

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
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Board of Management Chairman's Report

2002 has been another pleasingly successful year for Hutchins. We have exceeded our predictions in respect of student numbers and it is particularly pleasing to note that Early Learning Centre numbers continue to grow.

The Board of Management consisting of Andrew Ashbolt, David Catchpole, Rob Clark, Andrew Downie, Nick Heath, Elizabeth Hope, Ian Johnston and Peter Shelley have provided outstanding support and counsel to myself and the Principal during the year and I thank them all for their contribution.

- refurbishment of Art Rooms
- completion of an additional teaching area in the Early Learning Centre, and
- upgrade of Southport Outdoor Education facilities.

We look forward to a full Outdoor Education program recommencing in 2003.

The new Music School project is proceeding according to plan and will be available for use at the start of 2003. The recently approved budget for 2003 includes the following projects:

- redevelopment of the existing Junior School and Music School
- landscaping and sun protection for the Senior School quadrangle
- · resurfacing of artificial grass tennis courts, and
- refurbishment of the Centre for Excellence.

Significant contributions will be made to the Quadrangle and Tennis Court projects by the Parents' Association and the Hutchins Tennis Club – this serves to emphasise the enormous contribution made to the school by our many volunteers.

On behalf of the Board I wish to thank all of you who have helped the school in whatever volunteer capacity during the year because without you we would not be able to offer the standard of facilities and activities which are currently or will in the future be available to our students.

In keeping with the Board's emphasis on strategic planning and future directions for Hutchins we have asked the Principal to focus on the following in 2003:

- · continuing the emphasis on establishing strategic alliances
- refinement of the marketing strategy for the school based on appropriate research and consultation
- revitalisation of Years 9 and 10, and
- to monitor, create and refine the measurement of academic achievement.

On behalf of the Board I would like to thank the Principal, senior management, the teaching staff and support staff for their efforts in 2002 – their commitment to the boys and their education is outstanding and much appreciated.

2002 has been a year in which some firmly held assumptions about our world have been questioned. It has been an unsettling year.

September 11, 2001 continues to reverberate; the United States stock market has headed steadily downwards; Israel and Palestine have experienced heightened conflict; and white farmers have been expelled from their farms in Zimbabwe. There is a sense of impending conflict which was heightened by the bomb blast in Bali.

Closer to home, Incat, Tasmania's world famous fast catamaran builder, was placed in the hands of an administrator. On the positive side, real estate values in Tasmania have increased markedly in some areas, as the attractions of Tasmania are discovered by those from the mainland and overseas.

To capture the sense of 2002 is to understand the unsettling nature of overseas events. At the time of writing, there are major unanswered questions: will the USA go to war against Iraq? Can Israel and Palestine work through their differences?

In Tasmania, Incat's difficulties have been unsettling. This has been countered in part by the improvement in house prices and the Government's decision to purchase two cross channel ferries has boosted confidence.

But what has this to do with Hutchins and education?

There is a pressing need for students who are facing this new, more uncertain world to have an understanding of the people, processes and forces currently shaping our world.

An understanding of history, causation, logic, fact and opinion are crucial skills that need to be inculcated. I hope that the current curriculum is ensuring that such skills are being learnt.

In my reading of school histories, I have a sense that sometimes the success of a school is measured both by new buildings and enrolments increasing.

At Hutchins, yet another building programme has occurred: extensions to the Stephen Hay Memorial Park at Southport, and the commencement of construction of the new Music School. This latest new building, which incorporates the house in which the Centre for Excellence had been operating, means moving the Centre for Excellence to the old Year 3 and 4 classrooms and Years 3 and 4 to the old music block. The next stage of development is to remodel Junior School, which will occur as soon as funds permit.

The decline in enrolments has temporarily halted, which has eased a little the financial pressure on the school. Given the decline in school age students in Tasmania, we can be pleased with this.

Rather than measure the school's success by buildings and enrolments, I would prefer to look at measures like the quality of teaching and learning occurring in the school, the values being inculcated, the happiness of the Hutchins community and the feelings of achievement of each of our students.

On those measures, I feel we have achieved well and this is due to the dedication of the Hutchins community, whose focus has been the boys.

Staff, Board of Management, parents, friends and old boys, thank you for your commitment. We remain a strong, positive, vibrant school with a sense of purpose.

In a time of uncertainty, Hutchins continues to be a source of stability and excellence.

The New Music School

Centre for Excellence

The Centre for Excellence in 2002 saw many students' "awakening their own expectations" and becoming independent learners. Our remedial program fosters an attitude of ownership for one's learning, which is reflected in the optional electives offered from Year 8 to Year 10. We were pleased to welcome Mrs Diana Williams to the team and have valued her calming influence with the Year 9 and 10 students. Mrs Williams has contributed to the program with her psychologist's perspective to learning, and is able to offer individual counselling to students. Her position has now been extended to full time and she looks forward to working with Year 6 and Middle School students in 2003.

Mr Ken Kingston has continued his Middle School focus and enjoys working with the boys who have shown dedication to their learning. A most successful unit of work covering Critical Literacy included the sharing and writing of recipes, which were celebrated with a seafood feast. Mr Kingston will continue working with the year 8 Literacy Lifeboat class during 2003 and forms an integral member of the Centre Team.

The ELC and Junior School program continue a commitment to early intervention and remediation. The standardised testing program, together with teacher and parent observations, ensures that students who may require additional support are identified and offered assistance. We are fortunate to have Wendy Sakul and Penny Brown concentrating in this work as they have significant experience and expertise in remediation and working with small groups. Their work is supported and enhanced through the volunteer parents who so generously give time to the Macquarie Reading Program. This work is vital and much appreciated.

Dedicated and highly skilled teacher assistants have assisted several individual students in class. Belinda Cousens and Amanda Thomson bring a professional approach to their work and have been wonderful assets to the learning program.

We look forward to expanding our programs when we move to our new Centre For Excellence in 2003. This move will see the ESL classes operating from the Centre under the direction of Jaqi King.

We were pleased to welcome Cath Hogan back to conduct the Gifted and Talented program in the ELC during 2002. The Hutchins School has been instrumental in bringing professional development in Gifted and Talented Education to the state and hosted sessions for teachers and parents conducted by Dr Katherine Hoekman of the UNSW. A great emphasis in 2002 was on professional learning for Middle School Staff.

Gifted and talented educational practices are good educational practices for all children and an effective gifted education program cannot exist solely as a pull-out program. Every class at Hutchins ought to be an 'opportunity class' and that is our aim in supporting students and staff.

This year the Future Problem Solving Team from Middle School were invited to attend the national finals in Melbourne in October. This is a challenging program that involves higher order thinking skills together with communication and teamwork at a high level.

The Centre is always a busy place – however we welcome parents and other interested people from The Hutchins community to visit us at any time and thanks to the many people who support our work.

Ray began his teaching career in New South Wales in 1969 and specialised in the field of careers from 1978, coming to Tasmania in 1990. He joined the staff of Collegiate and Hutchins School in 1992, becoming full time at Hutchins in 1994

As a member of the Stephens House team for his entire life at Hutchins, Ray was a valued tutor before taking on the role as House Administrator. His reputation as a Careers Counsellor extends well outside the school. Ray was awarded Life Membership of the Australian Association of Career Counsellors. He has ensured that his knowledge has been kept up to date through attendances at local and national conferences. During his time as an active member of AACC he has convened two national conferences at Wrest Point Conference Centre. He has a very well established network both in the business world and amonast other Career Counsellors. Peter was appointed to the staff in 1991, coming to Hutchins from the Education Department. He had been Principal and had worked with the University Tasmania.

Peter has encouraged boys to learn independence and self-management by providing them with

opportunities to make decisions about their learning. During his time at Hutchins he has increased subject choices and expanded the level of trust extended to boys. In the TCE transition, Hutchins moved from offering less than forty subjects in Year 11/12 to over eighty.

The role of Director of Studies is a busy one including compliance with TASSAB procedures, where appropriate subjects are selected, examinations conducted, academic awards and prizes are determined, and timetables are delivered to 700 students.

Peter has always tried to improve procedures: he streamlined the system of reporting and assessing, managed the introduction of computerised reporting and introduced new timetabling software now adopted by all three co-operating schools.

He has been a passionate advocate of improving teaching and learning at Hutchins. His knowledge of current curriculum trends and research has always been matched by critical reflection of the likely benefits of the new. He has never simply accepted something different as being better but rather has probed the possibilities of change when he has been convinced of the benefits.

Peter has involved himself in many aspects of school life. He established the SRC Curriculum Executive to provide leadership opportunities in curriculum management. An annual favourite event has been his SRC Leavers' Funny Hat Barbecue. He has sung with the Chapel Choir at many Anniversary Services. He contributed some watercolour paintings to the Fair Art Exhibition. He has been the Master in Charge of Volleyball for twelve years.

Peter, who is a Lieutenant Colonel in the Australian Army, leaves us to work at the Land Warfare Development Centre on the mainland. I thank him for his contribution to Hutchins, for his professionalism, his enthusiasm and his innovative ideas that have added so much to the life of the School

Obituary

Arnold Kenneth Wertheimer

1924 - 2001

Arnold Wertheimer attended Hutchins from 1933 until 1940. He passed the Intermediate Examination in 1938 and the Leaving Examination in 1940. While in Senior School he was awarded the Newcastle Scholarship.

During his time at Hutchins, Arnold was a member of the Magazine Committee and a Corporal in the Cadets. He was also actively involved in sport, being awarded Second Colours in both Athletics and Football.

Arnold's considerable contribution to Hutchins continued after his school years. In 1961 he was appointed to the Board of Management and completed a term of ten years, including three years as Board Chairman from 1969In 1942 Mr Wertheimer enlisted in the Royal Australian Navy and saw active service on HMAS Castlemaine during World War II. After the war he continued to serve in the Naval Reserve for 40 years, rising to Commander and Naval Officer Commanding Reserves in Tasmania for ten years.

Arnold was actively involved in Hobart business and community life. He was the honorary Naval Aide de Camp to Tasmanian governors Sir Hugh Binney and Sir Ronald Cross, and was awarded membership of the Royal Victorian Order.

He was a chartered accountant and senior partner of Wise, Lord and Ferguson until becoming Manager of the Australian Stock Exchange in Hobart until his retirement in 1990. He was director of several companies. including Mercantile Mutual, National Mutual and D J Motors. He was also a board member of Associated Securities Limited, State Chairman of the Australian Institute of Chartered Accountants, a long standing director of 7HO, and a board member of Tasmanian Television Ltd until its 1983 takeover.

Outside the board room, Mr Wertheimer was a past president of the Royal Hobart Bowls Club and the Australian Corvettes Association.

Both sons and seven grandsons have all attended Hutchins.

He is survived by his wife Norma and children Roslyn (Lamprill), Michael, Christine (Dorrington) and John and nine grandchildren.

Then & Now

HUTCHINS IN 1902

100 years ago, in the immediate aftermath of Federation, the school was situated in Macquarie Street, in a purposebuilt neo-gothic schoolhouse commissioned by the Church of England in 1847.

Hutchins had its problems in 1902, and influential figures connected with the school believed the difficulties to be insurmountable. They thought that like other notable private schools of the period - Queen's College, Horton College and Officer College - Hutchins would be forced to close. Indeed, it appears fortuitous rather than calculated that Hutchins survived the early 1900s.

THE BOER WAR, 1899-1902

The war in South Africa, pitting the forces of the British Empire against the Boer settlers, ended in 1902. South Africa as a nation emerged from the conflict in which the Boers persevered with great bravery against the odds, winning international respect. Tasmania sent 836 men and 781 horses. 390 Australians lost their lives, including 19 Tasmanians. Over the course of the war, 49 Hutchins Old Boys enlisted.

In an extraordinary coincidence, two Hutchins Old Boys won the first Victoria Crosses ever awarded to Australian soldiers, within hours of one another at separate theatres of war on 1 September 1900. Lieutenant Guy Wylly and Private John Bisdee both carried out acts of supreme gallantry under enemy fire without consideration for their personal safety. The Victoria Cross is the highest British or Commonwealth military honour that can be awarded to service personnel on active duty.

It is difficult to imagine the impact of the Boer War on Hutchins in 1902. There are always financial consequences of a national war effort.

A BATTLE FOR SURVIVAL

The Headmaster in 1902 was H H "Mickey" Anderson, an Englishman who came from a strong Baptist missionary tradition. He arrived in Tasmania at the age of 33 following a stint in India where he had been Principal of a Hindu College and Rector of a Calcutta High School. "Mickey"



Anderson was appointed Headmaster of Hutchins in 1892. He inherited a school of sound financial standing with 130 pupils, including 20 boarders. In the worst year of his stewardship, the enrolment dropped to 20. In 1905 there was one boarder and the School was almost bankrupt.

There were several reasons for Hutchins' decline during the Anderson years, not all of them within the Headmaster's control, although he is reported to have had certain 'personality difficulties'. Perhaps these inter-personal shortcomings precipitated his conflict with staff and his fall-out with the Trustees, the Bishop and the Diocesan Council. No doubt the greatest disadvantage to general prosperity in the 1890s was the nation-wide depression – "Mickey" should not be accused of bringing that about.

There is scant information from press coverage of events involving Hutchins during the Anderson years, with 1902 notable for the almost total lack of reportage. One rare highlight was the Southern Football Premiership, with Hutchins victorious over Buckland School by 104 points.

In 1902, Major G A Gurney was in his second year as Co-Principal of Hutchins. Why Gurney had been appointed is unclear though his involvement in the position was clearly advantageous. Hutchins' stocks rose while he was there and fell off when he left, to co-found King's Grammar School in 1903.

Just 54 boys were enrolled in 1902. At the prize giving, the Bishop was critical of Hutchins' success at Mathematics in the public exams. As an Oxford man, he believed that the Classics should be in the educational ascendancy. He wanted to see emphasis placed on an all-round education and he hoped that an esprit de corps would develop soon at Hutchins to mirror that found at the public schools of England.

Anderson found himself constantly battling poverty. As Headmaster, he was expected to repair and maintain school property, and pay staff from the income he derived from fees. Falling enrolments equalled a plummeting income. There was no school endowment fund in 1902. As well, the Head paid rent of 60 pounds to the Trustees for his house, and it was customary for Headmasters at Hutchins to provide the Newcastle Scholarships for four boys, an amount of around 50 pounds, out of their own pocket. Add the cost of bringing up a family of ten children and it can be appreciated that "Mickey" Anderson operated in circumstances of financial stricture. The Church, struggling to deal with the impact of the depression on its own income base, did not come to his aid.

Hutchins 100 years ago was heading towards oblivion. At no time in its history since has it faced such pressure to close. It might be said that "Mickey" Anderson guided his school through its darkest hours. There is equal evidence to suggest that he was the principal cause of the crisis.

Parents' Association

The year 2002 saw something of a reduced involvement by parents in the Association. It is therefore perhaps timely to revisit the aims and purpose of the Association in the life of the school.

Membership of the Hutchins Parents' Association is automatic for all parents of the school and we encourage everyone to attend our meetings. The emphasis of the Association's meetings is on providing a forum where the parents as a body can provide feedback to the Principal on issues of concern and in turn the Principal can report back on activities and issues taking place around the school, in a relaxed and informal atmosphere. The Principal and the Director of Development attend the Association's meetings as representatives of the school, and fundraising activities are also discussed. On occasions a guest speaker is invited to address the meeting to speak on a topic of interest to parents.

Our main fundraising activity in 2002 was the annual School Fair. This year the Fair was held in April and we were blessed with a balmy autumn evening in which the aromas of a variety of exotic food stalls mingled with the dulcet tones of the school social held in the Auditorium. Over \$23,000 was raised from the generous school community and their friends. Thankyou to all who attended.

Other fundraising activities conducted throughout 2002 included catering at various school functions, such as the grandparent's morning teas, and operating the second hand clothing pool. Profits from the operation of the tuckshops run by the Spotless Group are also directed to the Parents' Association and any help provided by parents assisting in the tuckshops means a more profitable operation and a direct financial benefit to the Parents Association. Thankyou to all the parents who have helped as volunteers in the tuckshops in 2002.

This year we organised a very successful Fathers' Dinner held at the Royal Yacht Club of Tasmania and a cocktail evening held at the Principal's home. Last year a successful Mothers' Dinner was held and another is planned for 2003.

Monies raised by the Parents' Association are directed back to the school by financing projects selected by the Association and approved by the school. In the last five years the Association has contributed over \$280,000 to school improvements spread among the various campuses. In the year 2002 the Association pledged \$100,000 to be paid in instalments over the following three years for improvements to the Senior School quadrangle.

Unfortunately the Southern Mothers' Group disbanded in 2002, and the support they have provided for the Association over the years will be greatly missed. It is disappointing that the network of contacts and friendships will no longer be available through this group.

I would like thank the hard working committee without whose involvement the Parents' Association would not function - in particular Vice-president Lyn Sayers, Secretary Andrew Nesbitt, Carmel Fenton, Rowena Ransley, Jenny Middleton, Sally Gumley, Rob Owens, Peter Illingworth and all on the Fair Committee.

In summary, I urge you all to actively support the Parents' Association in the future to ensure it remains a robust body filling an important place in the school community.

The Hutchins Foundation

Development Office are very closely linked, using at times the same staff, the same volunteers and the same offices. However, the functions of each organisation are quite different

The Hutchins Foundation is the school's major fund-raising organisation and has been in operation since 1977. It has the responsibility for raising large sums of money for new buildings and for ensuring the future stability of the school through the Endowment Fund. Much of the almost ten million dollars in the Endowment Fund has come from bequests received from old boys and others in the last thirty years and from the earnings that these invested funds have created. The Annual Appeal, which this year raised over \$32,000, is a crucial element of the Foundation's fund raising work. Various sections within the Foundation are charged with the promotion of bequests, with the planning of special fund-raising events, and with the careful investment of all funds raised.

The Development Office, on the other hand, assists the school by working closely with Old Boys, with the Parents' Association, and in managing all marketing and public relations functions throughout the school. The Development Office also coordinates events such as Anniversary Week, Speech Night, the New Parents' Dinner and tours of the school for visiting old boys and prospective new parents.

Significant events through the year have been the Old Boys' reunions, Jazz 'n' the Boyz, marketing activities locally and internationally, The Hutchins Art Prize 2002 and the activities of the various Foundation

Old Boys and Archives

Although we were sorry to see old boy Andrew Short (former Archivist and Alumni Officer) leave Hutchins to follow a musical career internationally, we were very pleased to welcome to the position John Ancher, whose three sons have attended Hutchins. During the year Old Boys' reunions have been held in Melbourne, Brisbane, Sydney, Hobart and Launceston. A major survey of old boys wishes with regards to the reunion program has been included in the final edition for 2002 of the school and Old Boys' newsletter Magenta and Black.

A major redevelopment of the Nettlefold Library and the Olga Braham Gallery has resulted in a slightly smaller display space for the archives, but a much larger storage area. The archives are an invaluable resource for the school, housing documents, historical artefacts, furniture and works of art dating back to the first day of Hutchins' existence. Old Boys and current students frequently use the resource to trace family histories or to gain a glimpse of life as it was in times gone by.

Music

An important part of the school's life is seen in the many musical and dramatic performances through the year. Major productions such as Thark and The Killing and Chilling of My Annabel Lee are complemented by productions in Middle

all levels is enjoyed in mini-concerts and at assemblies, but the huge production of Jazz 'n' the Boyz was of special significance to the school and to this report, as it drew heavily upon the assistance of the Foundation's Programs & Projects Committee. A threecourse meal and wines were enjoyed by almost two hundred guests in the recently refurbished Terence Butler Auditorium, while some of the school's top performers joined well-known professional singers and musicians from around the state. The decline in Tasmania's school-aged population has not been as severe as predicted several years ago, but it is still a key element in forward planning. To counter the effects of declining local enrolments, Hutchins has been engaged in significant marketing activities on the local, national and international arenas.

Our Open Day, the very popular Principal's Seminars, the public concerts and soirées, the School Fair and other events help boost the school's image locally. For interstate parents, our website is an important marketing tool and the interstate Old Boys dinners are advertised in the relevant newspapers - once again boosting the school's image.

Internationally, we have established links with many countries in South East Asia and have worked hard to develop new links with Vietnam, Germany and Brazil. The Director of Development is often envied by his colleagues as he goes to exotic parts of the world to visit education counsellors and to brief their staff on Hutchins and Tasmania, but the glamour of sitting for ninety minutes in a Bangkok taxi whose air conditioning has failed, and trying to battle the usual traffic jams, is the reality. Hutchins has always had a small number of international students but in 2002 the boys from all over the world represent not only a very important cultural and social addition to the school, but are also generating a significant level of our total revenue.

The Hutchins Art Prize

The Art Prize, founded and funded by the Foundation, is an important event not only in the school year but in the national art calendar as well. It has grown by almost 400% since the first Art Prize in 1996 and

entries are regularly received from every state and territory of Australia and from other Pacific Rim countries.

His Excellency Sir Guy Green, Governor of Tasmania, is now patron of the prize, and the new Chief Judge is Mrs Akky Van Oatrop. Director of the Sydney Biennial Works on Paper Fair. The Finalists Exhibition at The Long Gallery Salamanca Place fulfils several functions. Firstly, the Gala Opening cocktail party enables the school to acknowledge the work of so many volunteers and helpers. The event also demonstrates to boys studying art that their work and their interests are important and valuable. Finally, the exhibition welcomes almost 2,000 visitors to a Hutchins event - it is therefore important in marketing.

The Foundation

2002 marks the Silver Anniversary of The Hutchins Foundation. Mr Andrew Kemp, the sole remaining signatory to the Articles and Memorandum of Association, has maintained his interest in the work of the Foundation and is still Chairman of the Allocations and Investments Committee. As with any organisation, new members are always needed to give a fresh approach and to give new ideas. The A&I Committee is pleased to welcome Messrs Michael Muller, Charles Brothers and Jeff Halliday to the Committee.

The Programs and Projects Committee welcomes new members Mrs Deborah Rose and Mr Bruce House. We are also pleased to welcome Mrs Jenny Inglis, for many years a leading light in the school Parents' Association, as the new Vice-president of the Foundation. She will assume the Presidency when the current President, Mrs Di Troon, steps down. All members of the committees are provided in the School Directory.

Continued work on the promotion of bequests to the school, a dinner auction and other events planned for 2003, and continued close monitoring of the Foundation's investments will see the Hutchins Foundation continue to grow and continue to assist the school.

Conclusion

I wish to pay tribute to the staff in the Foundation and Development Office: Pam Daly, Ann Reimer (whose resignation we sadly received earlier this year). Louise Young, Don Camm, John Ancher and Kyler Culver, a GAP student from the USA who has been of great assistance in the Archives.

The Foundation and the Hutchins Development Office are a little like Pandora's Box - when the door to the office area is opened one never quite knows what will come out: mass mailings of invitations to special events, Golf Day score cards, art works packaged ready for transportation to a gallery, special stationery for a Grandparents' Day, piles of pre-loved books and items for the Fair's "Trash and Treasure" stall, or even huge piles of receipts acknowledging people's generosity during the Annual Appeal. All make life in the Development Office exciting, hectic, challenging - and great fun!



Is my confession music to your ears?

Let me set the scene. It's lunchtime on a sunny day, and I am sitting on the grass outside the Chapel with two students. These are the ones who responded to my call for interested people to come and choose new hymns/songs for use in the Diary and in the new Chapel song-book.

One of the students, a faithful lad whose taste in liturgical music I find quite scary, says: "Your music does not connect with young people. You are failing us in your role as Chaplain by not giving us that [ie the music that he liked]".

There it was - out in the open, and as plain as a Hillsong lyric. I was the perpetrator of not just one-off failure, but of systematic and gross violation of young people's musical tastes. I confess to exposing boys to hymns that have some depth [Mr Overton forced me at this point to add the words "according to me" and some of which are, horror of horrors, over five years old! I have been assisted in this failing by some charitable musicians along the way - although I'd like to have had even more!



Three boys and a housemaster (what a great title for a film!) bet \$5 each towards the food appeal, that I would not wear Bob-the-Builder hat throughout a service. They obviously didn't know me, and it was like taking sweets from babies (which I also enjoy doing!).

5. Most serious of all shortcomings, however, lie in failing to succumb to the gloom and despair of the world. In

ugly contrast to this, I have tried to proclaim that faithfulness is more important than success; and to challenge the community to live lives of joy and sparkle, mindful of responsibilities given to us by God. Moreover, I was caught not only playing hymns that were over five years old but telling stories that were thousands of years old, about Jesus who rose from the dead and is alive today!

I confess to all these short-comings, but in my defence I must say that I did not act alone! I had great help, and I have great hopes that many others will continue to join me in some of the failings I have mentioned. It's much more fun that way!

The Duke of Edinburgh Award

The Award is an exciting selfdevelopment program for young people aged between 14 and 25. There are three levels: Bronze, Silver and Gold. Each of these levels is made up of four sections: service, skills, physical recreation and expeditions.

Below is an extract from Simon Enman's journal. Simon completed his Bronze Award last year and this year is completing his Silver Award. This trip counted towards the expedition component and was completed with nine others in October.

"Fortescue Bay — The Oasis

We all rose and had brekky for a 9:00am start to walking. The weather was on and off, with the occasional shower, not cold enough for thermals, but not warm enough for t-shirt and shorts.

I found the walk out to Cape Pillar a bit boring until the view of the magnificent 250+ metre sea cliffs which dominate the Cape Pillar area. My boredom was taken away by a fantastic group of people who I was sharing this trip with.

My sleep was interrupted by almost constant fronts bringing hail and heavy rain.

The wind gradually got stronger as we got closer to Hurricane Heath and Perdition Ponds. We had lunch at Bare Knoll, which wasn't very bare - it provided shelter from the winds. After crossing Lunchtime Creek and scrubbing our boots so as not to spread root rot, we arrived at Perdition Ponds. Our results continue to be strong with many exceptional performances. The distribution of Tasmanian Certificate of Education awards within subjects was encouraging (Satisfactory Achievement 35%, High Achievement 34% and Outstanding Achievement 18%). What pleases me even more about our scores is that they show that a large number of our weaker boys are gaining sound results. This is reflected in a comparison of Hutchins results with statewide performance: 13% of Hutchins boys were in the top 5% of scores, 42% were in the top 15% and 64% were in the top

Curriculum Developments

Literacy

Improving literacy is an ongoing emphasis. This year activity ranged from the 'Drop Everything and Read' program in Year 9 to the conduct of national 'bench-mark literacy testing' in Years 3, 5 and 7 and the introduction of the 'First Steps Program' across the ELC and Junior

Teachers in the ELC and Junior School focused their professional development time this year on coming to an understanding of the First Steps program. The program provides teachers with a framework for linking assessment with teaching and learning in the four areas of literacy. These areas are oral language, reading, writing and spelling. The program was developed by the Education Department of Western Australia to provide a framework that allows teachers to identify milestones in students development (known as key indicators) and then provide suitable activities that consolidate their understanding and develop further skills. Much of the teachers' time this year was spent trialling activities and

generally becoming familiar with the program. Time was also spent on developing a common understanding of the different key indicators so that meaningful assessment information can be passed from one grade to the next.

Integrated Studies in Years 7

The inclusion of an integrated theme in the Middle School curriculum has been a successful innovation in recent years. What is it?

Essentially, it is a style of teaching and learning that focuses on one main theme or topic, which allows students to move across the traditional subject boundaries as they learn about their world. Rather than studying Ancient Egypt one lesson, algebra the next, followed by perhaps the dissection of a sheep's eye (all of which are interesting and valuable in their own right), a theme is selected which is studied and explored for two or three weeks in every area of the curriculum. The learning that takes place is rich, exciting and intense.

This year the theme selected was 'Oceans'. Boys were able to study topics as diverse as marine biology, the movement of the tides, myths and legends, exploration and migration; and the unit was enhanced by an 'Oceans' assembly at which displays were mounted by boys and by members of the community, guest speakers made presentations and a locally made surfing film was shown.

At the conclusion of the unit all classes participated in a traditional 'boat race' that engendered a lot of goodhumoured rivalry and some excellent team work, both in building the boats and in racing them.

Revitalizing Years 9 and 10

This year we confirmed the model for revitalizing Years 9 and 10. Each year will be split into two semester units similar to the arrangements in Year 8. This design will considerably increase subject choice and increase boys' engagement in their learning. The model includes an expansion of the time spent at Southport. The nature and content of the semester units and the timing of their introduction are dependent upon curriculum changes occurring outside the school.

Gifted & Talented

The gifted and talented program is a real strength at Hutchins. We are now providing significant community eadership in addition to work with the Hutchins community. Mrs Jo Cook, who leads the program, has described developments this year in her Centre for Excellence Report.

Information Technology We are very fortunate at Hutchins to have the leadership and expertise of Mrs Jill Abell in ICT. During 2001-2002 Information Technology Committee (including the Student IT Leaders, Isuru Amarasena, Anders Marchant and Tim Cooperl to review the ICT Plan. Its priorities are: delivery of the school's curriculum resources 'anywhere, anytime' to the students and the wider Hutchins community, and to provide remote access to services for teaching staff. A longer-term objective is to enable curriculum delivery online to enhance students' learning outcomes.

An audit of the school's computers (desktops and laptops) - their make, processor, operating system and memory - revealed that a set number of desktops or laptops needed to be replaced in the coming budget periods as they were below the performance, storage, security and maintenance benchmarks of 128mb RAM or incompatible with the Windows 2000 operating system. We also need to increase internet bandwidth. To improve our internet speed beyond the saturated ISDN link, it is planned to investigate ADSL connection services to fit with our quota and filtering management systems in 2003.

This year we introduced the International Computer Drivers Licence (ICDL) in Senior School Year 9. It addresses core IT competencies and information skills that every student will need in order to be employable and or participate in tertiary education.

New ways of thinking about curriculum design and implementation provided new opportunities for resource creation and inspiring interaction between students and teachers. Remote access to the Hutchins' intranet services opened up new opportunities for Hutchins students to manage their study time or learning resources. The HUTnet website at http://info.hutchins.tas.edu.au with its own password has become a gateway or portal to many curriculum resources and information services on the school's computer network.

As 2002 closed, a new and dynamic database-driven website developed by the school's IT Network Manager (Mr Ian McRael and WebMaster (Mr Kent Moore) was launched. As a Centre for Online Learning, teaching staff will be adding their class notes or activities, course materials, tests, practical work,

homework or assignments sheets. Another online curriculum resource service is the Masterfile course management software. Integrated with the school's three online library catalogues for the Nettlefold, Stephens and Early Learning Centres, this service is progressively listing all curriculum guidelines and handbooks, all course outlines, course objectives, courses, policies, procedural guidelines, notices, timetables, newsletters, sports results, achievements and awards.

Student Representative Council Ben Groom, the Chairman of the SRC Curriculum Executive has reported elsewhere, so I won't repeat him here. However, I do endorse his comments and commend Ben and his committee members Lee Andrewartha, Hugh Thomson, Mark Toppin, Pekko Mahakitsiri, Tom Chang, Lewis Halliday, Robert Easther and Patrick McMullen. This year's committee did a particularly good job and contributed significantly to improving academics and enriching the co-curriculum program. Ben deserves special credit for his formation of the Academic Council this year. The Council members represent some of the best brains in the school. They have been particularly helpful promoting academics and with the conduct of the Subject Expo and the Subject Fairs.

Changes to Education in Tasmania

The changes being considered for Years 9 and 10 at Hutchins are being mirrored in other Tasmanian schools and in a number of mainland states. TASSAB is reviewing its Year 9 to 12 syllabuses and re-structuring them into 8 levels with five awards to replace the existing three. They are also incorporating the Key Competencies. At the same time the Department of Education is developing a Year 7 to 10 curriculum based on five 'essential learnings': thinking, communicating, personal futures, social responsibility and world futures. Clearly there is an overlap in these developments. Professor Rosyln Arnold, the new Dean of the Faculty of Education, has been appointed by the Minister for Education to conduct a review of education from Years 9 to 12. In recent meetings we have emphasised a number of things: the importance of maintaining subject knowledge and ways of knowing, the importance of curriculum continuity from K to 12 (not just to Year 10) and, finally, ensuring appropriate certification in Year 12 so that all students can move on to appropriate further education, whether in Tasmania or on the mainland.



Baraka is an online interactive database for the use by the Old Boys of the Hutchins School. This versatile tool allows registered Old Boys to log in to the database from anywhere in the world and upload/edit all their personal details including images. As part of the suite visitors can access internal email, chat and forum style discussions.

In 'techie' speak the Baraka Online Database is a basic html website with a full java interface to the MySQL database. The complete package is designed to be hosted on a web server with an Apache and Jakarta Tomcat JSP-Engine web server software. The graphic user interface (GUI) is web-based for administrator and user. It is planned to be accessible in early 2003: stay in contact with the school Webmaster - kmo@hutchins.tas.edu.au



Webmaster's Report

2002 has provided more opportunity for our web services to continue to grow and develop. While the external website continues to provide a great window for the public to view our school the intranet continues to provide greater support for the curriculum and both student and school services. This year through the excellent support and development skills of Mr Ian MacRae (IT Network Manager) we have introduced active website components with dynamic content being provided by databases and ASP scripting. It has been great working with Ian to produce the Online Bulletin and our new Online Learning Website.

Credit must go to our IT Leaders from the past few years. Isuru Amarasena has encouraged me to pursue the active web content through his implementation of the discussion forums and other utilities.

The new Centre for Online Learning will complement our current resource and content manager - MASTERfile. The new active website will allow teachers to publish their curriculum widely, including links to any resource needed by the students. The great advantage for students is the ease of access (both local and remote) to their teachers, coursework and school intranet. With the addition of discussion forums and other utilities the site will grow to be a valuable part of the school's IT infrastructure. Teachers can publish their pages very easily from the web browser. Uploading text and images is a breeze - no need to master specialized web authoring software. My first priority with the site is to see teachers establishing their presence through their own pages.

The intranet now provides a whole range of links to the many school and student publications. It is easier to go there and have a look than read all about it. Get on a browser and type: http://info.hutchins.tas.edu.au username: hutchins with password: magenta and 'surf' around, see what you discover. Check there regularly!

The cover stories cycle through giving those special activities some 'airplay' for all the school community to enjoy.




The Matric students have responded well to a new face in their domain. They have focussed on achieving solid results in all the varied media they have explored.

In 1983, it was decided by the Tasmanian Sail Training Association to build a replica. It now sails for tourists and sail training trips.





The Hutchins Volleyball Club had mixed results in the 2002 season: some teams exerting dominance while others used the 2002 season as a learning experience.


