

Chairman's Report

I am very pleased to be able to report that 2001 has been another very successful year for Hutchins. In the face of demographic trends to the contrary, school numbers have increased during the year to peak at approximately 1,000. The new SES Funding system, which is being phased in over a 4-year period, will be beneficial to Hutchins and with the recent election result we should have some stability of funding parameters into the future.

As a Board we are continually being challenged by the Principal with his vision for improved school facilities. The recently approved capital expenditure budget for 2002 includes the following projects: Stage 2 of the Nettlefold Library redevelopment, fitting out two additional classrooms in the Early Learning Centre to cater for increasing numbers, further dormitory renovations at the Boarding House and refurbishing senior art facilities. In addition we are exploring the feasibility of a new Music School/Multimedia complex and rearranging the Junior School and the Centre for Excellence.

It remains a fact, however, that no matter how good our physical resources are, the School would not be what it is without our number one resource, all the staff. On behalf of the Board I wish to thank them for their efforts in 2001. Their commitment to the boys and their education is much appreciated by all.

The Board continues with its commitment to providing a rounded and beneficial education to all boys no matter what their abilities are or what their cultural, social or ethnic backgrounds may be. We consider that the essential elements of a Hutchins education should have a wide focus addressing academic, sporting, social, musical, dramatic and vocational pursuits. It is pleasing to note that our monitoring of academic results over the last four years for Year 12 indicates an improvement each year in the overall results.

Challenges in respect of the strategic direction for Hutchins remain a focus for the Board. We have to remain mindful of emerging trends such as globalization, the blurring of the distinctions between Secondary and post Secondary education, and the Internet and its potential in education.

Strategic alliances have been established during the year, which have already been successful in boosting enrolments, namely an alliance with other Tasmanian independent schools to access the Chinese market.

We propose to devote additional resources in 2002 to the pursuit of further strategic alliances which can benefit Hutchins either by increasing revenue, reducing costs or providing access to resources which the School could not otherwise access.

In conclusion, I would also like to like to thank all Board members who have given so much of their time throughout the year.

2001 has been a year not without drama. On the international scene, the destruction of the World Trade Centre resulted in changes regarding how we look and think about our place in the world. It was a very significant event in the life of the Western World. At the time of writing, the travel industry and stock market are still to recover to their pre-September 11 days. The optimism in Australia generated by the Sydney Olympic Games of 2000 has left us, to be replaced by uncertainty. We sit and wait to see what will happen next on the international scene.

It is a curious phenomenon that despite the world shrinking to the point where any corner of the globe is quickly accessible, internet access has meant that people are contactable anywhere by satellite phone and knowledge is available on the internet anywhere, we seem to have made no progress as a race in our ability to get on with each other. Conflict on a tribal, religious and ethnic scale seems to have replaced wars between nations.

Nationally, the return of the Coalition Government meant that funding for the next term of government is secure. Much had been made of the new funding arrangements for private schools and particularly for the old Category One Schools. Hutchins benefited under the new arrangement: we believe this is evidence that the School, relative to other independent schools, was not receiving grants to a level that reflected its need.

Despite demographic trends that show the pool of school-aged children is shrinking, Hutchins numbers increased from 965 at the start of the year to 1003. This increase in students has allowed us to undertake a far more extensive capital improvement program over the Christmas holidays than originally planned. The Nettlefold Library extensions will be completed, two new classrooms fitted out in the Early Learning Centre to cater for increased classes, and refurbishment of the senior Art area are the major projects. I look forward to the planning process which will occur in 2002 for the Junior School/Music/Centre for Excellence Complex.

when it comes to Liz McQuilkin and
Hutchins there is plenty of history and all
of it happy and well worth remembering.
Sadly, however, it comes to an end this
year.

Liz has taught a range of students from Year 4 to first year university across the globe including New Guinea (as an Australian Volunteer Abroad), England, Victoria and, of course, Tasmania.

Liz left the workforce for thirteen years in order to raise her three children with her husband, Rob, and during that time did some work in theatre. She returned to teach English at Collegiate in 1983. She was appointed Head of English from 1986 to 1988 and also took on the position of Coordinator of Debating and Public Speaking. She left Collegiate at the end of 1988 to spend more time with her family and return to University for post-graduate study.

During this time Liz was invited to teach part-time at Hutchins. By the end of the year she was invited by John Bednall to be Acting Head of English, a position she held for three years while Alan Pride set up the Philosophy and Ethics program. Liz was again appointed Head of English for a year and a half after Dr Pride moved to Sydney and before Bradley Wells was appointed.

Liz's time at Hutchins will be remembered for many things. Her enormous contributions to debating, public speaking and all things literary were reflected in her coordination of the Hutchins Literary and Debating Society and founding of the Poetry and Prose in Performance Competitions. Undoubtedly though, her greatest contribution has been in the classroom. Her personal love of learning, academic rigour, meticulous professionalism and individual care for each student has endeared her to Hutchins boys and made her a vital member of the Hutchins community.

So as we say farewell we can do little better than quote from The Bard himself, when Henry V to his loyal troops declared: On, on you noblest English (teachers).

So, Liz, farewell and thanks for all that you have done for the many boys and staff who have passed through Hutchins.

Pat McNeill



Pat McNeill has been at Hutchins for a long time. Her many memories of those 28 and a half years give a snapshot of life at Hutchins. She was recruited by John Anderson in 1973, in his first year as Junior School Headmaster, when the Kindergarten needed an assistant with growing enrolments.

An interest in library studies had been put on hold with the commencement of part-time work, but with the TAFE Library Technician's course becoming available, she was able to fit this in with her working hours at Hutchins and some time was spent in one or other of the libraries from then on, as well as in the Prep School classes. She completed the Certificate in 1981. In 1984 she was appointed full time with extra time spent in the Senior Library, where she learned a lot from Rossi Roberts-Thompson, who had had many years' experience as a teacher librarian.

In 1988, Pat finally began work full-time in the A A Stephens Library, as it became known. Given a choice she decided on this library (rather than the Nettlefold) because of her wish to continue her affinity with the boys in that area, given her ongoing hockey coaching with the upper primary boys over many years. This involved matches on Saturday mornings as well as training in sport periods at school from Easter until the end of second term.

Throughout her years at Hutchins Pat has always had a passion for preparing materials for displays and mounting them with great care. In the Stephens Library, displays have been a highlight of her work, although in recent years she has often had to resort to using previously used materials because of time constraints. However she says her one-to-one involvement with the boys gives her most satisfaction, and in some cases being a confidante over long periods for boys with real worries or just things to talk over.

Pat's contribution to the School and to the libraries in particular is enormous. She has been an anchor for the teacher librarians, and ably organised teams of mothers who come in to help reinforce, mend and cover books at school or at home. Pat has been involved in staff meetings and social gatherings through the years as well as taking part in the Staff Association, being a strong advocate for the rights of the non-teaching staff.

We wish Pat a fruitful and happy retirement with Barry, their girls and grandchildren.

Mr Derek Woolley retired this year after twelve and a half years at Hutchins. He came to Hutchins in June 1988 as a teacher of Year 6, bringing with him a wealth of experience in primary education with particular skills in the teaching of mathematics. During his years at Hutchins he oversaw the development of a solid mathematics curriculum with a problemsolving base. He was involved in remedial work and extension activities with boys across the Junior School.

Derek had a special gift as a teacher and ran many Professional Development sessions both for staff at Hutchins and for staff in other independent and Catholic sector schools. He was a regular presenter at Maths Conferences and lectured in various aspects of mathematics teaching for the University's BEd programme and for those doing post-graduate work.

His interest and expertise in Mathematics continue to influence the delivery of Mathematics at Hutchins. He authored 10 teacher reference/resource books which will continue to form part of the curriculum for years to come.

Derek was for a time Junior School Sportsmaster and was also a Senior Teacher and Assistant to the Head of Junior School. At the time of his retirement Derek was the Head of Junior School and even though he was reluctant to take on this position he filled it with dignity. He had the ability to bring out the best in others through his quiet (but extremely well-organised) style of leadership. He wouldn't ask anyone to do something he wouldn't do himself.

It was early in Term 3 2000 that he suffered heart problems requiring major surgery. Following a period of recuperation he decided to retire from teaching and moved to the Gold Coast to live, to enjoy the sun, the surf and the lifestyle. While health concerns still exist he continues to play bowls and plans to spend more time painting, being an accomplished water-colour painter. One of his works hangs in the entrance to the Junior School. He is even dabbling in the share market and is prepared to try his hand at anything that comes along.

While his influence around the school is missed, all wish him well in his future endeavours.

Tony Herbert



Tony Herbert grew up in Adelaide and trained at the Adelaide Teachers' College. He started teaching at the age of 19 with the South Australian Education Department in 1955, first as an assistant at Penola in the south-east of South Australia, then at Woomera in the far north, followed by Parndana on Kangaroo Island. After this wide-ranging view of life in South Australia, he was then appointed Head Teacher of a three-teacher school near Pinnaroo on the border with Victoria. In 1960 he joined Kings College (now Pembroke School), an independent school in Adelaide, where he taught for six years.

In 1966 he moved to New South Wales to take up an appointment as Master-in-Charge of the Junior School at Wolaroi

College in Orange. He later became Senior House Master and Acting Deputy Headmaster of Wolaroi College. When Wolaroi and PLC combined schools, he was appointed Master-in-Charge of the Junior School and Housemaster of a mixedsex primary boarding house at Kinross Wolaroi School.

In 1979 Tony joined The Hutchins School as a Junior School teacher where he was renowned for his extensive general knowledge and for his ability to come up with the most amazing trivia in order to catch his students' interest. Together with his wife, Ailsa, he formed the Junior School Boarding House in the former Headmaster's House at 99 Nelson Road and ran it for three years. He has held a number of positions at Hutchins such as President of the Staff Association, Secretary/Treasurer of the Staff Association, Secretary of the Headmaster's Education Committee and various sporting positions, including acting as Sports Master of the Junior School. Since transferring to the Senior School, Tony's main sporting commitment has been with squash, to which he has devoted much time and ener-

Tony himself has wide sporting interests having played cricket, tennis and Australian Rules football at school. He represented the South Australian Teachers' Colleges in tennis, basketball and athletics, and played lacrosse for South Australia. He also represented Kings Old Scholars at Australian Rules football and cricket, and in later years played competitive basketball, football, tennis, table tennis and golf. Among his other interests is photography, for which he had the honour of being the first Australian to have work accepted at an international level in a Communist country after the Second World War.

Since 1997 Tony has been working in the Senior School as a Resource Teacher based in the Nettlefold Library, teaching history to Year 9, and having responsibility for all audiovisual requirements within the whole school. He has used his expertise with internet sites to provide resource materials for other staff on request and also to select sites for listing on the school's intranet. His knowledge and abilities in this field will be sorely missed but we wish him well in his retirement.



The Advantages of Being a Boy

THIS ESSAY WAS WRITTEN DURING THE LAST EXAMINATIONS AND ITS AUTHOR DID NOT INTEND IT FOR PUBLICATION - DECEMBER 1929.

Boys have many advantages over girls, the chief one being the thought that in after years they will be men, while girls will only be women.

Most boys despise girls because they are weak and gentle and not able to partake in their games because they are too rough; they may be hurt. Boys can always please themselves what they do and where they go, because they can take care of themselves. Girls have to be protected because of their fragility and lack of judgment of what is right or wrong.

A boy is able to take part in more sports than a girl, the reason being that men are more adapted for most sports than women, and therefore boys follow in their fathers' footsteps, while girls follow in their mothers'. In many cases girls have shown that they are not far inferior to boys, chiefly in swimming, where they are, perhaps more adapted than boys, through being of a lighter build and not being affected by the cold, owing to slight differences in construction.

At school, girls profess to have fun, but it is very pussy compared with that of a boys' school. The girls shriek and afterwards titter over their alleged jokes, which are generally rather feeble, while boys amuse themselves by subtle jokes. The greatest drawback girls have, in boys' sight, is that whenever they are in mixed company, they need chaperones. This is a great set back, and it handicaps boys very much socially.

However, the world would be a very dull place without girls, if it was in being at all, and we must thank our Maker for allowing us to be boys, but we must also thank Him for His thoughtfulness in making girls also. 64 years later, girls are still a major topic of conversation, however attitudes and thought processes have evolved. In the 1993 Virtus Editorial "Single Sex Schools" the editor, Geoff Whelan, wrote:

"I believe that the adults that emerge from Hutchins are not themselves being discriminated against through going to a single-sex school, but are instead advantaged as they have a greater level of respect for women".

I would like to thank all the Year 9s that helped in the Archives this year. There are too many to mention. I would like to thank Chris Hall, Pam Daly and Ann Reimer for their help and support throughout the last two years.

The Hutchins Foundation & The Hutchins Development Office

The Hutchins Foundation had a good fundraising year with profitable events including the Annual Appeal, a Day at the Races, a cocktail party, sale of the popular Hutchins calendar and other souvenir goods.

The Annual Appeal raised over \$40,000 and the money raised will assist in the refurbishment of the Terence Butler Auditorium by providing additional stage lighting equipment, stage draperies, sound systems and other facilities. Approximately sixty patrons attended a special afternoon tea to thank donors to the Appeal. The afternoon tea was held after the very popular ELC Nativity Play and Concert in the Auditorium.

"Minor" fundraising through small events and miscellaneous sales complement the major sources of revenue – bequests from Old Boys or other supporters of the school, the interest earned on investments and new cash gifts. Through these we have been able to offer the R A and R M Swan Memorial Prize, the G T Stilwell Memorial Prize and the J J Cowburn Memorial Prize.

Marketing has continued to be a major focus of the Development Office and as the school year ended with greater numbers of students than we had budgeted for, the Development Office and Foundation fundraising roles tend to be irretrievably mixed. Hutchins continues to develop close links with the State Government's Department of State Development, and the new consortium of TISOSS of which Hutchins is a founding member has been successful in attracting several boys to the school

from Beijing and other areas of China. The school has also worked to develop new and existing markets in Thailand, Germany, Brazil, Hong Kong, Indonesia, Malaysia, Singapore and Korea. We are now starting to see the benefits of such marketing – not only are the school's numbers increasing, but the broad range of international students attending Hutchins is of great benefit socially and educationally.

The broad range of international activities has been matched with local and interstate campaigns. The Hutchins Art Prize, now in its fifth year, attracted a record number of entries and the Finalists' Exhibition in the Long Gallery at Salamanca Place was inspected by over 1700 guests. A combined concert with Collegiate at the Federation Hall was very successful in showcasing the talents of our many gifted musicians and the Jazz in the Quad evening continues to grow in popularity and style. We are indebted to Mr Andrew Legg for his links with the local music world, providing additional performers who work with our boys. Hutchins was present at Agfest and at the Campbell Town show, and press advertising locally and interstate has greatly assisted the school in its marketing campaign.

Our Old Boys have continued to be active. Of special interest was the biennial meeting of the 80 Club — when a score of our oldest Old Boys attended a Eucharist in the Chapel of St Thomas and toured the Early Learning Centre before joining other Old Boys for lunch in Burbury House. The Old Boys' Reunion Dinner was a great evening with almost 200 Old Boys and their partners celebrating their joint history. Andrew Hood (1966 Leaver) was honoured for his work in Tasmania's viticulture industry by being presented with The Ivied Tower Award.

Grandparents' Days, the School Fair, special Archival displays, the Hutchins Golf Day, Open Day, the Webber Lecture, a Headmaster's Seminar with Professor Miraca Gross, special concerts featuring the Cincinnati Strings and the Australian String Quartet, three editions of the school's newsletter Magenta and Black and a host of other events make the school year a busy and interesting one – and one only possible through the hard work of the Development Office staff of Pam Daly, Ann Reimer, Andrew Short, Don Camm and Louise Young.

English as a Second Language

ESL STUDENTS' ACTIVITIES

English as a Second Language (ESL) is an English course for non-English background students. In addition to English reading, writing, listening and speaking, many activities are organised. These ranged from end of term dinners, excursions to art galleries and wildlife parks, to drama, movies and farewell parties.

The most significant purpose of the excursions is to get to know Australian culture and society. Early this year the students went to Bonorong Park, where they learnt what animals are endemic in Tasmania and which species are becoming extinct. They were also able to hand-feed kangaroos, wallabies and emus and see wombats and Tasmanian Devils.

Another highlight of their activities was the visit to the art gallery at Salamanca Place. The exhibited displays were the students' impressions of Australia. The artworks were separated into three categories: paintings, photography and art production. The paintings collection was the major part in the exhibition. One of the paintings showed people from different racial and ethnic backgrounds surrounding Australia

by holding hands and another piece was a picture of vegemite jars.

The photography section demonstrated the real life of Australia. The last part of the exhibition was art production. Students made some 3D art works that expressed their feelings about their study life in Australia. One of the art works showed some children playing cricket, another people sunbathing on the beach. Both of them illustrated how Australian people love sports and displayed their outgoing character.

Our overseas students are also taught about the Aboriginal people. One of their excursions was a visit to the cinema to watch the move Yolngu Boy, which is about three Aboriginal teenagers who had different

views on their nation and their Aboriginal lifestyle. It showed some traditional ceremonies of Aboriginal people.

At the end of second term the students were taken to the Careers Expo, which provided knowledge about different types of careers and the demands of each job. The final excursion was a sightseeing trip to Richmond.

At the end of each term a dinner was organised for the students. In Term 1 the theme was Indian food, in Term 2 Chinese and in Term 3 the dinner was held in an Italian restaurant, as a special dinner for the Year 12 leavers.

Senior School

Head of Senior School Report

In this, the centenary year of Federation, the Senior School year has again been **busy and productive**. A number of students have performed exceptionally well in competitions for core and elective subjects. In both National and State Mathematics competitions, Ronan Fenton (9) was an outstanding performer. Also successful were Adrian Kan (12), Jack Madden and Dean Rollins (10), and Michael Bowditch, Hamish Hall, and Martin Mulcahy (9).

Luke Sypkes (12) and Ronan Fenton (9) each came first in the state section of the Australian Schools Writing Competition. Debating results also reflected considerable depth in talent. The senior division of the state final was won by a Year 11 team: Chris Jones, Liam Coyle, Alex Finnis, James Oxley and Tom Stove. The School's Year 10 team won the intermediate division. A combined Hutchins-Collegiate team won the Tasmanian Debating Union Parliamentary Debating Competition. Speakers included Edward Webster (12). In January 2002 he will represent Australia at the United Nations Youth Forum in Amsterdam

In Business Studies, Charles Cunningham (10) won the state "Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition". In the Humanities, Lewis Halliday (10) won the state division of the National History Challenge and Chris Jones (11) won the Dame Enid Lyons Award for **outstanding research** in

Geography. In Design in Wood, Rodney Smith (12) won the Technical Excellence prize at the Tasmanian Wood Design Exhibition held recently in Hobart.

Noteworthy musical performances

Linking into the worship program, the Chapel Choir, under Mr Morris performed at many venues including the Cathedral and St George's Church, Battery Point. In the latter, much of their time was spent recording another CD, entitled 'To be a light'.

Other noteworthy musical performances included the Hutchins-Collegiate Concert held at the Federation Concert Hall in Term 1. Large, appreciative audiences came to the Year 11/12 production of 'Cosi' performed in Term 1 and 'Lockie Leonard' performed in Term 2 by Year 9/10 students. In addition, the House Drama night was exciting, entertaining and immensely fulfilling for those involved. Thorold House again was victorious.

On the sporting field there were a number of highlights. Perhaps the most notable was the **outstanding performance** of the First Hockey

At the Awards Assembly

outstanding reception for his **fine**achievement of caps in six sporting
activities: golf, football, water-polo,
swimming, basketball and athletics. Five

Additional matters to highlight included NAIDOC Week (National Aboriginal Islander Day Of Celebration) in Term 2, where the school community gathered at a special ceremony and formed into the Aboriginal flag on the school tennis courts. The year has also seen the development of wider opportunities for Year 9 and 10 students to provide service to others and in the process develop greater empathy and leadership skills. Notable events here included the voluntary work undertaken at the Royal Hobart Show (Animal Nursery) and the various Middle and Junior School sporting fixtures.

2000 Leavers' Results

On a number of measures, last year's results were an improvement on 1999. The improving Tertiary Entrance Scores (TER) show a very large number of our boys are responding to the thrust on academics. 32% were in the top 5% of state scores, 64% were in the top 15% of state scores, and 86% were in the top 30% of state scores.

Of course we celebrate the achievements of all our leavers but we particularly recognise those boys who gained Tasmania University Scholarships: Jason Sui won the CONTECH prize for the most outstanding results in Information Systems throughout the state. Tom Bignall, a Hutchins student in 2000, won the School of Agricultural Science Prize for best candidate in Agricultural Science at the TCE examinations in 2000.

There were many outstanding individual results amongst last year's leavers. The number of boys who gained scores in the 90s increased last year. I have listed them in descending order: Eric Daniel, Oscar Potter, Michael Shaw, Nick Starkey, Jason Sui, Richard Chopping, Matthew Baldwin, Nick Chapman, James Murdoch, Robert Howell, David Townsend, Robert Clark, Toby Ekins, Alistair French, Hugh Ellis, Suthaharan Mahindroo, Anthony Bastick. Boys leaving Year 12 now receive two scores. These scores rank students on a single scale for entry to university. The first is a scaled Tertiary Entrance Score (TER) and the second is a national Interstate Transfer Index (ITI). The TER is calculated by adding together the score (out of 20) of a student's best five subjects. This figure is then 'scaled' to take into account the quality of work done by the student in the particular subject relative to their performance in all their subjects. Scaling is not fixed. It varies from year to year. Last year the Year 11 results were scaled for the first time while the Year 12 results were not scaled. It will be remembered that the university introduced the ITI in 1999. It provides a common basis for comparing student scores between all Australian states. There are moves to

totally replace the TER with a single ITI score in future.

Introduction of the Director of Studies Honours List

We have some exceptionally talented scholars in Year 11. For some years I have been concerned that our celebration of 'leavers' results overlooks the outstanding results of Year 11 boys, often in the same subjects as the 'leavers'. Each year boys in this group gain outstanding Year 11/12 subject results but are generally not mentioned on Speech Night. The DOS Honours List has been introduced to recognize these boys.

I am delighted to inaugurate the following boys to the Director of Studies Honours List for 2000, for achieving the top 5% of Tertiary Entrance Scores in Year 11. Top of the list is Andrew Morrisby who gained a Tertiary Entrance Score of 92.9 on five pre-tertiary subjects. In three of the subjects - Biology, Music and Physical Science - he gained the top score in Year 11/12, a truly exceptional performance. Ian Pang also gained five pre-tertiary scores, with a TER of 79.3. Ian gained a perfect score of 20 for Physical Science. He was closely followed by Jonathon De-Hoog, who had four exceptional pre-tertiary results with a TER of 74.9. Jonathon gained the equal top score for Music. Adrian Kan also successfully studied four pre-tertiary subjects and gained the outstanding TER of 72.6. Adrian gained the top score for Mathematics Stage 2. Very close behind him, Thanapisal Koohapremkit gained a TER of 71.1 based on exceptional results in four pre-tertiary subjects. I know the whole school community joins me in congratulating these boys on their fine achievements.

Curriculum Developments This Year

2001 has been a very active year for curriculum review and development. Work continues on "integrated studies" in the Middle School. This year the theme was "Heroes". It culminated in a very successful family evening in Term III.

Literacy

Boys' Literacy is currently a major issue for educators and the wider community and rightly so! It has always been important, but perhaps never more so than in today's competitive and skill-based world where the ability to communicate effectively is crucial.

At the beginning of this year the Senior School introduced Drop Everything And Read (DEAR) for all year 9 boys. DEAR cuts across the curriculum by mandating a 20-minute silent reading period after recess each day. One of the aims is to better facilitate the transition from Middle to Senior School while instilling the habit of reading. The emphasis is on pleasure and choice within some broad guidelines. I am pleased to report the program has been a great success, with boys and staff alike enjoying their DEAR time. Mr Brad Wells, The Head of English, has taken a particular interest in literacy including the introduction of DEAR.

In Junior School the program has been based on 'First Steps' which is a developmental literacy resource focused on the four language components: writing, spelling, reading and oral language. It emphasizes teaching and assessment practices and encourages the boys to be active learners, to think and solve problems while recognising, supporting and challenging them. Initial results are pleasing and the program will continue in 2002.

Revitalizing Years 9 and 10

Society is moving from the 'Industrial Age' to the 'Information Age'. Schools, along with other institutions, are part of this change. School practice has been based largely on a 19th Century factory model. Children moved in batches to teachers who instructed the whole group at the same time. In this model children were viewed as all being equally deficient in knowledge. The teacher was the provider of knowledge that was distributed equally to the whole class at the same time. The problem with this model was that it does not engage all the students, perhaps even all the capacity

of any student. The question is not are the students being taught? The question is are they learning? In the last twenty years schools have significantly changed from this model. This is particularly so in the primary departments and would be very evident to any parents visiting the ELC or the Junior School at Hutchins. Some years ago we conducted a major review of early adolescent learning at Hutchins, that focussed on the Middle School years. This resulted in major change both to the facilities and to the teaching practice in Years 7 and 8. We are now extending the review process to Years 9 and 10.

Revitalizing Years 9 and 10 is about developing:

 all students as robust, well adjusted men (who know how to 'be' as well as how to 'do'). Men who can take responsibility for their own lives. Men who have high expectations and high moral standards

 active citizens with a high sense of civic duty and the capacity to contribute to the welfare of others

 successful independent learners with the ability to reason, who value knowledge and who successfully work in teams to solve problems

 a sense of local community while at the same time equipping boys as global citizens

raising the level of academic performance
 those things essential to learning everything else in the 21st Century - speaking, reading, writing, calculating and competence in information technology, and

 a cultural understanding that values diversity and promotes inclusiveness.

We cannot achieve all these goals through routine classroom teaching alone. As a result, we are examining ways of engaging the boys actively with the issues that affect youth and affect the Tasmanian community both in the urban and in the rural environment. I expect some teaching will be away from the main school site. There has been wide consultation this year with a view to producing a model next year and then implementing the changes into Year 9 at the start of 2003. The model will provide for more choice and diversity in Year 9 and a closer linking of Year 10 to Year 11. The school is fortunate to have Mr Peter Symons leading these exciting changes.

PE & Health (Mind Matters)

Mindmatters refers to a national resource package which supports whole school strategies to improve the health and wellbeing of students. Social and emotional well-being have been linked to young people's schooling outcomes, their social development, their capacity to contribute to the workforce and the community, and the rate of youth suicide. Mindmatters aims to develop school environments where young people feel safe, valued, engaged and purposeful.

Hutchins has a Mindmatters committee, lead by Mr Ken Kingston. The committee works with individual boys and coordinates the whole school implementation of Mindmatters.

Next year we plan to build on the work already done. One exciting initiative will be the new Middle School elective 'Resilience and Coping'.

Gifted & Talented

Significant staff development was conducted in April to assist all staff to recognise and develop 'gifted and talented' boys. The Centre for Excellence now runs a major program that not only provides for our own boys but also includes a number of sessions for the students in Gateways. The School was fortunate to have the support of Professor Miraca Gross who visited us in April to conduct staff and parent sessions. Hutchins is now providing significant leadership in "Gifted and Talented" education to schools across the state.

Information Technology

Information & Communications Technology (ICT) services, under the capable leadership of Mrs Jill Abell, achieved some significant strategic steps this year. They included upgrading the academic database and server software for assessment and reporting, and an

upgrade to the Windows 2000 operating system. The new three tiered websites for the Hutchins Internet and Intranet services celebrate student and staff achievements. Please visit the website. In the support of the teaching and learning programs, major upgrades of hardware and software were timely for the Boarding House, the Centre for Excellence, the Middle School Computer Laboratory and the Centre for Computer Arts/QANTM Cyberschool.

Strong policy support, and anti-virus, copyright and privacy management, is in place for boys' acceptable use of the internet and email services. A wonderful group of student IT leaders provide information and support to boys using the Internet and email services.

A major step forward this year is the increasing access to curriculum courseware materials online from home or school. Global knowledge is increasing exponentially. We need to maintain a strong thrust on information literacy to help boys select appropriate information sources and use them effectively.

VET

This year we increased the number of "Vocational Educational and Training" Certificates available to Year 11 and 12 boys. The very successful Multi-Media Certificate introduced in 2000 by Mr Moore continued into its second year, while Mr Starkey and Mr Kingston introduced the Maritime Certificate.

Maritime Studies comprised two VET
Certificate II courses, with knowledge and
workplace components. The workplace
component required extensive time on and
under the water. The coxswain's course
consisted of six modules: nautical knowledge
(including watch-keeping and navigation),
engineering knowledge of inboard and
outboard engines and ship systems, shipboard
safety including fire-fighting and sea survival,
marine radio operation, senior first aid and
writing skills. On completion students gain
their commercial coxswain's certificate (Cert
II National Maritime Operations) recognized
by authorities in all states.

Maritime Studies students also qualified for a Cert II Outdoor Recreation by completing modules in open water diving, advanced open water diving and working in the dive industry, through PADI. These certificates are increasingly popular, despite their demanding standards. Examinations for the Maritime Certificate were conducted by Launceston's Maritime College.




What about this Michelangelo number from the Sistine Chapel painted on the ceiling of our sacred site? (I'm talking Chapel, not tuckshop, and anyway the War Memorial Oval has no ceiling!) Visitors would flock in and look up, and rejoice greatly, especially when they think of the savings – they could be paying thousands more in airfares to see something similar but less fresh!

The Creation of Adam by Michelangelo

I thought this particular picture would be suitable for the following reasons:

First, it's a blokey kind of painting. Blokey to all but the most severely short-sighted! Chapel is not often thought of as a blokey kind of thing. Being reflective is, as far as I know, not a by-product of testosterone; singing is embarrassing to the insecure; and a message of love, forgiveness and grace is hard to take after a lunchtime tearing around the fields like cave-men and is hardly what blokes should be doing — well, that's the myth. Our role as educators of young men is to do what we can to correct this short-sightedness among the boys, so that they come to be aware of the "things above"; aware of God's calling on their lives; and aware of what it means to be real men in his service.

Second, this painting could be seen as a pep-talk by the coach to a member of the team. The coach in this instance is God who says – "don't give up; show the world what the two of us can do together as a team". The Christian life is not for the faint-hearted, but for those with the same staying power we admire in sport. Said the writer of the Letter to the Hebrews: "lift your drooping hands, and strengthen your weak knees...let us run with perseverance the race that is set before us, looking to Jesus the pioneer and perfecter of our faith".



Third, I could look at this painting and be reminded of the many times at this School that I have seen people reaching out to help others. This painting would remind me of the friends who helped each other on the recent Year 9 camp. I went with a group bushwalking up Adamson's Peak. The going was rough, steep, and slippery, and I witnessed two lads walking on parallel and very slippery logs spontaneously putting a hand out to each other, and arriving at the other side hand-in-hand and safe. We need real men in this world who can acknowledge their vulnerability, and who can reach out to others without embarrassment.

Fourth, this painting could be a classroom scene. Adam, on the left, is lethargic - his arm rests on his knee and it's a feeble finger that he dangles out. God (white-haired teacher, on the right, and properly dressed!) reaches out with desire to inspire...and the hope is that they connect!! This mirrors what needs to happen in our Chapel, and in our lives of faith. We need to reach out to the God who reaches out to us. We have a God who wants to touch our lives, and change us with divine and inspiring life.

Jesus gave a message to the world to believe, because only in believing and following in his steps would people find life. Only in reaching out our hand to God's hand will we discover life in all its fullness.

The promise of God's touch and God's life is good for all people - even for little blokes who run round like cave-men, and who look for naked people on Chapel ceilings.





It is with a degree of sadness that I write, a in 2002 I will only be teacing part-time at Hutchins as I have been appointed to the position of lecturer in charge of contemporary music at the Tasmanian Conservatorium.

I was appointed Head of Performing Arts 12 years ago and I have seen enormous changes both in music and education during this time, some good, some not so good. Ultimately though, the 'proof is in the pudding' as my father would often say: as I look around I see boys actively engaged and involved with music making of such a variety of genres and demonstrating, more often than not, unbelievable talent and a musical maturity beyond their years, I am even more convinced of the importance of keeping music available and accessible to as many kids as possible through whatever medium works best. Music enriches all our lives,

and needs to be at the forefront of any comprehensive educational philosophy and practice. A famous (or should it be infamous) ex-Headmaster once demanded of me, "I want the whole school to sing!" We did, we do, and so may it continue.

As is usually the case, 2001 has been an exciting year for all our various ensembles. Mr Leonard established the concert band in Term 1, which has given our developing brass players and rhythm sections an excellent opportunity to further their playing skills. Mrs Dennis continues to have tremendous success with the string ensemble, trios and quartets throughout the School. The boys play for semi-professional gigs as well as school concerts, but have also had great success in the various eisteddfods this year. Scott Cashion's work with reeds and particularly the sax quartet has been stunning as always, and our large peripatetic staff continue to inspire and encourage their students to strive for their very best.

The Chapel Choir continues to go from strength to strength and have this year produced their third CD – To Be A Light. They will again tour England next year, and are making a unique contribution to the musical and spiritual life of not only the





School, but for the Tasmanian community as a whole. Mr Steven Morris' continued contribution to the ongoing development of this ensemble is quite remarkable and always of the highest musical standard.

Mrs Short is legendary in the Junior School. An article such as this could never do justice to her remarkable devotion to the boys and their music. Choirs, orchestras, small and large wind and brass ensembles, charity, church and performances for the elderly, concerts of the both the highest quality and with the involvement of every child in one way or another – she is a rare gem indeed.

Chapel choir, big band and the jazz trio were also highlights in a concert that was very exciting and a great success. The first School of Performing Arts concert for 2001 was held on the 24th May, and

featured the amazing talents of some of our best musicians, dramatists and dancers. Both the SPA concerts this year have highlighted some of the prodigious talent that exists within the performing arts at Hutchins and Collegiate. Our jazz trio, string and sax quartets have developed at an astonishing rate during this year and have become wonderful ambassadors for the school.

We had a great rock band compete in the open section of the Rock Challenge this year for the first time and although unplaced, Mr No Pants earned the admiration and support of everyone present with a spirited and musical performance. House music this year was marked by the highest musical standard that I can remember. This is one of my favourite events as it is really very student-centred and puts a great deal of the responsibility for organisation, preparation and musicianship on the boy's shoulders. All the boys did a fantastic job, performing to a most appreciative, if somewhat biased, audience.

We had a visit from the Cincinnati
Junior Strings in July, and they
joined with our own string players

best string players in the state. They tour
somewhere in the world every year, and we
all made some great new friends and will

There were two other musical events that were particularly special this year. Firstly,

I wish to publicly acknowledge and praise their professionalism and giftedness in their own areas of expertise. Together, we produced a musical not soon to be forgotten in Hobart - or, more importantly, not forgotten by the actors, singers, musicians and crew.

The past twelve years have been a lot of things – frantic, fun, difficult, exciting, challenging, rewarding, tiring, infuriating, fulfilling...all of these and more, in varying degrees and at different times, although always more positive than not. Finally,

to the principals, my many friends and colleagues, to all the boys and the extended and extensive Hutchins family, thank you. Your gift of friendship, overwhelming support and love will remain with me and be a part of me always.
