural families combined with a general decline in the rural population has meant that boarding numbers have fallen and continue to fall. The Early Learning Centre certainly provided a valuable focus for our marketing and once the building was opened, Kindergarten quickly filled.

We have spent some time this year "looking inward" and refocusing on what we are and what we do. This has been a rewarding activity because it has provided a keen focus for the year's activities. The recently revised Mission Statement and Aims provide the vardstick against which we measure our success. To this end, the renewed focus on academics (each boy doing his best) has reaped rewards. Research carried out by Mr Stuart Young has shown that there has been an improvement in effort and achievement in our senior years. The excellent academic results in 1998 were the icing on the cake.

As a boys' school we continue to probe how best to meet the needs of boys. Curriculum changes in Middle School have been especially noteworthy and there is now a wider variety of electives to meet the boys' needs. Some specialist facilities such as the Cessna aircraft and GAT flight Simulator have proved especially popular. While Years 11 and 12 are well catered for with a wide range of subjects available, our focus in 2000 is the curriculum in Years 9 and 10.

Research into the needs of boys has been conducted. We were successful recipients of two grants, one from the International Coalition of Boys' Schools and the other from a consortium from the University of Sydney. The latter grant allowed us to research the attitudinal changes that



have occurred with the opening of the new Middle School. Not surprisingly, there have been significant attitudinal changes achieved.

I was fortunate to attend the International Coalition of Principals' Conference in Finland in July this year. This was a gathering of some 800 Principals from around the world. It was a very important conference because it allowed me to bring a better understanding of what is happening in different educational systems to the planning process at Hutchins. Significantly too, research on "best practice schools" and the traits of "best practice Principals" was shared. As a result, staff have assessed my performance and this has allowed me to compare my practice with best practice. The Board has also conducted an assessment of my performance; together the assessments have proven to be very useful in developing my vision and leadership style for the School.

For the first time, the process of conducting regular teaching staff appraisal has occurred. A number of staff have completed their reviews. On the whole, they have reported that the process has been a useful one. It has provided an opportunity for frank and open discussions about their teaching and student learning.

Significant changes have occurred in the running of the Boarding House. In an effort to contain costs, Spotless Catering now provide meals and following the resignation of the Senior School Tuckshop Supervisors (due to a move to Melbourne) Spotless has also taken over the tuckshops. On the whole, this move has gone well although initially, there was considerable change required to how things were done.

Overseeing all that happens for the School is the Board of Management. Given the rate of change that is occurring both outside and inside Hutchins, the Strategic Planning Committee is charged with the responsibility of recommending to the Board the direction and pace of change.

The Committee has a wide-ranging brief and has made a number of significant recommendations to the Board, which have been accepted. The continuation of boarding on site at Hutchins is but one example of the discussions held.

Perhaps surprisingly, the most significant decision made in my time here has been to construct the underpass under Nelson Road in December of 1999. The project has been mooted for many years; while the hope of acquiring Nelson Road as school property remained, the Board was understandably reluctant to commit the funds for this project. However, with traffic appearing to be faster and the number of cars increasing, and the realisation that there was no hope of acquiring the road in the foreseeable future, the decision was made.

To the boarding house we welcomed Resident Masters Matthew Brazier and Steven Mavrigiannakis and Gap students Nicholas Bryant (from South Africa) and David Jenkins (from Northern England).

This year Barrie Irons assumed the role as Deputy Headmaster and Mr David Brammall became Registrar. Mrs Liz McQuilkin was appointed Acting Head of English and in Term II Mrs Robin Short moved to the position of Music Teacher. Also in Term II Mr Derek Woolley was appointed Head of Junior School, replacing Mr Howard Kelly and Mr Dean Docking was appointed Assistant to the Head of Junior School. At the end of Term I we sadly farewelled We say fond farewells to retiring staff mem-

I thank Mr Barrie Irons for his advice, support and assistance as Deputy Headmaster, Mr Lewis Prince for his custodianship of the school finances, the Heads of School Miss Jenny Brewster, Mr Derek Woolley and Mr Russell Morton for the vision and management of their respective schools and Mr Peter Hodge for his stewardship of the curriculum and teaching and learning processes. Mr Chris Hall as Development Director has worked tirelessly to promote the School, maintain links with the many associated bodies and ensure that Hutchins presents in the best possible light whenever it is on public display. Father John as Chaplain, has definitely made his mark with his positive presence in the spiritual life of the School. I also wish to thank my wife and family for their support. None of our success as a school is possible without the hard work of staff, who continue to give above and beyond the call of duty as they seek to motivate boys to extend themselves and use their talents. It is worth repeating that Howard's ability and commitment are of the highest order and his contribution


deserves the recognition of a substantive position.

executive decision in his new role was to decide on a girls' uniform!

In 1990 when John stood down as Head of the Junior School, its enrolment was three hundred and forty students and seventeen full time staff, which included three specialists, two part time teachers and two aides.

During John's seventeen years as Head of Junior School, camps were re-introduced, initially for Years 5



and 6 and eventually for Years 3 and 4. These camps, which were conducted at Montgomery Park, Carlton and Southport, were immensely popular and many boys would remember morning runs, jungle olympics, "thugby", orienteering and canoeing.

John was also instrumental in the re-introduction of musicals in Junior School, and some of the most memorable were Joseph and his Technicolour Dreamcoat, Moses (a sequel written by the late Fred Rawlings, the then music teacher), the Pied Piper, Treasure Island, Scrooge and Toad of Toad Hall. Following the success of those musicals, a new Junior School drama program was introduced, which saw all classes within the school presenting an act. Other Junior School presentations included Carol Services in the Cathedral, both as Hutchins and combining with Collegiate, and perhaps the highlight was the combined concert of independent Junior Schools of Hobart in the bicentennial year of 1988.

As a result of after hours study, John gained his Bachelor of Education and Master of Educational Studies Degrees at the University of Tasmania.

John's involvement in school sport included Under 16 cricket, Year 7 cricket, firsts rugby and Senior School hockey. He also encouraged vigorously full Junior School participation in whatever sports were being offered.

Outside school, John was involved with the Sandy Bay Swimming Club by serving as President and committee member and also served as judge, timekeeper and member of the Executive Council of Swimming Tasmania. His other activities involved serving both as President and committee-member of Southern Tasmanian Junior Tennis Development, as a selector for Tasmanian Rugby, as committee-member of the Hutchins Swimming Club and as a pennant player and committee-member of the Sandy Bay Bowling Club.

Since 1991 John's role in the School has been as Administrative Assistant, which has involved a myriad of tasks. The following are some, but by no means all, of those tasks: the control of all teacher supervisions and relief teaching, administration of teacher in training programs, preparation of the school calendar, co-ordination of arrangements for exchange students, scholarship examinations, the School Census, attendance registers, school examinations, school photographs, student and staff inoculations and maintaining the School's Honour Boards.

He will be missed by the Hutchins community, and we all wish him well in his retirement.


#### Annette Middleton

#### Stuart Cripps

Stuart Cripps joined the staff in 1960 when he was appointed Master in Charge of Social Studies. The Headmaster introduced him to the School as Mr Stuart "Crisps" – which

immediately earned him the longstanding nickname "Daffa". He was a resident Housemaster from 1960 until 1964. Over the years he became Master in Charge of History, whilst retaining the position of Master in Charge of Social Studies.

He always had a very flexible approach to academic studies, which fitted in especially well with senior students. In the course of his time at Hutchins he was responsible for the curriculum and teaching of both Social Studies and History from the first year secondary to senior secondary level, and the status and success of the subject is due to his expertise. He has also taught English, Religion, Mathematics, Science and Legal Studies.

Stuart Cripps has been an institution at Hutchins – a genuine character who is fondly remembered by all who were taught by him.

He has been School Housemaster, Assistant Buckland Housemaster and Thorold Housemaster (three times) but regrets he was never attached to Stephens House. He also served as Assistant Librarian, Deputy Librarian, Master of Academics, Acting Deputy Headmaster and Careers Master. In the latter role he boasts that he succeeded in getting one boy into ASIO and one into the Casino!

From the late 1980's until the end of 1997 he was Head of the Humanities Faculty, and again, in that position he demonstrated a high standard of professional performance and leadership. He always managed to maintain a balance between lively debate and an understanding of the institutional precepts under which the School must operate.

For over thirty years, at the end of each year he was responsible for the organisation of prize lists, including collecting from prize-winners their books and ensuring the smooth running of Speech Night, which occurred largely as a result of his efficiency.

In his early years at Hutchins Stuart acted as a liaison person between teachers in the government schools and independent schools, and was very successful in overcoming any



problems which arose in the dual system. He was also Special Schools Co-ordinator, and Student Teacher Co-ordinator.

He was also Master in Charge of the Book Room and was responsible for the removal of the books from Macquarie Street into the new book room, for the innovation of an accounting system concerning book sales, and for advice and liaison with the staff on the purchase of new material. He returned early from holidays to undertake this task and was very successful in obtaining help from boys who willingly gave up their time to assist him.

Stuart's extra curricular activities have been numerous, including Master in Charge of Tennis, Master in Charge of Hockey, basketball coach, debating coach, organiser of athletics, and assisting with the Lifesaving Group and dancing class supervisor (with Mrs Donnelly and Sister Jessica). His wide range of talents and interests also includes bridge, tapestry and "three step" cooking.

His other duties included master in charge of locker keys, "sweeper" (which meant missing many assemblies and awards presentations) and he will be well remembered for his many years as "pedestrian crossing supervisor" – which attracted the comment by a member of the public when he was absent: "Did that old man die?"

He was also an initial committee member of The Hutchins School Staff Association, and with other committee members John Houghton and Vern Osborne formulated the Staff Association Constitution.

Stuart Cripps has been an institution at Hutchins – a genuine character who is fondly remembered by all who were taught by him. He is modest, self-deprecating and a great wit. He was always an extremely popular teacher, with both staff and students. He was reliable and caring, without pretension, and carried out his numerous and varied tasks without fuss and without display.

I t is indeed the end of an era with the passing away of Ray Vincent on 20 September. No one has done more for Hutchins than Ray. His association with the School began in 1923 when he enrolled as a boy, and continued until his death.

Times have changed and it is unlikely that anyone will ever again give such long, honorary and unstinting service. A list of Ray's activities reflects only part of his contribution.

Sixty two years' service as Secretary, Assistant Secretary and President of the Hutchins Old Boys' Association (1926 – 1988) stands as testimony to the strength of his commitment. In that position he worked tirelessly locating missing Old Boys, updating rolls and maintaining personal contact with a great many Old Boys for years.

Ray was instrumental in the establishment of The Hutchins Foundation and together with Messrs Hay, Page and Kemp was an original subscriber. He worked tirelessly for the Foundation in many different capacities. He acted as Appeals Treasurer for the Sub Primary, Ray Vincent Wing and Aqua Appeals. He served on most of the Committees of the Foundation at various times and provided extensive financial advice on a whole range of different matters connected with the Foundation. He was a Founder of the 80 Club, a group of Old Boys who were over 80 years old.


He was Correspondent for all issues of Magenta and Black with his column "Beneath the Ivied Towers" which provided news of the doings of Old Boys. Ray instituted the end-ofterm Old Boys' lunches in 1932 and apart from the war years (when they were run by Bill Hood) convened those lunches until 1991.

During Ray's time as a Prisoner of War in Java and Timor he organized the preparations for the celebration of the School's Centenary in 1946 and upon release played an integral part in the celebrations.

The School Football and Cricket teams were also a focus for his work. He prepared the cricket pitches every Saturday morning until the bushfires of 1967. He was the correspondent for The Mercury with School and Club results. He was awarded the MBE for services to sport in 1976.

Ray was made a Life Member of the Old Boys' Association, (to which was added a bar to Life Membership), the Old Boys' Football Club and of the Old Boys' Cricket Club, The Australian Amateur Football Council, The Tasmanian Amateur Football League and a Life Director of the Hutchins Foundation.



# Student Management

#### The Senior Prefect

The first eighteen years of life are when a boy develops into a man – whether we like it or not. But there is more to the idea of a 'man' than simply a fully grown body and a legal age. It carries with it an expectation, a hope that responsibility and accountability are now playing a large part in life. This is an ideal, of course, but Hutchins is a school which tackles these ideals and tries to make them a reality.

One of the areas in which Hutchins deserves commendation is student management. 'Involvement' is drummed into the brain of the new Hutchins student and there is no better way to incorporate involvement, accountability and organisational skills than to see students playing a major part in the running of the school. From the Junior School Leaders to the Middle School Council and the SRC for grade eleven, it is evident that management and leadership are well developed concepts for Hutchins boys.

For the Prefects it is impossible to make it through the year without considerable management skill. The roles of the School Prefects cover the entire school, with prefects assigned to each of the sections of the school. This year they were Thomas Windsor (Early Learning Centre), James Walker (Junior School and Second Prefect), Simon Gardner (Middle School), and Timothy Starkey (Senior School). Regular assemblies and interaction with their respective prefect ensures that every boy in the school is kept up to date with what is happening and gets to see what type of things they are heading towards on the other side of Nelson Road in the Senior School.

A Prefect is also assigned to the various different cultural areas of Hutchins, this year with portfolios in Academics (Ben Wild), Music (James Field) and Drama (Daniel Copping). These prefects are the student liaisons with their respective area in the school, playing a large part in the organising, running and promoting of events such as the Scholars Conference, school plays, school musicals, concerts and many others throughout the year.

The President of the SRC (Nick Avery, assisted by Ben Wild) is responsible for coordinating and overseeing the smooth running of the SRC and all its functions and associated activities. This position also serves as a vital information link between the students, the teachers and the prefects ensuring smooth running of most school events. There has been a new portfolio established this year in Graduation (Alastair Walsh). This position is to serve as a liaison between students undertaking the Hutchins Graduation Certificate and the co-ordinating staff. In the past the process of the graduation certificate has been misunderstood by many students. This major new link with the teachers ensures understanding and gives some guidance to students in this area.

The house system provides a more personal environment for students and the House Captains (Stevens, Nick Macleod; Thorold, Michael Ashbolt; Buckland, Jamie Chung-Gon; and School, Luke Doyle) play a large part in the lives of students within their house. House Captains act as important role models for students. House spirit is highly valued at Hutchins and it is considered fundamental for students to feel that they belong to a special community within the greater school community.

The role of the School Prefects does, however, extend beyond the daily management of the school. Prefects are the communication link between the students and the teachers and provide leadership to younger boys. Prefects should uphold the values and tradition of Hutchins as they represent the school at all times. One of the characteristics of Prefects is that they are often involved in many different areas of school life. This makes them accessible to almost every student, and helps to foster relationships which strengthen involvement in the life of the school. By encouraging this involvement, and providing so many opportunities for responsibility and leadership, Hutchins helps instill the qualities of a 'man' in the body of a man.

Students' Representative Council



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

#### The Hutchins Foundation

1998/1999, my first year as President, has been one of review, planning and development. Early in the year the Allocations and Investment Committee finalised the development of an investment policy which was subsequently approved by the Foundation Board and has been implemented with considerable success.

The Headmaster has set a challenging pace within the Hutchins community and specific aspects influencing the Foundation include the strong marketing focus, the capital works developments and the planned refurbishments.

Once again the Hutchins Foundation Art Prize was extremely successful in drawing together the work of a wide range of talented Australian artists. More importantly it promoted the artistic awareness of Hutchins. The Foundation is proud to offer this Prize and I thank all members of the committee for making this such a professional and prestigious event.

The Hutchins Foundation faces many challenges in its fundraising activity including the difficult Tasmanian economic environment and many competing demands on people's generosity. To address this issue the Headmaster, with the support of the Foundation, is working to create a greater awareness of the mutual benefits of philanthropy in the Hutchins community.

#### A New Direction

A number of structural issues were addressed during the year with the introduction of fewer meetings of the Foundation's Executive Committee and Board but each meeting having a more detailed reporting structure. The Hutchins Foundation has an integral involvement in the strategic planning committee of the Hutchins board on which the Foundation is represented by Andrew Ashbolt and me.

This committee has been grappling with the issue of short-term and long-term fundraising for the benefit of the Hutchins community. In particular, there is a need to address the issues of executive support (and a reporting structure for that support) as well as seeking to maintain integrity of the Hutchins Foundation objectives while recognising the need to raise funds in the short-term for shorter term objectives.

It is proposed that short-term fundraising for short-term objectives should be conducted separately from the longterm fundraising processes of the Hutchins Foundation. To facilitate this process the strategic planning committee. in conjunction with the Headmaster, have developed an administration reporting structure which provides for the employment of additional personnel from the beginning of next year. A major benefit to the Foundation from this process will be the development of specific marketing activity aimed at encouraging a spirit of philanthropy within the Hutchins School Community,

#### **New Appointments**

We were pleased to welcome the experience of John Whelan to the A&I Committee. To the Programmes and Projects Committee we welcomed a new Chairman - Max McMullen - and Geoff Hazell, Ian Anderson, Marguerite Hunn and Vince Sorrentino

#### **The Committees**

A new committee was formed during the year under the chairmanship of Rob Hues to care for the real estate investments of the Foundation and also to look at potential real estate needs and acquisitions which may be needed for the long-term benefit of the School. The committees have all worked hard in a difficult fundraising environment.

The members of the Bequest Committee continue to promote the bequest concept among Hutchins Old Boys and other members of the School community who may appreciate the opportunity to assist Hutchins through a special bequest. By its nature this is a long-term fundraising activity and requires dedicated commitment over the very long-term with little control over year to year outcomes.

Although we are experiencing low interest rates, the broader investment policy implemented by the A&I Committee combined with reasonable market conditions and extremely low inflation has led to a most satisfactory growth in real assets over the last year. I thank Andrew Kemp and his team for the development of a sustainable investment policy and look forward to its continued success. The P&P Committee continued its wide range of roles throughout the year. This committee is a very public face of the Foundation and seeks to raise funds and also to encourage members of the Hutchins family to participate in its various activities which develop a sense of community and encourage a spirit of giving and sharing.

#### Headmaster and the Board

Being a member of the School Board as well as President of the Foundation has allowed me to develop a better understanding of the future needs of Hutchins and the ways in which the Foundation can help. The Headmaster and the Board's Strategic Planning Committee are developing plans for the future needs of the School. This development will need the assistance of an active fundraising support structure. The Foundation was established for this purpose and with an appropriate split of short-term and long-term focus it is ideally placed to assist in developments for both current and future Hutchins boys.

I would like to thank the Chairman and those who have supported me and the Foundation over the past year. In particular I commend Christopher Hall for the enormous workload he has undertaken. Both Don Camm and Pam Daly have also contributed enormously to the successful operation of the Foundation's activities and I thank them most sincerely. Once again we look forward to an exciting year of growth and development within the Hutchins Foundation.

# Then and Now...

#### The Hutchins School Parents' Association

The Parents' Association is now seventy years old. Over the years the Association has made a significant contribution to the life of the school, providing major resources, as well as funding a wide variety of smaller projects each year. During the last ten years major Parents' Association projects have included redevelopment of the tennis courts, construction of the Student Club adjacent to the Senior Tuckshop and \$50,000 contributed to the Science and Technology Appeal for the Foster Science Wing. Smaller grants have provided specialised equipment for teaching areas such as music, science, sport, technology and humanities.

The Parents' Association always has a strong committee which is well supported by several Parent Groups (Eastern Shore, Central and Southern) which all provide excellent parent networking opportunities. They also undertake a variety of fundraising activities as well as providing valuable feedback to the Headmaster on a variety of issues. Guest speakers from the school's faculties regularly attend Parents' Association meetings giving parents a greater understanding of their son's education and the school's facilities.

Parent assistance in the two tuckshops has generated valuable income for the Association. Now that the actual operation of the tuckshops is managed by Spotless Catering, volunteer assistance by parents is essential to maintain a profitable income from this activity. The Clothing Pool has operated as a voluntary service for many years, but it too is facing restructure. It is anticipated though, that profits will continue to assist the Parents' Association. I would like to acknowledge the enormous amount of work done by Vicki French over the last four years expanding the operations and services of the Clothing Pool to make it more accessible.

The Fair was again a great success, raising around \$20,000. The twilight event proved very popular, with a Fair Social the highlight of the evening.

Hutchins has been well represented on the Tasmanian Parents' Council this year, with the Headmaster attending in addition to Alex Graeme-Evans and myself. Alex continues as a Vice-President, while I have been nominated as Minute Secretary and TPC representative on the Schools' Registration Board.

There are many areas outside the Parents' Association where Hutchins benefits from the support and expertise of parents. These include assistance in the libraries, junior classrooms, Centre for Excellence, tuckshops, Foundation, career talks and displays. We are also indebted to the many parents who coach and manage sports teams and those who are involved in Parent Support Groups for Rowing, Rugby, Football and Cricket. There are always projects for parents to support and we greatly appreciate the time and effort which so many parents freely give. The school and your sons benefit.

I would like to thank our committee for the past year and in particular Alex Graeme-Evans for his work as Secretary and James Gard for his continuing expertise as Treasurer. I am sure we can all look forward to another challenging and worthwhile year in 2000.

#### The Archives – Electronic Records and the New Millenium

On this page last year, the major needs of the School's Museum and Archives were recorded as being the storage and retrieval of the enormous amount of archival material in the School's possession onto a data base. The issue of storing information electronically, and the related matter of the increasing amount of correspondence being electronically transmitted, raises unprecedented issues for the recording of the School's history.

As more and more School business is conducted electronically, the obvious questions to be asked are: where does the responsibility lie for the recording of such business? How much of it realistically should and can be recorded and stored? Is the best method of recording and storing of electronic data to be on paper, or should it, in turn, be electronically stored? Is electronic storage wise, given that the formats used for documents using certain software today may not be readable in the medium or long-term future? A recent report in Victoria, into that State's Public Record Office, revealed that its existing electronic document and records management systems are inadequate for long term accessibility. Sobering, not just for this School's Archives, but for the School generally.

The Museum was privileged to have many visitors throughout the year. The recently retired Curator of History at The Tasmanian Museum and Gallery, Mr. Peter Mercer, visited with his wife, and they were both very impressed with the Museum's aquisitions and displays. Mr. Mercer acknowledged the historical significance of the School's Museum and Archives for the School and Tasmania. The interest on Grandfather's Day, and the regular inquiries locally and from interstate, underline his observation. This resource, opened twelve years ago, is testimony to the hard work of previous Archivists, Staff Members and ultimately to the generosity and far-sightedness of donors down through the years.

Responding to inquiries from researchers continues to be time-consuming because of the incomplete re-cataloguing and transfer of information into one central record. However, the searches, and the often-unrelated discoveries made during those searches, have been generally of mutual benefit to the School and the inquirer. One such beneficiary is the School's Chapel, which now has some of North's drawings of the design of the School's chapel at the former campus in Macquarie Street, to grace its walls.

I attended two stimulating events organised by The Friends of the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery. Kenneth Park, former Curator of Collections at Wesley College, Melbourne, spoke of the innovative designs of new museums (large and small) around the world. The Mt. St.Canice Heritage Museum was the venue for a lecture on and display of the work of the nineteenth century English mastercraftsman, Pugin. (The woodcarver, Ellen Nora Payne, some of whose work the School owns, would have been influenced by Pugin.) Many communities, it seems, are placing Museums and Archives at the top of their priority lists – volunteer enthusiasts, professionals and businesses are collaborating to prepare museums for the new millenium.

# Junior School Sport

nce again the Junior School Sport Programme has offered all of our boys from Year 2 to Year 6 an opportunity to represent the School in a wide variety of sports during 1999. Five out of six relay teams were successful in placing first.

Many boys chose to play Australian Rules this year and gave Mr Barrenger many options when selecting the team each week. The Football team played in the Catholic Schools roster on Thursday afternoons whilst Soccer, Hockey and Minkey were played on Saturday mornings. Great commitment was displayed by boys during the season and once again we were most fortunate to have the assistance of many parents in managing and umpiring teams.

In August we held the House Cross Country Carnival at Dru Point for boys from Kinder to Year 6. All boys participated and we were most fortunate to have a beautifully sunny day. School House began it's winning streak over Buckland followed by Stephens and Thorold. A number of weeks prior to the House Cross Country twenty boys from Years 4, 5 and 6 attended the All Schools Cross Country Championships at Symmons Plains. It was a most enjoyable day with the Under 11 boys awarded the Teams Medallion.

The House Athletics Carnival took place very early in Term Three. This placed a great deal of pressure on the boys and staff to ensure all was in preparation for this most important event. This device, similar to a small gridiron ball with a tail, whistled through the air and covered enormous distances smashing the previous ball throw records. At the end of the

This year we took along a very large team of forty two and all competed very well. Once again our Relay Teams were very strong, winning all but one event.

This year we have had boys representing Hutchins in Table Tennis, Indoor Cricket, Twilight Cricket, Flippa Ball, Rockclimbing, Summer Hockey and Basketball. These teams have shown an extra commitment to sport and to representing the School .

1999 has certainly been a year packed full of sporting involvements and sporting success in the Junior School. With the Olympics in Sydney next year there will be no doubt that the enthusiasm that our boys display for sport will be extended far into the future.

# The Middle School



#### The Head of Middle School

his year, a description of The Hutchins Middle School was the leading article in the respected educational journal In Schools and we were given a very positive report card indeed.

The School was also fortunate to attract, through the efforts of the Headmaster, a substantial research grant from the Federal Government to look at the changes to Middle School over the last eighteen months, as part of the Innovation and Best Practice Project of the University of Sydney. The survey findings, from students, parents and staff, of the independent researcher, Associate Professor Joan Abbott-Chapman, were strongly encouraging of the ethos and practice in Middle School, and drew a number of enquiries from schools around the country seeking to emulate some of the innovations discussed.

"This year saw the inaugural House Music competition, modelled on the popular Senior School format at which Middle School boys have been spectators for some years."

Enrolments in Middle School for 1999 remained steady at close to 220 boys, equally divided between Years 7 and 8. It was a typically busy year, the first full year in the new facilities, and one marked by an extraordinary number of top performances by students in all kinds of fields, reported elsewhere in this magazine by the hard-working Year Heads, Chris French and Janet Waters.

Head of Middle School, Russell Morton, was invited to deliver a paper on Middle Schooling at the annual conference of the International Coalition of Boys' Schools in Nashville, Tennessee.

Year 8 Tutor Chris Berndt attended a national conference on Middle Schooling in Melbourne, whilst Chris French also spent some time in Melbourne looking closely at the organisation of sport at major independent schools.

#### Staff

After working in other areas of the School, Anna Cazaly joined the full-time staff as a Year 7 Tutor and teacher of LOTE and English. 






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## Senior School

He emphasised the importance of teaching and learning the 'soft skills' - problem solving, working with others, conflict resolution and developing good communication skills. Without these skills an education is incomplete. These skills are learnt in all areas of school life - the classroom, the sports fields, the Performing Arts Centre, the Tutor Group, the House and in the family home to name just a few.

This school provides a vast range of activities for boys to choose from. We can only encourage them to get involved and do their best. This is the message given to every new boy to the school. We believe that there is something for everyone at Hutchins, all a student has to do is go out and seek a new challenge. Let me share a few highlights of the year to illustrate the variety of opportunities there are to develop the life skills mentioned.

Who would have thought we would have a student representing his country at Rock Climbing in San Francisco. That is exactly what James Cameron in Year 9 has done.

Enterprise and Marketing competitions have become very popular with our students. Arthur Pitman and Jason Siu won the ASX Sharemarket Game for the third time in a row. Their earnings are now in excess of \$1,500. William Bignall was a speaker at the Youth Business Forum at Wrest Point. Sam Trethewey won the State Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition and Justin Hallock and Adam Stankiewicz were Group Category winners. Martin Scott won \$350 for an Export product plan. The economic future of Tasmania could well lie in the hands of our young entrepreneurs. They are certainly learning the importance of planning ahead.

Arthur Pitman and Oscar Potter won Scholarships to attend the National Science Summer School and Nicholas Starkey was one of only three Tasmanian students selected to attend the National Mathematics Summer School. Congratulations also to Matthew Woolley who won first prize (\$100) in

the Senior Section of the Tasmanian Mathematics Competition. James Field won the Public Speaking Section of the Lions Club Youth of the Year Award. Daniel Copping won the Diana Large Memorial Award at the Hobart Eisteddfod while James Shoobridge won the Adjudicator's Choice Trophy for an Individual Performer. Daniel and James topped off the season by joining Simon Martin in winning the Senior Schools Debating trophy for the first

time in ten years.

Mr Web, the Hutchins Web Design Team, won the State award in the Australian Schools Web Challenge. The team of David Townsend, Arthur Pitman, Peter Bardenhagen and Richard Charlton were guided by Mr Kent Moore and sponsored by St John's Hospital. They are happy to prepare a Web Site for any business - at a price of course!

Joel Bevin won the "My Vision for Tasmania" Essay Award conducted by the Order of Australia Association. Essay writing is a vital skill and our boys are keen competitors in the school Essay and Short Story writing competitions

On the sporting side pride of place must probably go to Tim Hazell on being selected in the State Under 18 Australian Rules Football Carnival and later on his drafting to the Hawthorn Football Club. The real challenge now starts for Tim.

Simon Gardner will tour South Sam Madden is fast developing into

Africa with the Australian Boys' Water Polo Team in December. Nathanial Symmons made the National Under 18 team for the second time. Tom Windsor and Sam Halliday were State selections. one of our States brightest swimming prospects. He had a highly successful Tasmanian Short Course Swimming Championship, winning seven gold medals. He broke eight records, including one set by Australian swimmer Scott Goodman.

Orienteering continues to flourish as it provides a mental and physical challenge. Ben Robinson came first in the Men's 18A Section at the Australian three day Orienteering Championships. The Hutchins rugby team was again well represented at State level by Tim

Starkey, Ben Gray Sebastian Carr, Stuart Ecob and Ben Robinson. Bigger and older players, backed up by supporters who sometimes forgot the purpose of the game, frequently challenged them. This game provides a real test of self control and the 1999



organization of most House matters.




#### Term 1



## The Curriculum

### The Director of Studies

hat a pleasure to report on last years results and developments this year!

#### **Exceptional Year 12 TCE Results**

Last year was a magnificent year for academic achievement with outstanding results at a state level. Our leavers covered themselves with academic glory. The number of boys who qualified for university entrance rose from 74 the year before to 92 last year. This is the second highest number ever. Hutchins achieved the highest number of perfect Tertiary Entrance Scores of 100 in the state. This does not mean that only a few boys at the top did exceptionally well. What is so pleasing is that the increase in performance was across the whole year group, particularly amongst the middle level boys. One gains a measure of their achievement by looking at the mean Tertiary Entrance Score which last year rose from 60 to 66. A further measure is the improved performance of these boys last year over their own Year 11 performance. Some research has been done into why this group of boys performed so well. It cannot be attributed to an unusual general ability. What appears to have made the difference was an outstanding work ethic. The whole school family congratulates them all on their outstanding performance.

I would like to particularly recognise Chris Line's outstanding record of achievement over the last two years. I am sure he would not mind my reporting that he studied 10 pre-tertiary subjects and gained 197 tertiary entrance points over two years. In 1997 he gained outstanding achievement on four pre-tertiary subjects (ie. 78 points). Last year he gained OA results on six pre-tertiary subjects (ie. 119 points). This is the best performance by any boy to date. I have no doubt we will here much of Chris in the future.

The following boys gained Tasmania University Scholarships: Mark Evenhuis in Arts/ Law, Martin Matthews in Information Systems and Simon Binny in Biomedical Science. Marcus Yong would have received a University Scholarship in Science but wished to study Medicine. William Moase was offered a University Scholarship in Engineering but decided to study Mecatronics at the University of Melbourne. Stephen Catchpole received an Engineering Scholarship from the University of New South Wales. Philip Bender (1997 leaver) received the George Washington Walker Trust Bank Scholarship in Commerce.

There were many outstanding individual results. In the seven year history of the TCE

only five boys have achieved perfect scores of 100: Andrew Sypkes in 1994, Richard Davis and Michael Evenhius in 1995 and Phillip Bender in 1997. Last year there were ten perfect scores of 100. These boys deserve very special congratulations for their fine achievement : Stephen Catchpole, Adam Eijdenberg, Mark Evenhius, Nathan Harris, Roy Kwan, Chris Line, Martin Matthews, Will Moase, Tim Pitman and Marcus Yong. Other exceptionally high scores were achieved by Simon Binny, Lucas Plumb (99), Jeff Brett (94), Andrew Beck, Peter Lockett and Tim Beckett (96), Andrew Chung and Will Lamprill (95), Richard Maddock (92), Greg Steedman (94), Nick Bamford, Ben Heaven and Matthew Williams (91), Phil Beattie and Will Mollard (90), Luke Bereznicki and Zac Johnston (89), Andrew Greenhill (87)Sam Dermody, Sam Ekins and Michael Ross (86), Edward Edgell, Matt Irons and Peter Pakulski (85), Will Gamlin (84), Tom Larkey and Alex Miller (81). I have no doubt we will hear much of these boys as they continue their studies at university.

#### A Focus on Academics

The work done last year and this year has been part of a continuing effort to produce the very best academic results. By this I mean staff and students working together to enable each boy to achieve the best personal results of which he is capable. For the first time we administered academic matters together with pastoral matters through the House Tutor. Tutors have been directly involved in counselling on course choice and monitoring academic performance with the aid of reports developed on the academic database. There is a new section in the Student Diary where the boys are able to keep track of their results. This has assisted the Tutor/Parent partnership, which is so important for academic progress. There is no doubt that a key factor in academic success is improved student work ethic. The school promotes this through such activities as: study skills courses, after school tutorials, setting and checking homework, encouraging personal management skills and the use of the diary and counselling, and reporting on academic progress including effort.

### The Teaching and Learning Project

The Teaching and Learning project addresses a range of issues. The first is the unique nature of a single sex boys' school which drives us to look at how we can provide more effectively for boys learning needs in the classroom? The second is a response to developing research on multiple-intelligence which is helping us to better understand the emotional and social development in boys. The third is a need to develop new units of study in the Middle School. Fourthly, a need to address concerns about boys and literacy and lastly, the need to provide more adequately for gifted boys.

This year the project involved teams of teachers who met regularly to talk about teaching and learning, to share teaching practice and to make our understanding of boys learning a more explicit part of teaching at Hutchins. Current research into change in schools makes it clear that collaboration between teachers is an essential component of successful implementation.

#### Information Technology

Once again there was a significant effort made to upgrade our computer facilities. The Business Lab was refitted with new computers and more computers were put into the libraries. The network was extended to include the Centre for Excellence, Science Block, Early Learning Centre and the Design and Technology Block. All that remains now is the Chapel, Gymnasium and Boarding House, which will all be online by the start of 2000. The major expenditure next year will be the upgrade of the Middle School Lab and the provision of small clusters of computers in areas of the school.

#### Literacy

The Literacy Committee, formed this year, was made up of staff representatives from the mini-schools. Rather than attempting to set benchmarks or cover ground that is already well worn at both state and national levels, the committee decided to look at specific ways to improve reading, spelling and writing at Hutchins. It explored a range of possibilities to extend Year 7 to 10 boys in their reading programs and suggested strategies for the school to implement. It also looked at spelling and writing, for example, finding a realistic balance between handwritten and wordprocessed material, and made a number of recommendations to Faculty Heads. The committee stressed the need for every teacher in every faculty to take responsibility for literacy at Hutchins.

### SRC Curriculum Executive

The SRC Curriculum Executive continues to grow and develop a broad range of curriculum activities. This year the Executive members were: Ben Wild (Chairman), Matthew Banks (Secretary), Eric Daniel, Finn Dorney (Clubs and Societies), Richard Headlam, James Jenkins (Learning Programs), Alex Deane, Richard Chopping (Curriculum Review), Richard Griggs and Alex Thomson (Activities). They have had a very busy and successful year offering an extended program on 1998.

They arranged and conducted a large number of events which included: a house 'cross-age' tutoring program for year 9 boys, a survey of Summer and Winter Sports Day arrangements, Clubs and Societies Day, a review of the Student Diary, Young Achiever Australia, a defensive driving course, a speed reading course, dancing lessons for the Year 12 leavers, the 'Battle of the Bands', the House Challenge, 3 on 3 Basketball Competition, the Beep Fest, the Hutchins Gift, Torporama and publication of a Clubs and Societies Brochure, an Examination Study Guide and a Course Choice Guide. This year has seen the development of an SRC Intranet site where all boys have access to the working papers for each of the committees. It has also seen an expansion of the school web page site. Special credit is due to Tod Sirawattananon for the very successful overseas and exchange student site. A particularly successful feature of this year was the Scholars





## **Business** and Enterprise

he following are just a few of the activities which boys have participated in this year. Our aim is to develop the attitudes and skills which will enable them to take control of their lives and to see themselves as their greatest source of opportunity.

#### Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition

Students studying Year 10 Commercial Studies & Technology are required to prepare a business plan for a hypothetical business of their own which is then submitted to the Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition (Tasmanian Division) sponsored by Business Educators Australasia (BEA). Sam Trethewey won the Tasmanian individual section with his plan for a Bathtime Nanny and represented Tasmania at the national finals. The Bathtime Nanny is a very innovative concept in the home health and safety area and received favourable comment from health professionals who attended the presentation dinner. #### E Team

During August, five Year 11 boys participated in the E Team program. E Team is a structured workplace problem- solving experience that focuses on quality management and enterprise. ## Careers and Vocational Education

ver recent years, much has been said in the media, in published tomes and by all sorts of experts around the world, about the changing nature of the workplace and the global market environment. We cannot deny that the world of work is different now from what it was a decade ago, but hopefully the desire 'to work' or to participate in the provision of some meaningful service or production, will continue to be the opportunity for our children.

For those with teenage children in their last years of schooling, or young adults at TAFE or University, the latter part of the year is a time when more questions are asked, more concern expressed, more interest taken, and more panic or obvious uncertainty shown, about future work and life.

There are many problems and challenges about what to do next and decisions have to be made: subject choices for next year and whether they are relevant to career options; whether to try for a job or continue to study; whether to take a year off for an exchange program or work to make some money before going on to study; and the choices to be made between courses and institutions.

However career development activities should go on all through the year and it is my job within the School to provide a range of opportunities for this to occur. Research and counselling should be done and chances taken to look into the world of work. It is also important to acknowledge the wide range of work-life skills that are developed at school across the range of subjects, including sports and extra-curricula activities.

There is, of course, no one right answer to many of the 'career planning' concerns, but as parents we expect that our children will get it all together. Let's face it, did we really know what we wanted to do when we were their age? Was it easier way back then? In fact we probably thought we had it all figured out, but what were our parents thinking about the decisions we were making?

How much should we get involved and step in to take charge? My advice is to back off to a large degree; let them do the running. We need to encourage them and seek to provide opportunities for them to explore, but we cannot seek to live our life through their potential career choice. We cannot make 'our' decision for them. However research does show that career choice is one area where young people still value their parents' opinions.

The work-life we have been experiencing over recent years will be the same for them. As they enter the workforce in the next century,

change, re-training and many short career phases, will be the norm. Some of these many jobs may be in a similar vocational area, but others will be in fields unrelated to those that have gone before. This will provide opportunity to move on, rather than to be stuck in one field for a long period of time.

So how can you plan a 30-40 year 'career'? The answer is that you can't anymore. Take heart, that we as humans do adjust to change and our young will make it in the brave new world. As parents we should be encouraging them to make the most of all the learning experiences they can have and to acquire the range of workplace and life 'competencies' needed to cope with the future...but it is their life.





magination and method have been explored this year to develop some Lexciting results. The range of work and the application of technique to create a wide variety of effects and uses for our native materials has been stunning. Through the stewardship of Kent Moore, Roy Servant, Anthony Hyland, Chris Berndt, Rodney Berndt and Tom Turbett the boys have taken an individualistic approach to a wide range of design briefs. With some boldly creative solutions they have shown that they are capable of amazing things.

#### Electronics

The Electronics workshop has now been fully operational for one year and is achieving its objectives of offering students better storage for projects, a greater range of tools which are suitable for the construction of electronic circuits, easier access to the facility's computers and more physical space.

Greater use of computers has saved time with students being able to simulate circuits quickly. The quality of finished circuit boards is also improved as students are able to draw circuit board negatives, print them out and use a light sensitive circuit board manufacturing process which has a high level of accuracy.

A diverse range of electronics projects have been produced this year and these include a light switching box by David Bell; Ph meter by Adam Kean; intercom by Rohan Clifford; portable CCD camera linked to the Hutchins School web site by Justin Hallock and Oliver Perkins; and a temperature meter by Anthony Kelsall.

#### Design in Wood

#### Year 11 / 12

In keeping with the tradition of personal designs evolving into interesting projects the matrics found the first brief of an executive toy rather challenging. Some excellent work was done with Nick Randall and James McShane producing two totally different but effective examples. Other pieces of high quality work this year

have been Nick Randall's veneered cabinet; Richard Clark's steel, timber and glass table; and James McShane's Blackwood and steel occasional table.

#### Year 10

The Year 10 classes were presented with design briefs ranging from incorporating stone to sculpting an athletic performance in timber and brass. A very talented group showed a lot of creativity and inventiveness In their designs. Andrew Morrisby's sculpted ice hockey player; David Brooks's cricket player and Brandon Servant's track athlete were exceptional.

#### Design in Metal

The main project for Year 11 was the construction of outdoor furniture using a combination of Sandstone and Metal. The quality of these projects make it hard for individuals to standout, but some notable pieces were Adam Jones' "Bird Bath": Stuart Burbury's "Outdoor Table": Chris Button's "Wood Rack": Caroline Sutherland's "Brazier"; and Richard Simpson's "Rock Guitar". Year 10 produced some wonderful clocks earlier in the year. The students are currently working on furniture using a diverse range of materials. Joshua Tomlin, Cameron Wurf, Patrick Harradine and Sam Healey are creating some notable pieces of work.

Year 9 started the year designing and producing a range of candleholders. Recently they have been designing and making their own fishing lures and accessories. Xavier Goc produced some great lures and a wonderful fish landing net. Caleb Lang has developed a range of experimental lures that are sure to land the big one. Other earnest workers have been Anders Marchant, Josh Crossin and Henric Nicholas, who has been working tirelessly on the school's electric locomotive.

### **Design Graphics**

Year 9 students have had the opportunity to discover a diverse range of drawing techniques and conventions throughout the year, with a large majority of students excelling in all aspects of the course.

One of the challenges this year was to design and construct a bridge with a maximum weight of 500g. It was then tested to breaking point, some bridges withstanding weights up to 85 kg. Notable structures were those of Tim Cooper & Alan Hales, Josh Crossin & Matthew Drury and Julian Balcombe & Rowan Oliver.

Alan Hales, Joshua Crossin, Matthew Drury and John Cooper have consistently produced drawings of exceptional quality.

Year 10 students have continued to build on from a successful Year 9 year. David Roberts, Brandon Servant, Karl Walker and Matt Gardner all deserve a special mention for their committment and participation in all aspects of the Design Graphics course. We wish all the boys well as they continue with their studies.

#### Computer Graphics and Design

The senior boys continue to respond very well to the graphics and design components of the course. Various aspects of Computer Graphics have been covered, including 3D modelling, animation and multi-media presentation.

Many design briefs have been solved, exposing our boys to the design process and the opportunity to be creative. The subject continually evolves and it is now possible to specialise in nearly any strand of design and computer graphics.

This year exceptional work has come from David Townsend, Arthur Pitman, Philip Freeman, Adrian Bold, Tom Bignell, Tod Sirrawattanonan, Ben Turner and Alastair Walsh.

## English

s a K-12 school we are in a strong position to provide a language and A position to provide a language and literature program that has breadth, depth and, above all, continuity: such an opportunity should never be undervalued.

At the secondary level, Hutchins has an English curriculum with clear pathways for Years 7 to 10, as preparation for the pretertiary TASSAB syllabuses. Our courses range from the traditional literary canon to hypertext, from Socratic enquiry to media studies, from formal language skills to creative writing. As English teachers we need to be flexible and innovative in our thinking, planning and teaching; and our students need to see the relevance of different course components, to feel secure in what they are doing and be confident about taking risks.

In February we welcomed Mr Tom Daly and in June Mr Curtis Smith on a teacher exchange with Mr James Macleod who is in Texas for a year. Colleagues and students have appreciated their expertise and enthusiasm.

This year 291 boys entered the Australian Schools English Competition. There were 84 credits, 36 distinctions and 8 high distinctions which were awarded to the following boys: Jonathon Manning, Charles Spiegel and Dylan Viney (Year 7); Joseph Aston, David Millington and Edward Webster (Year 10); Nick Chapman and Richard Charlton (Year 11). Charles, David, Edward and Nick were awarded medals for being top in Tasmania in their respective divisions.

In association with The Literary and Debating Society, the faculty held four very enjoyable evenings of Poetry and Prose in Performance in April and May, involving a large number of students from Year 3 to Year 12.

Former head of the English Department at the University of Tasmania, Professor Emeritus Adrian Colman, who judged the finals, spoke very favourably of the material chosen and the high levels of performances. Winners were Matthew Mulcahy (Junior), Greg Irons (Intermediate) and James Shoobridge (Senior),

Hutchins was very fortunate to have wellknown writer Margaret Scott to judge the Short Story and Poetry Writing Competitions which are run each year for students from Years 7 to 12; and the finalists enjoyed chatting informally with Dr Scott about their writing after she had spoken at Headmaster's Assembly. Short Story winners were Andrew Bennett (Junior), David Millington (Intermediate) and James Field (Senior). Poetry Writing winners were Jonathon Cook (Junior), Rowan Ashby (Intermediate) and James Field again (Senior). James also won the Writers Workshop Zum Cafe Poetry Reading Award.

In the Dorothea Mackellar Competition, out of a maximum of 20 entries allowed from any one school, 15 Hutchins boys received commendation, and the following received certificates of high commendation: Robert Joyce and David Halvorsen (Year 10), Eric Daniel and Nick Chapman (Year 11) and Ben Gray (Year 12).

### Mathematics

his year over 150 students in Years 7 to 12 took part in a number of Mathematics competitions. Many of these boys received awards of various kinds. The main purpose of this article is to recognize the achievements of those boys who performed at the highest level in these competitions.

The Tasmanian Schools Mathematics Competition was held in May. In this competition the First Prize (\$100) in the Senior Section was won by Matthew Woolley (Year 12). In the Intermediate Section, 'Outstanding Awards' (\$25) were won by Aup Koohapremkit and Andrew Morrisby in Year 10 and in the Junior Section, by Vaughan Allen and Dean Rollins (Year 8) and by Ronan Fenton (Year 7).

The Australian Mathematics Competition was held in August. The following boys received High Distinction awards in that competition: Ben McKay, Andrew Simmons, John Eland, Isuru Amarasena, William Kay (Year 9), Tom Mills, Jack Madden (Year 8) and Charles Fish and Ronan Fenton (Year 7).

Each year in August, schools from all over Tasmania take part in a Mathematics Relay Competition organized by the Mathematical Association of Tasmania. This involves teams, each made up of four students, competing against each other in a problem solving competition. Hutchins' teams came second and third in the Years 11/12 section of this competition and third in both the Years 9/10 and Years 7/8 sections. The boys involved were Matthew Woolley, Bice Dibley, Chris Halse-Rogers, Matthew Smith and Aaron Buckland (Year 12), Arthur Pitman and Nick Starkey (Year 11), Andrew Morrisby, Aup Koohapremkit, Ian Pang and Duncan Forbes (Year 10) and Jonathon Manning, Lee Andrewartha, Robert Easther and Hayden Farquhar (Year 8).

In September we learnt that Nick Starkey, who in recent years has won numerous awards in both State and National competitions, has been invited to attend the National Mathematics Summer School in Canberra in January 2000. Nick is one of only three Tasmanian students to be invited to this gathering of 75 of Australia's brightest young mathematicians.

## Physical Education and Recreational Studies

he Physical Education Faculty has continued to work towards best practice over the past twelve months. Sport science has again been very popular and the boys have produced some high quality work. One outstanding research topic was presented by Michael Ashbolt (Year12), who investigated the comparative levels of UV radiation between land and water based sports. Years 9 and 10 have been undertaking the new Health and Physical Education syllabuses and next year we will be introducing new syllabuses for sport science in Years 9 to 12.

Mr Stewart has once again worked tirelessly caving, walking, climbing, sailing, kayaking, rafting and driving the bus in the Outdoor Education program. I am sure that all the boys are very grateful that we have such an experienced and qualified person in the school to run the program. The old Hutchins Award will continue until all boys have completed their award levels. ## Humanities and Religious Studies

t has been a busy year for the members of the Faculty of Humanities. The process of adjusting began early in the year when Alison Smithies and Andrew Webber attended a conference which introduced them to a new Civics course called 'Discovering Democracy'. They learned about the course, ways of teaching it and about a new, interactive CD rom which teaches students about our political culture. She will be able to see at first hand contrasts between Chinese rural and industrial life.

The Religious Studies Department was given a shot in the arm with two visits to Tasmania from Dr Peter Vardy, an outstanding educationalist and scholar from England. He introduced Father John Goodwin, Trish Knight, Lance Morrisby, Barrie Irons and Andrew Webber to the highly successful British model of Religious Studies - the so-called 'Five Strand

hroughout 1999 many hours of work have been given to restore and commission our new flight simulator. The Cessna 172 was purchased from the mainland after it had been dismantled and cut up for spares. The aircraft now sits in D1 in the Middle School with an adjacent classroom which will be developed into an appropriate briefing/teaching room.

Tango Hotel Sierra is superbly painted and has a new interior. At this stage curriculum support material is being developed together with a variety of certificate levels of accomplishment so all teachers can use the flight centre as a cross curriculum teaching and learning tool. 


### Hutchins and the World Wide Web

Congratulations to David Townsend, Arthur Pitman, Richard Charlton and Peter Bardenhagen on being National Runners-Up and Highly Commended for their website which celebrated the centenary of St John's Hospital.



### **Outdoor Education**

The Outdoor Education program this year took boys from all classes from Year Three to Year Nine to sites pertinent to curricular studies in a number of disciplines. Boys were fortunate to have the additional leadersip of two fine and capable young men: Sam Warren from the UK, a British Army scholarship holder who shone in his ability to teach and to organise efficiently, and our first student assistant, Nicholas Bryant, from the Wynbery School in South Africa.

Year Three went to Port Arthur to look at some of the skeletons in Van Diemen's Land's historical closet while Year Four went to the Adamsons Forestry area, the Geeveston Forest Museum, Catamaran and Esperence. Year Five went to the Southport Campus to study the formation of caves and Year Six travelled across to the East Coast 'Eden' Maria Island to examine the aboriginal and European history of that beautiful place.

Year Seven learned to look after themselves on an overnight walk to the far South Coast. They camped in tents, cooked with fuel stoves and packed and carried all they needed in rucksacs. This intense experience begins the phase of the Outdoor Program which is more centred on the wilderness. In Year Eight the boys did a week-long camp in the Eastern Tiers, centred at Little Swanport. The thrust of this program was to teach boys to be self-sufficient over a more extended period by navigating themselves in remote and challenging country, camping and cooking and safely doing an extended flat-water kayak trip. Teamwork and time and resource management are key factors in the successful completion of these journeys. In Year Nine the camps, again at the Southport Campus, emphasised acquatic skill acquisition. Boys could choose from windsurfing, bodyboarding, snorkelling, fishing, sailing and kavaking as well as climbing and abseiling. The voluntary Year Ten walks went to the Labyrinth in the Lake St Clair National Park. Centred at a base camp at Pine Valley, boys from Years 10 to12 and girls from Collegiate went walking, rock climbing and exploring in the superb mountains of that area, building still further the skills they have acquired in their Outdoor Education program.

#### The Duke of Edinburgh's Award

It is available to any student looking for challenge, adventure and personal development. 
