The Board has faced a number of challenges this year. Changes in the way education is delivered and falling numbers in Tasmania, have meant that the Board has needed to look closely at the financial operations of the school. 

From the Headmaster

"Not letting the future bug us"

The world successfully saw through the Y2K bug and was left wondering whether there really was such a threat posed to mankind - we will never know. Certainly the celebrations marking the Year 2000, which occurred at the same time, conveyed optimism and joy. This optimism was later seen during the Olympics. It was difficult not to be caught up in the fever, beginning with a magnificent opening ceremony that tastefully portrayed the history of Australia and concluding with an equally marvellous closing ceremony. In between, our athletes did us proud.

Africa continues to be ravaged by AIDS, and man's inhumanity to man is seen in Zimbabwe, Northern Ireland, East Timor, Sri Lanka, and a hundred other places. The Western World is undergoing outsourcing, downsizing, restructuring, rationalising and globalising - in the process, many individuals find change difficult to handle. Old skills are no longer required and new skills must be learnt. The gap between those who are successful and those who are unsuccessful in this new economy is increasing.

Australia's economy is doing well, despite an appalling exchange rate and the massive hike in oil prices. Tasmania continues to bump along the bottom (it was forgotten on an Olympic commemorative medal) and it faces an aging, declining population. Tasmania's unemployment level is higher than the national average.

Hutchins has just completed its 154th year with 985 students enrolled. The year has been an excellent one with many highlights – Australian winners for webpage design, superb results in external chemistry and physics competitions, and outstanding sporting results to name a few.

The role of schools is changing – web-based curriculum is here; the skills required for employment are changing rapidly; and in the future education will probably be unlike what we have seen before. Hutchins is actively exploring new directions that it believes are essential, so that it remains relevant for today's youth.

Most importantly, in a world where technology has not changed man's ability to inflict pain, it is essential that Hutchins continues to focus on the virtues of tolerance, understanding and caring for our fellow man.

Kevin Walsh

Kevin Walsh grew up in the small north Queensland town of Cardwell, where he attended the local state school. When he was thirteen, the family moved to Townsville, so that Kevin could complete his secondary education. After leaving school, Kevin joined the Christian Brothers' Teaching Order in Sydney, where he undertook two years of religious training, before completing a BSc and a Diploma of Education at the University of Sydney.

Kevin spent the next twelve years teaching at Christian Brothers' schools in Sydney (Strathfield), Canberra and Rockhampton. During that time he completed a BA and a degree in Theology.

Kevin left the Order in 1971 and came to Tasmania. He spent that year at Hutchins before taking up the post of Head of Mathematics at St Virgil's College. Three years later, Kevin returned to Hutchins as Head of Mathematics and he has been the Senior Teacher of Mathematics at Hutchins since then.

Kevin was always an extremely popular teacher, and he will be missed by the Hutchins community. We all wish him well in his retirement.

Bert Smith

After graduating from the University of Tasmania with a Bachelor of Science in 1963, Bert was appointed as a science and mathematics teacher at Ogilvie High School. In 1970 he was appointed to the position of Science Teacher at The Friends' School. He completed his Master of Education at the Tasmanian College of Advanced Education in 1976. In June 1987 Bert came to Hutchins to take up the position of Head of Science.

As Head of Science he has run the Science Faculty as a tight ship, attention to detail being his strong point. He has given excellent support to the science staff over the years, from taking science classes himself to filling in for absent teachers, being a guest demonstrator of the more difficult experiments, or just providing background for others from his vast science knowledge.

Bert's specialty subjects have been physics and chemistry, but he has taught science classes throughout the school. In this respect Bert has been a true educator, a teacher who is able to entertain and challenge students across all age groups. He always has some question for students in order to make them think.

Bert considers the New Scientist magazine a "must read", using it frequently as a source of discussion topics with his classes. He has been generous with his time out of class, regularly spending his lunchtimes and after school time helping students with their work. In the past few years he has even ventured into soccer team management. Even though the finer intricacies of the offside rule have proved elusive, he has managed the team with extreme efficiency.

Bert has served Hutchins very well. He has been a fierce advocate for science at Hutchins, and has never wavered from an issue that he thought was just. His science knowledge and efficiency will be sorely missed. We wish Bert all the best in his retirement. He will now have more time to devote to keeping fit and study, sharpening his aim on the pistol range, catching more fish (not fancy fly stuff – plain worms or lures will do), computers and the intricacies of Microsoft Windows and travelling. Staff Farewells

Russell Morton

Russell joined the School in 1977 as Senior Chemistry teacher. From 1977 until his departure in 1989 he held the positions of Head of Science, Year Group Head, Assistant to the Headmaster and in 1986 he was appointed Director of Studies. (He left the School for a year in 1982 to run Camp Clayton at Ulverstone as part of his own strongly felt Christian mission). In 1989 he moved to Melbourne to take up his position as Headmaster of Caulfield Grammar School (Wheelers Hill campus).

Russell returned to Hutchins to take up position of Head of Middle School in January 1996. He was the right person at the right time.

His period as Head of the Middle School was marked by two significant developments – a building program which saw the refurbishment of the old buildings, and the erection of new buildings. This created a school that stood on its own and had its own distinct qualities. Russell was an integral figure in the successful planning and reconfiguring of this complex.

Concurrent with the building program was a comprehensive revamping of the curriculum and how this could be best delivered to the students. Again, the successful implementation of this process was very much due to the leadership and hard work of Russell. He brought personal vision and an eye for detail to each of these major tasks.

The school community greatly regrets his departure. His keen mind, experience and capacity to think critically as well as laterally will be sorely missed. He has given unstintingly of his talents to the school, and he has been popular with staff, parents and students.

Russell and Sue – and they are very much a partnership - have accepted posts at Murree Christian School in Pakistan from the beginning of the 2001/2 academic year - Russell as Director and Sue as a teacher of Piano and French. Murree Christian School is a co-educational, K to 12, boarding school for Christian missionaries' children in the foothills of the Himalayas, about 2 hours drive north of the Pakistan capital of Islamabad. Russell and Sue begin cross-cultural training in Melbourne in February 2001

John Millington

The son of an Old Boy and father of an Old Boy, John began his schooling at Hutchins in 1940, where he remained as a pupil until matriculating in 1953.

While a student at Hutchins John Millington was a Prefect, Captain of Buckland House, Cadet Lieutenant, Captain of Boats, Senior Orator, Captain of Athletics, Vice-Captain of Football, winner of the Harvey Rex Memorial Prize and the F M Young Geography Prize and an Honour Badge holder.

After leaving Hutchins, John commenced his teacher training at the Mercer House Training College in Melbourne, where he became senior student in 1955. During his teacher training and immediately after his graduation he was on the staff of Grimwade House, one of the Preparatory Schools of Melbourne Grammar.

John Millington studied part-time for his Bachelor of Arts at the University of Tasmania, graduating in 1968. He has been President of the Tasmanian Registered Teachers Association, a member of the Schools' Registration Board and a member of the Australian College of Education.

He joined the staff of Hutchins in 1957, the same year in which the new Junior School was opened, commencing as one of the Prep V Form Masters and taking on the extra duties of Housemaster, Sportsmaster and coaching football, athletics and cricket. In the Junior School he became deputy to George McKay, Head of Junior School.

John took over from Frank Williams as Head of the Middle School in 1970, where he served tirelessly for twenty-five years until the end of 1994 (John was a student in Frank Williams' first class at Hutchins in 1947!). While in the Middle School John taught Mathematics, English and Social Science at different times, and also did remedial teaching. John resigned as Head of Middle School at the end of 1994. From 1995, he was on the Administrative staff of Hutchins, working as a Senior Master and then as Administrative Assistant, until his retirement in June 2000. In his first year as Senior Master he was actively involved in the preparations for the Sesquicentenary Year.

Significantly, the large double room on the ground floor of the new Middle School, which was officially opened by the former Chairman of the Board, Dr Stephen Gumley, on 3 August 1998, was named for John.

Obituaries

Norman Maxwell Jack 1926 - 2000

Max Jack entered Hutchins in 1932, where he remained as a pupil until matriculating in 1944. In his final year he was elected a School Prefect and was awarded an Honour Badge for outstanding contributions in rowing, athletics and football. While at the University of Tasmania he played football with the Hutchins Old Boys' Football Club, gaining selection in the state team and competing in the Perth Football Carnival in 1948.

His contribution to Hutchins was enormous. He was actively associated with Appeals for over thirty years, he was a member of the Old Boys' Committee from the early 1960s, and was President of the Old Boys' Association in 1970, 1971 and 1973.

In 1974 he was appointed to the Board of Management as an Old Boys' Association representative and completed the maximum term of ten years, including two years as Board Chairman. He was also Chairman of the Membership Committee of the Hutchins Foundation and subsequently a member of the Bequest Committee.

Max was a man who entered whole-heartedly into everything he did. If he couldn't devote himself completely to an enterprise, he would not commit to it. This was true of him in his commitment to the men with whom he worked at the Zinc Works, who were like an extended second family. It was also true of his commitment to service of Hutchins, including the Old Boys and the Board of Management and also to the wider community, including the Board of Clarendon Children's Home and his beloved Bowls Club.

Max was an affable, sociable, charming soul, who adored being surrounded by friends and being involved. He just loved people.

Jack Jennings (Joe) Cowburn 1905 - 2000

An excerpt from the oration delivered by Bishop Robert Davies on 1 February 2000 in memory of Joe Cowburn.

Joe Cowburn's association with the school began when he enrolled in 1921, and continued until his death.

Joe's description of Hutchins in the 1920s is quite vivid. He says it was a place of learning and fun, with overcrowded dormitories and classrooms cluttered with blackboards and desks. There was a handkerchief-sized play area where wire-netted concrete pitches, five courts and a tennis court made trying to kick a football from end-to-end an art form rather than a manly skill. Boys ripped their knees, strained their ankles and tore clothing as they jostled together with bat and ball on the gravel surfaces, and there were often casualties as bicycles tunnelled through boys at play.

As a prefect, Joe admitted he enjoyed a few special privileges. The prefects were herded together in a small room off the main classroom under the school belfry. He recorded that they were often noisy and happy and played music on banjos, cornets and mouth organs – he played a cornet.

In the 1920s Joe shared with Jock Cooke the top honour in sporting activities. They represented the school in six major sports: football, cricket, swimming, rowing, tennis and cross-country running.

Two of Joe's great successes were in 1923 and 1924 when he was stroke of the crew that won the Head of the River. In 1923 it was the first time for twenty years that Hutchins had won the Golden Fleece Cup for the Head of the River.

After Joe left Hutchins he became a journalist for the Mercury. He took over management and control of Mercury activities for news gathering between Oatlands and the Tasman Peninsula. He married Mary Dixon, a life-long friend, but as years went by Mary had a fairly long and trying illness, which necessitated Joe's retirement from an active life as a journalist. She eventually died and Joe moved to Hobart.

He was football captain of New Norfolk in 1926, Foundation Secretary of the New Norfolk Rowing Club and Anglers' Association and was prime mover in the purchase and establishment of the New Norfolk Golf Club. As a champion club golfer he was able to assist in club affairs and development of the game in country areas.

His efforts as a local historian have led to the retention of records of the past era and this is remembered with books published for the National Trust with a fellow and valuable history recorder, Mrs Rita Cox.

After his move to Hobart, Joe continued with his active involvement in sport and was a keen member of Royal Hobart Bowls Club. In 1991 he produced a history of the Club for its Centenary. He also played golf for the Royal Hobart Golf Club and won a singles championship in that sport.

After several years in Hobart Joe married his second wife, Billie, whom he had known for many years, and they were a devoted couple.

We are all thankful to God for Joe, A Man to Remember.

The Hutchins School Cadet Corps

The history of The Hutchins School Cadet Corps is long and varied. Its course spans 98 years from its inception in 1887 to its final disbandment in 1985, and during these years many students of the school passed through its ranks as cadets, NCOs and occasionally as commanding officers. The history of the Corps is something that the School can feel proud of, as throughout its activities it proved to be one of the most disciplined and efficient Corps in the state.





The archives have a wealth of information, awards and photos associated with this 98-year-old tradition. This pictorial history will look at the evolution of the of the Cadet Corp uniform from 1892 to 1985.

The Corps provided opportunities for young Australians to develop personal and team skills of benefit to the individual and wider community. I believe it would be beneficial for Hutchins today. It would give a different focus and perspective on discipline, while fostering a direction for its students.





During the early 1990s, the Headmaster, John Bednall, toyed with the idea of creating a marching band. This was to give the school an identity and unique place in the community. It is a pity that idea never got past stage one. With the current Federal Government promoting this Cadet Scheme, perhaps the students of Hutchins will be able to reignite this once strong tradition.

I would have loved an opportunity to develop team skills whilst being disciplined by the enigmatic Lt Millington and the hard-lined Major Wood!

The mixture in the Hutchins cauldron this year has included work with parents, Old Boys, benefactors, corporate supporters, boys and staff. The fundraising events included the Annual Appeal, the annual Golf Day, the Ausmas Drinks cocktail party, release of a new Hutchins-labelled wine and A Day at the Races. The success of many of these events has been due in no small part to the work of Mrs Ann Reimer, a new appointment to the Development Office – one of the witches toiling over the charmed pot. Other fundraising efforts by the Foundation have been the complete revision of the Investment Committee's policy and a review of where and how investments are made. As the Foundation manages just over \$8m, the careful investments of the Endowment Fund are a crucial aspect of the School's future. Bequests, too, are an important part of our future – and we hope that the line will stretch out to the future. This year Hutchins has received bequests or other gifts making a significant difference to our future.

The year 2000 has been a very busy yet extremely productive year for the Students' Representative Council. The SRC has organised many successful fundraising activities, which have allowed the SRC to improve many aspects of the school community. The success this year can be put down to the hard work of both the Administrative and Curriculum Executives under the guidance of Ms Schafferius and Mr Hodge.

The Administrative Executive

The Administrative Executive, led by Tom Gibson and Ms Schafferius, consists of four portfolios: Socials, Student Welfare, Publications and Community Service.

The Socials Committee, led by Chris Sonneveld and Thanapisal Koohapremkit, organise and run socials for students from grades six to twelve. Their jobs include: communication with cooperating girls schools, sound and lighting, supervisors and beverages. The socials this year ran very smoothly due to Chris and Thanapisal's organisation. Thanks to David Bell and his crew for organizing and running the sound and light at every Hutchins social.

Another 'Ordinary' Year in Middle School

Middle School has completed its 42nd year in fine style.

After the dramatic physical and less obvious changes of the last three years, it was good to have a 'steady-as-she-goes' year, with a full enrolment of cheerful youngsters and a staff team demonstrating increasingly specialized skills at the Middle School level, working together towards good outcomes.

Once again, numerous Middle School boys earned academic distinctions in National competitions, competed with enthusiasm in sport and other co-curricular areas, staged plays, made music, computed, designed, excelled, laughed and learnt. Yes, it was another 'ordinary' year. The written accounts which follow, from Year Heads Janet Waters and Chris French, detail the wealth of achievements by our boys in a huge range of enterprises. I commend these reports to your reading. These are only the visible tips of the icebergs of 'ordinary' achievements. Underpinning these are the efforts by more than 200 boys on a day to day basis, simply trying their best. This largely unseen body of effort, by boys and staff, constitute the real gains in this 'ordinary' year.



On the staff front, Ken Kingston was welcomed back after a year of interesting experiences travelling the world. Two new members of staff began the year with us – Jill Britton who brought extensive first-hand knowledge of France to her French



teaching from her recent residence in that country, and Matthew Sayers whose multi-skilled approach saw him not only teaching a variety of subjects but also producing the Year 7 play 'Robin Hood' with great flair. James McLeod rejoined us in the middle of the year from a spell of teaching in the USA, replacing Curtis Smith who returned to the States.

Leadership in Middle School is vested in the two Year Heads, and I would want to move a huge vote of thanks to both Mrs Waters and Mr French for their quietly effective and hard-working efforts over the entire year. Much of their work is unseen, requiring many hours of thinking, of planning and of working one-on-one with boys and staff. We are all in their debt.

As part of the larger school, Middle School has again enjoyed dedicated and total support, direction and encouragement from the Headmaster, Mr Toppin. If anything, he has spent a greater proportion of his time with us this year, teaching nearly half of the Year 8 boys how to construct their own web sites in what has proved one of our more popular choices of electives. Similarly, Mr Irons has always had time, in between his onerous responsibilities as both Head of Senior School and Deputy Head, to give advice, support and encouragement to Middle School staff and boys.


In keeping with our practice of extending the program each year in ways which enable boys to develop more broadly, 2000 saw the introduction of Inter-House Theatre Sports. Old Boy Simon Martin trained the teams and under the expert oversight of Michelle Weeding the competition proved a popular spectacle for the Mini-School and a worthwhile educational exercise for some 50 boys.

Cooperative programs with Collegiate were also popular and two full days were devoted to joint games, one day hosted at Hutchins and the other at Collegiate. Lyn Ramsdale from Collegiate and Chris French carried the weight of the complex organization for these days. The input of the Prefects was felt, especially through the efforts of James Laird, in the leadership training and peer mediation programs, as well as in a more general way around the grounds at sporting events. Their good work has been made all that more effective by the support they have had from their peers, and the training they undertook in their own time.

Mr Dear's quietly effective work behind the scenes has again been a feature of this 'ordinary' year. Whether taking the Independent Learning unit for Year 8 boys who want help with planning and study methods, running Peer Leadership camps, organizing peer mediation sessions, encouraging struggling students or working with staff, his influence in his third year as School Counsellor continues to increase in significance and value. 


"Education of the whole person is so vital"

Richard Charlton (Year 12) gained an Award in the Ilford "Symmetry" Photographic competition. Jamie McLoughlin won a prestigious Short Story Writing Competition.

Ben Robinson represented Tasmania in the National Schools Orienteering Championships. He has also been presented with a Queen's Scout award. Simon Enman was presented with his Bronze Duke of Edinburgh Award during the year.

Our sailors too have been very busy.
Hutchins won the Schools Sailing Regatta
and represented the State in the Team
Sailing National Championships where we
placed third. Matthew Banks together with
crew of Trent Strickland and Victoria Banks
won the Australian 12-foot Cadet
Championship held in Hobart.

Sam Madden qualified to compete in the Short-Course World Cup Swimming Championships in December. He broke six Tasmanian records at the national titles. Scott Wells, Andrew Dawson, Sam Madden and Joe Pemberton represented us at the 6th Pacific School Games.

It was great to win the Head of the River for the twenty-third (out of 42) time since the boys' Eights were introduced in 1959. James Murdoch stroked the crew. We also won the prestigious Aggregate Trophy again.

Stuart Ecob, our First XV Rugby captain, was selected in the Australia B Schools team after the National Championships in Brisbane. Ben Crosswell continues to impress on the soccer field being selected to represent Australia at the Under 17 level.

James Cameron is now the best under 17 competition rock climber in Australia. There are now more and more boys competing in this demanding sport.

Australian Rules football had a great year with the First and Second XVIII winning their respective Premiership. The First XVIII had the rare distinction of going through a season unbeaten. Xavier Goc played in the State U16 Football team.

Jon-Ho Chan, Andrew Twin and Isuru Amarasena (all Year 10) came first in the Tasmanian Titration competition. This team also won the Spaghetti Bridge Building Competition at University Open Day.

Richard Griggs won both the boys 16-17 years and the Open Junior trophy at the Ben Lomond Ski races.

Matthew Holmes and Ben Walter have been highly successful in their Go-Kart racing. Both have won State Titles.

Michael Shaw, Eric Daniel, Toby Ekins, Sarah Hewer (Collegiate) won the Australian Institute of Physics Quiz. This is the third year in a row that a Hutchins team has won the Quiz.

Shaun King has completed his National Umpiring Accreditation Scheme Course with boundary umpiring in Australian Rules. Will we soon see him in action at the MCG²

At the Awards Assembly the Headmaster presented Honour Badges to Matthew Banks (for Caps in Cricket, Hockey and Sailing), Thomas Gibson (for Caps in Athletics, Australian Rules, Rowing and Swimming), James Jenkins (for Caps in Athletics, Australian Rules and Cricket), Benjamin Robinson (for Caps in Music - Instrumental, Orienteering and Rugby), Simon Taylor (for Caps in Australian Rules, Basketball and Rowing) and Alex Thomson (for Caps in Athletics, Australian Rules, Cricket and Water Polo).

Director of Studies Report

1999 Leavers

Last year was a very good year for academic achievement with some of our best results at a state level. 94 percent of the 1999 leavers qualified for university entrance. This says a lot about the hard work and success of our weaker and middle level ability boys, particularly when one compares it to the previous year when the percentage qualifying for university entrance was 86.8. As the school push on academics builds, we are seeing a reduction in low scores and a higher number of boys who achieve solid middle level scores.

Two Hutchins boys achieved the equivalent of perfect Tertiary Entrance Scores of 100. Matthew Woolley deserves a very special mention. He is the first Tasmanian student to gain a TER of 100 in year 11 and again in year 12. His Interstate transfer Index (ITI) was the highest possible at 99.95. Aaron Buckland was very close behind Matthew with an ITI of 99.90. Hutchins had two students in the top six in the state.

We are proud of the achievements of all our leavers but we particularly congratulate those who gained Tasmania University Scholarships: Matthew Woolley, Tasmania National Undergraduate Scholarship in Engineering (valued at \$10,000 per year for 4 years), Gregory Steedman, Yr 12 leaver 1998 Deloitte Touche Tohmatsu Tasmania University Scholarship in Commerce (valued at \$2,500 per year for 3 years), and Adam Abdul-Rahman won the Thompson & Brett Scholarship in Engineering (valued at \$2000 for his final year in Engineering).

Philip Bender, who you'll remember won the now historical 'Trust Bank' scholarship last year, has continued his success with an astonishing list of university prizes:

1999: Australian Society of Certified Practising Accountants Prize for academic excellence in the 2nd year;

1999: TCCI Prize for best performance in Economics for Business;

1999: PricewaterhouseCoopers Prize in Accounting for academic excellence in 2nd year Accounting; 1999: Sir Herbert Nicholls Common Law Prize for greatest proficiency in both Torts and Contracts; 1999: Butterworths Prize for the highest marks for Contract, he was placed on the Dean's Roll of Excellence for 1999

Chris Line won the Thomas Normoyle Prize for proficiency in First Year Engineering. Adam Eijdenberg and Martin Matthews won a M J Rees Prize for First Year Information Systems.

Many outstanding individual results amongst the 1999 leavers complemented Matthew Woolley and Aaron Buckland's perfect scores of 100. The number of boys who gained scores in the 90s increased last year - these are also exceptional students (I have listed them in descending order): Nathan Moore, Alistair Kan, Michael Ashbolt, Mark Alcock, Christopher Halse-Rogers, Tim Starkey, Bice Dibley, James Field, Grant Miller, Sebastian Carr, William Whitehouse and James Walker. Some 23% of boys studying pretertiary subjects obtained the highest award of Outstanding Achievement, while 63% obtained a High Achievement or better. We offer our congratulations to all these boys.

We are also proud of our 1999 year 11 boys, particularly those recognised by a University of Tasmania Certificate of Achievement: Mathew Baldwin, Nicholas Champion, Richard Charlton, Richard Clark, Eric Daniel, Robert Howell, James Murdoch, Arthur Pitman, Oscar Potter, Michael Shaw and Nicholas Starkey.

Curriculum Developments This Year

2000 has been a very active year for curriculum review and development. Work continues on 'integrated studies' in the Middle School. Significant staff development was conducted at the beginning of the year on supporting 'gifted and talented' boys. The Centre for Excellence now runs a major Gifted and Talented Program that not only provides for our boys but also included a number of sessions for the members of Gateways.

Literacy

The Literacy Committee, under the vigorous leadership of Mr Wells, continues to address the literacy needs of our boys. This year we were among one of the first independent schools in Tasmania to participate in the Commonwealth Literacy Benchmark test. The data supplied from this test will help the School better assess and assist the progress of boys throughout their school years.

Studies continue to show that reading remains a vital key to lifting literacy levels. As such Hutchins will be introducing the DEAR programme to all boys in Grade 9 in 2001. 'Drop Everything And Read' sets aside a formal 20 minute period in the school day for boys in Grade 9 to read material of their own choice

Revitalizing years 9 and 10

A group of staff, under the enterprising leadership of Mr Symons, have been exploring ways in which we might revitalise our Years 9 & 10 curriculum.

National evidence (supported by our boys) suggests

some disaffection with these years of schooling. For some it is alienation, for too many it can be under-achievement.

The group is taking a wide range of views into account. This includes considering the School's mission statement, the Adelaide declaration on the purposes of schooling, input from mainland schools, the desires of our professional teachers and committed parents and, just as importantly, the needs of the boys. It involves addressing some fundamental questions. What emphasis do we place on: language and communication, on enterprise and vocational education, on developing a global perspective, on connecting with the wider community, on valuing personal expression in the creative and performing arts, on the value of adolescent physical and mental health?

K to 10 Curriculum Reviews

This year we completed extensive reviews of curriculum content from Kindergarten to Year 10 in the faculties of Science and in Modern Languages. The purpose was to ensure continuity of experience for boys across these years. We want to avoid needless repetition of content and ensure a progressive build-up of skills and knowledge. Some particularly valuable work was put into developing a new Early Learning Centre program in science. My thanks go to Mr Smith (Science) and Mr Wilson (Modern Languages) for their leadership of this work.

PE & Health

Mr Young went on sabbatical leave to the United States of America where he studied Physical Education programs with particular reference to health. As a result of his leadership The Tasmanian Secondary Assessment Board have adopted the Hutchins Health and PE Program as a model for the development of these health and physical education subjects across the state.

Information Technology

There were significant developments during the year in IT and network management services. The Internet connectivity improved with increased bandwidth. The Hutchins community can now 'dial in' to access the school's Intranet and Library catalogues via the School's Internet website. A new website has been developed for implementation at the start of the new academic year. The IT Committee included the two Student IT Committee Leaders, David Townsend and Arthur Pitman. It met twice each term to review policies, budget planning and projects in progress.

The Middle School Lab and the Senior School NT Lab were upgraded; and PCs in Junior School classrooms were increased or upgraded. The Boarding House, Gym, and Chapel received network connections and existing connections.

Plans for a new 'state of the art' multimedia teaching and learning facility - a Centre for Computer Arts - were developed during the year as a forthcoming major works program in the Senior School. This project involves industry partnerships in electronic and communication technologies to enhance learning opportunities and vocational pathways, and to donate hardware, software or other curriculum resources.

In close co-operation with Collegiate, the implementation of the new library software assists the integration of IT into teaching and learning and helping students use appropriate information handling skills for digital library services. Teachers' professional development in IT focused on requirements for teaching and learning online, or delivering aspects of the school's curriculum resources after hours to students' homes and the wider Hutchins community.

Three major IT strategic directions for 2001 involve an upgrade to the academic database for assessment and reporting; the introduction of the Certificate II course in Interactive Arts - Multimedia; and the installation of the Telstra managed EduNet services for managing student email and safe Internet services. The EduNet project will enable the boys to have greater involvement in deciding which global information or online educational services are available on their desktops, or instrumental to their independent and lifelong learning as well as their course achievement. I am grateful to Mrs Abel, who is driving the IT changes in the school, for her knowledge and commitment.

SRC

Oscar Potter, the Chairman of the SRC Curriculum Executive has reported elsewhere in Virtus so I won't repeat him here. However, I would like to acknowledge his exceptional leadership this year. He chaired a weekly meeting of four committees: Learning Programs, Activities, Clubs and societies and Educational Review - each of which managed a rich program of school events. In addition, he and the other committee members assisted with numerous school events including the Open Day and the Fair. Oscar and Arthur Pitman managed this year's Scholars Conference. Its success was directly due to their leadership. They gave a particularly good talk to the scholars on personal development and academic development.





injury Hutchins hosted the Grand Final and was forced to hand over the Southern Independent Schools Debating Trophy to Collegiate who "only just lost to Hutchins last year" (Collegiate parent).

For the first time Hutchins entered a team in the Tasmanian Debating Union roster. The team (consisting of Jamie Shearing, Arthur Pitman, Oscar Potter, Richard Charlton and Richard Chopping) campaigned hard through the year but missed out on qualifying for the Grand Final by one speaker point. However, Hutchins continued to prove its strength at the state level with Richard Charlton captaining the state team in Melbourne in August.

For the second time, Hutchins debated against Melbourne's Trinity Grammar in what has become an allout war in football, soccer, hockey and debating. Hutchins won the debating 2-1 and lost the informal/formal dinner debate in which Hutchins had to argue 'against' sport in a hall full of sportsmen!

The anniversary debates were also a great success. Old boys Marc Evenhuis, Lucas Plumb and Miles Rochford managed to outwit and out-humour the students. A spe-

cial shield has been created to commemorate the past 51 years of Old Boys versus Students debates as well as for recording all future battles. Student pride was restored when the staff received their annual humiliation in a cleaner yet wittier than usual debate chaired by Mr Michael Hodgman. Again a sleeping audience ignored Mr Morley, and new-comers Mrs Cook and Mr Wells were

Placing either first or second on the ladder at every stage of the competition, the team flew into the grand final in top spot. 

The SATIS statewide Grand Final was held on Saturday 19 August at the War Memorial Oval. Members of the Hutchins community turned out in large numbers to sup-




The Firsts XVIII complete the War Cry after their Grand Final victory




Open



Points are deducted from a team depending on the position of their boats as they eventually cross the line. A team total of eleven points or less wins the race.
