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Chairman of the Board

This year has been another successful year for Hutchins, in which we again exceeded our forecast student numbers. Redevelopment of the Junior School is continuing, following the opening earlier this year of the new Dudley Clarke Performing Arts Centre.

It is the Board's intention to begin working on Senior School at the end of 2004. By then, the Junior School modifications should have been completed. The success of our projects is closely tied to the strong relationships between our architect, bursar, board and principal.

Fees

The educational program and facilities we are able to provide our students are governed by fees charged, government assistance and our expenditure. The recent reduction in state funding of \$160,000 per annum has affected us. Information technology and communication costs will increase substantially this next year. We are, however, fortunate that increased enrolments in 2004 will allow us to contain fee rises within normal bounds.

Governance

A fundamental pre-condition for a school is for it to be governed properly – the Board determines policy and the Principal has complete responsibility for day-to-day matters. There continues to be a very strong relationship between the Board and the Principal and I thank Mr Toppin for his strong leadership and management of the school.

This year we welcomed two new members to the Board of Management, Mr Scott Harvey and Mrs Pam Windsor. We farewelled Mr David Catchpole, Mr Andrew Downie and Professor Rob Clark. We thanked Mr Ian Johnston for his fifteen years of service to various school committees and the Board. I would like to thank all Board members for their contribution.

Staff

Major events in the school year and building upgrades tend to attract attention but it is people who make it happen. The school's success or failure rests on the calibre of its staff. I would like to thank Mr Prince for his control of administration and finance, Ms Brewster, Mr McQueen and Mr Rae for their leadership of the mini schools, Mr Hall for his work in the Development Office and Mr Irons for his significant contribution as Deputy Principal. To all staff, thank you for your dedicated teaching and guiding of all our students on their path to Year 12 and beyond.

The Hutchins "family"

On behalf of the Board, I wish to thank everyone in the Hutchins 'family' who have helped the School – the Parents' Association, the Foundation, the Old Boys, coaches, volunteers and all other parts of our community, who are essential to the health and wellbeing of our school.

A great deal has been achieved in 2003 and I am sure that it will be recorded as another successful year in the school's history. To everyone, thank you for your contribution.

From the Principal

The school is building...

Our building programme has continued apace and the Nelson Road streetscape has substantially changed. This is most apparent with the new Music School – the angles of the building, its size, location and colour have made this inevitable. All appreciate its construction – Junior School students can learn without Music drifting constantly into the classrooms and Music students have a first class facility in which teaching and learning can take place. The name The Dudley Clarke Performing Arts Centre was carried by the music from the old centre to the new centre.

A new playground was constructed for our younger boys. By the end of this year, the conversion of the old Music wing into five completely renovated Junior School classrooms will have been completed. The remaining sections of the Junior School will be renovated in the first half of 2004. At the end of 2004 we hope to move the builders to the Senior School and begin a major renovation of the classrooms and the internal Quad area.

...and enrolling more students

An unexpected increase in enrolments has been very important in allowing us to accelerate our programme of renovation, and the school finished 2003 with some 1020 students. In 1998, enrolments were predicted to fall to 890, and from 1998 we had seen a steady drop in our numbers. Falling population, centralization of middle managers out of Hobart and, most importantly, the absence of young married couples in the state demographics were the contributing factors.

2002 and especially 2003 have both seen an escalation in housing prices, people coming from interstate and settling, and renewed economic confidence in Tasmania. The consequent increase in students from the home market, together with an increase in international students, has reversed the enrolments decline. We look forward to a continuing sound enrolment position in 2004.

The Dudley Clarke Performing Arts Centre 2003

The new Performing Arts Centre was opened on Friday 9 May by the Reverend Dr Dudley B Clarke.

The Principal, Mr W D Toppin, said in the program for the opening that "Times and needs change and the decision to build again the Dudley Clarke Performing Arts Centre reflects changing demands and needs".

Purpose-built relocation

"Jazz bands, Senior School boys working and performing in small groups, an increase in the numbers of boys taking private tuition, the demands of the TCE subject Audio Design: all meant that space in the old building was insufficient. Junior School and Music staff were subjected to a constant background of music and this was interfering with the Junior School staff's ability to teach nearby and the Music staff's ability to focus on their tasks!"

"The new building provides excellent sound separation from other parts of the school, it is ideally located for all sections of the school and it is a fitting symbol of Music at Hutchins. It is constructed to meet the needs of Hutchins boys for many years."

At the official opening of the building, performances by many of the school's music groups were well received by the capacity crowd of guests who enjoyed a light supper before the official opening ceremony and a special concert.

Dr Clarke, for whom the building is named, was Deputy Headmaster and Chaplain at Hutchins from 1959–1961, and Headmaster 1971–1987. He is an accomplished musician who sings, composes, and plays piano, double bass and viola.



The Webber Lectures

The Ethics of Governors, Dons, Doctors & Reverends Michael

The Webber Lecture is sponsored by The Hutchins School as a service to the community. Six lectures have been delivered so far. The Reverend Michael Webber, after whom the series of lectures is named, delivered the inaugural presentation in 1998. His topic was "Ethics – Ancient Standards for Modern Times?". Now retired, Michael Webber had wide contact with the community as Dean of Hobart, a teacher in schools, a lecturer at the now defunct Tasmanian College of Advanced Education and the University of Tasmania, a broadcaster, a hospital chaplain and a chairman of a number of boards, including St John's Hospital.

The second lecture was given in 1999 by Dr Simon Longstaff, Executive Director of The St James Ethics Centre of Sydney. It was entitled "In Whose Hands does the Future Lie?". In his speech Dr Longstaff covered topics as diverse as the possibility of free will, the formation of a good society, the qualifications for parenthood, the place of the nuclear family and the role of the school.

The third lecture was given in 2000 by Professor Don Chalmers, Professor of Law at the University of Tasmania. With a combination of speech and a PowerPoint presentation, Professor Chalmers spoke to the topic "Genetics and the New Millennium": in essence he spoke of the challenges posed by the new technologies and by scientific research, and of how society might harness the promise of the potential benefits of technology and research whilst at the same time minimizing the threat of possible risks.

The lecture in 2001 was delivered by the Reverend Father Michael Tate. Father Tate has served as Dean of the Faculty of Law at the University of Tasmania, has been elected to the Senate, and has been Minister for Justice in the Australian Government and Ambassador to the Netherlands and the Holy See. His talk entitled "Ethics and Law in the International Field" gave disturbing background to the conflicts in Rwanda and between the Bosnians and Serbians. He spoke with optimism of the possibility of bringing individual leaders of states to book for political war crimes. As a result of Father Tate's speech, many students took an active interest in the trial of Slobodan Milosovich.

Professor Ian Harper, one of Australia's best-known academic economists, gave the 2002 lecture entitled "The Ethics of Capitalism". Professor Harper's paper led to some

vigorous discussion in question time, particularly from members of the general public who had been intrigued by the title of the lecture.

The most recent of the Webber Lectures was given by the then Governor of Tasmania, Sir Guy Green. Sir Guy's topic was "The Uniqueness and Absolute Value of the Individual and Taking Ethics Seriously". Sir Guy spoke on two related themes. The first was on "the essential value of human beings" and he explained how Christianity, humanism and natural rights theory hold that the value and significance of individuals are intrinsic qualities held by individuals by virtue of their humanity. The second theme, "what it means to take ethics seriously", was a criticism of "undisciplined armchair philosophy" and an attempt to identify the basic necessities of engaging in rational ethical discussion. Sir Guy's speech led to animated discussion, particularly between Sir Guy and some of the Year 12 students.

The immediate future of the Webber Lecture seems secure: indeed the next speaker, His Excellency Dr Richard Butler, can be guaranteed to give a stimulating paper and, hopefully, draw a large audience.

Farewell from Andrew Legg

When I was first appointed to Hutchins as Head of Performing Arts in 1990, I was 25 years old and didn't feel or look any older or wiser than many of the boys I was teaching. I actually remember teaching Mark Knoop that year, a classical piano player of the highest calibre, who was enrolled in Level 3 Music (like pre-Tertiary Music today). Trouble was that when it came to classical history, theory and practice he knew more than I did (not saying much in those days).

The students of this remarkable school have the most amazing ability to continually surprise you. Just when you are ready to write them off, such as ...they'll never be ready in time

...they are so under-prepared (again) that they'll never make it

...how come there is still one boy in the wrong uniform?

...if Henry hits that kik drum just one more time...

...they are flat, tired, completely unresponsive and almost militant

And then during the final rehearsal, a state so volatile that it could only be made worse by the arrival of the Headmaster for his surprise visit, just to 'check and see if everything was going well for Speech Night'...

It is only then that, as they stand finally in front of the audience, looking anything but the rabble they were the day or even hour before, you ask them to give it all they've got, light the blue touch paper and stand well back, that you are totally overwhelmed by the most powerful and inspiring performances such as you never really thought possible, as each boy does give everything he's got for the good of the team – and for Mr Legg too.

It's only at the end of such a performance as you finally look up at the guys that you catch the wry grins on most of the faces...
"told ya she'd be ok Leggy. Don't know what you were ever worried about in the first place, mate!"

The learning curve in these early years was pretty steep, to say the least, and then, much as now, I made as many mistakes as I had successes. However, the staff, boys and parents of this school were always understanding and quick to forgive; incredibly supportive; and completely exorbitant with their praise when the occasional thing went right. Hutchins for me has been one of the most challenging, exciting and ultimately rewarding environments in which one could ever hope to learn and, ultimately, grow up.

It has been nothing but an honour and a privilege to stand alongside so many of these guys as they have achieved such remarkable success, and more, over the years. To all of them, to two Headmasters, all my friends and colleagues, and the wider Hutchins family, thank you all so very much.

And for always, everywhere, and in everything as well as for my very small part in it all, To God Be All The Glory.

Obituaries

George Albert McKay July 1912–July 2003

George Albert McKay came to Hutchins as a student at the age of fourteen and, during an association of some 42 years, had ten years as Head of Junior School. His retirement in 1979 was recorded in Virtus, and those tributes eloquently described George's contributions.

John Millington wrote: "He has served the school faithfully and well, not only as a member of staff but also as an old boy and a parent. Of the hundreds of boys who have come under his influence all remember him with respect and affection. Of the many colleagues who have worked with him and have been helped by him, all acknowledge him as a truly professional School Master".

Another colleague, the late Mr Richard Penwright, said: "I could not enumerate the many instances in my years at the school for which I owe gratitude to George McKay, but I do know that I am only one of so many who owe him so much. In my opinion, George is one of those people who have added lustre to his profession, a Christian gentleman who has done so much to help others without thought of reward, and has done so much to add to the honour and well-being of this grand school".

George McKay played a significant role in the history of Hutchins and in the lives of many staff and students, and the Junior School Staff Room has long been named in his honour. We note his passing in July with sadness, but mark his contributions with gratitude and pride.

Nick Smithies October 1981–April 2003

Nick Smithies passed away suddenly on 14th April of heart failure caused by a virus. Nick (son of Alison and Tony who are both staff members) joined Hutchins in 1987 and was a 1999 leaver, member of Stephens House under Mr McQueen's care, and a member of Mr Turbett's tutor group.

In his final year, Nick was made a House Prefect in recognition of his service to Stephens. He contributed extensively to house activities and involved himself widely, including the Big Brother Programme and Steves "Lend a Hand." He was also a Swing Band Member.

Academically, Nick would have been the first to admit he was not a high flier — he did, though, always try his best and his reports consistently reflect this. Mr Turbett, in his 1996 tutor report, captured an essential part of Nick: "I think that it is more in line with Nicholas' character to overcome rather than to avoid".

Ian McQueen comments: "I have three distinct sets of memories of Nick. I remember him as a conscientious, quietly supportive student in my Writers' Workshop class and as a thoroughly reliable, hard working member of our House Executive. However, the most significant memory, I think, is of a person with whom I felt thoroughly comfortable. It was always pleasant to chat with Nick, because he was so honest, so easygoing and he had a wonderful sense of humour.

Nick's love for the Army Reserve was ever present and in his final year he missed school to attend camp. In keeping with his hard-working attitude Nick promised to put in "the hard yards" to catch up. And he did.

From November 13–25 six 15-year-old students from Singapore's Chinese High School and their accompanying teacher, Goh Seach Joo, took part in many school and Year 9 Southport Camp programs. Billeted by Hutchins' host families and residing in Burbury House for other parts of their stay, the six students visited and toured many local places of interest. The study and outdoor education programme included a visit to the Marine Studies Centre at Woodbridge, the CSIRO Education Centre, the Mt Field National Park, Port Arthur historic sites and features on the Tasman Peninsula, and the well-received Southport activities of camping, walking treks, kayaking, abseiling, and snorkelling. At a combined Years 5–9 Assembly, the boys gave an interactive presentation about life at Chinese High School, its nearby Boarding School and the Asian cultural life of Singapore.

Capetown, South Africa

Zeno Rossouw's arrival at Hutchins encapsulated the advantages of cultural exchange. For Zeno there were the challenges and benefits of a new community, a new school and new friends. For the school it was a broadening in outlook as they received a student from another culture.

For hockey it was...wow, what a centre half! It soon became obvious that he was more than a centre half – he was a leader, an educator and an inspiration. He willingly and effectively officiated with umpiring and coaching in a range of age groups, and was elected co-captain of the First XI. This South African international

U18 player was so dominating that he became a target for opposition sides. They said: 'Stop Zeno and you'll stop Hutchins'. He absorbed this pressure and close attention and it allowed others to flourish. Anyway, the opposition soon found out that you can't stop Zeno.

The school, the community, and the hockey fraternity have all benefited from Zeno's presence and his impressive leadership. A great many people have been able to get to know this wonderful, highly personable, talented, principled, and easy-going young man.

University School, Ohio, USA

In Term 1, a group of seven students from the Middle and Senior School travelled to University School in Cleveland, Ohio. During the time away the boys stayed with American host families and participated in University School's education program. Unlike Hutchins, University School is situated on two campuses – the senior one in a semi-rural setting at Hunting Valley (Years 9–12). This is some 20–25 minutes driving time from the junior campus run by Mr Howard Kelly (former Junior School Principal) in the suburb of Shaker Heights (Years K–8).

University School has similar student numbers to Hutchins, and staff were very welcoming. However, it is an academically selective school and works diligently to maintain a very high standard of achievement – class sizes range from 15 to a maximum of 18 students. The school is exceptionally well-resourced – evident in the academic programs and sporting facilities (eg the gymnasium includes an indoor running track).

excursions, thereby seeing much of Cleveland city and surrounds. Special highlights included day trips out to an Amish school in Middlefield and to Niagara Falls. There was so much to see and experience: visits to the natural history museum, arts centre, aquarium, an informative river cruise and a trip to the top of one of the tallest skyscrapers, were all highlights.

The boys surmounted some significant personal challenges: coping with 30+ hours of flight both over and back, adapting to a different culture, living with new families, often needing to be well organized and, perhaps the most crucial challenge, being forever mindful of the need to be supportive of one another. All were successfully accomplished, some wonderful friendships forged and the boys were fine ambassadors. Our host families were exceptionally generous both with their care and time. The experience was far beyond our expectations. We extend our thanks to Hutchins, University School (with special thanks to Mr Kelly and Mrs Moyse) and to all the parents for providing this life-lasting opportunity. I recommend this wonderful experience to students between Years 8 and 10 and encourage those who might be interested to speak with any of the touring party.

Thailand Exchange

Then & Now

HUTCHINS AT BERRIEDALE

At the 1949 Hutchins Speech Night, F H Foster, Chairman of the Board, announced the purchase of 364 acres of open land between Berriedale and Claremont. This was to be the future site of the Senior School.

Just three years after celebrating the centenary of one of the country's oldest schools, what circumstances had led the conservative Hutchins Board to contemplate abandoning the school's stately purpose-built heritage accommodation in the centre of Hobart in order to relocate to Berriedale, a semi-rural suburb on Hobart's northern fringe?

The Board's Plan for the Development of the Hutchins School was published in the June edition of the 1950 School Magazine. Under the heading *The Future*, we learn that the school's financial situation '...calls for courageous and drastic action of a high order.' No endowment fund had ever been established at Hutchins. The school's ongoing survival depended on income from fees, interest from the Christ College Trust and donations from old boys. With maintenance of the old inadequate Macquarie Street buildings proving a constant and increasing drain on funds, the Board chose to '...rebuild the school in proper surroundings and style, and to establish an attractive and modern institution providing its students with school life under first-class conditions.' At Berriedale.

There was a Short Range Plan and a Long Range Plan. The Short Range Plan focused on development of the Junior School site at Sandy Bay (acquired in 1946) in order to '...cope with the immediate and pressing problems of shortage of accommodation and lack of facilities, and to maintain efficiency during the difficult transition period to the Long Range Plan.' Items started for immediate construction at Sandy Bay were a sports oval, a boarding house for both senior and junior boarders and a primary teaching block (8 to 12 years). In addition, the Macquarie Street premises were to be modified 'as required' to provide extra classrooms.



Raising money for the move was a huge obstacle. Central to its liquidity was the Board's determination '...to seek amendment of the Christ College Act to allow it to mortgage and eventually lease or sell the Macquarie Street School.'

In 1948, Hutchins was heading for financial ruin. 1947 had produced a loss of 1,360 pounds. This was followed by a 1,500 pounds loss in 1948. Income from fees was no longer able to meet running costs, wages and repairs. Concerned parents began to withdraw their boys from the school, exacerbating the dilemma. Relocation of the Senior School to Berriedale, where there was enough land to run a school farm, was the modern solution. The 'feeder' campus for juniors at Sandy Bay would ensure that Hutchins in its new northern location continued to attract boys from the wealthy southern suburbs.

At the beginning of 1955, a small sub-primary school was opened at Montrose as a projected feeder for the Berriedale development which, though not progressing under new Headmaster W H Mason-Cox, had not been forgotten.

During 1955, 1956 and 1957, negotiations were conducted between the State Government and the Hutchins Board over the sale of the Berriedale land for housing. The Government initiated these approaches; the Board resisted. In October 1957, the Board leased the property for 300 pounds per annum for three years, indicating its determination to retain ownership.

Following the sudden death of Mason-Cox in early 1958, and the appointment of Vernon Jones as his short-term replacement, further approaches were made by the Director of Housing regarding purchase of the Berriedale site. Encumbered by the ownership of four separate school properties, the Board decided to push for acquisition of the derelict Queenborough Cemetery which adjoined the Hutchins

Junior School property at Sandy Bay. The prospect of locating the whole school on one site was becoming increasingly attractive.

The Berriedale venture would be abandoned and the sale of the northern property would enable the Cemetery site to be purchased.

The Long Range Plan was to build, at Berriedale, the Hutchins School. The concept was for a modern school comprising accommodation for sub-primary, primary and secondary education. There were to be teaching blocks, a boarding house, an assembly hall, a chapel, a library, staff residences, tennis courts, two sports ovals, a boatshed, a swimming pool and a mixed farm.

In the event, Berriedale proved hard to dispose of for a satisfactory price, and Queenborough Cemetery, an appealing development option for many interest groups, was not secured by Hutchins until a referendum of ratepayers was held by Hobart City Council in May 1960. The referendum supported the development of the Cemetery for

educational purposes rather than for a rest area or a tennis centre. Sale of the Berriedale land was slow and piecemeal.

The final word on Berriedale can be left to Headmaster Geoff Newman who retired at the end of 1963, overwhelmed by the period of upheaval he had endured at Hutchins since replacing Vernon Jones at the start of 1959. In his journal Newman wrote:

'The development of a housing estate alongside the school's property and a survey of the sources of the school's population suggested that Berriedale was not really the site for Hutchins. Later, the sale of this land proved a great help in meeting the escalating costs of the new school.'

A rather different sort of school, with an emphasis on agricultural education, could so easily have eventuated out in the northern suburbs, just down the road from its traditional rival.

The promotion of efficient and well-developed thinking skills has become increasingly important in educational frameworks. The critical attribute of intelligent human beings is not only having information, but also knowing how to act on it.

Our remedial programs, gifted education and ESL classes all seek to foster the 16 habits of mind.

Our learning environment has been enhanced through relocation to a new facility — the vibrant colour scheme has proven to be popular with boys and staff alike and the floor plan has provided us with spaces that cater well for boys from Prep to Year 10.

Mrs Diana Williams commenced with us this year on a full-time basis. Her experience and skills complemented the services offered through the Centre, through the provision of psychological assessments and social skills groups.

The Year 9/10 study support lines provide wonderful opportunity for boys to gain extra assistance with their studies. The boys value this time and it is gratifying to see their growth in independent learning. Parent involvement is welcome and the boys and staff particularly appreciated the seafood lunch in Term 2 provided by Mrs Atkins and prepared by the Year 9s.

The ELC and Junior School Program continue a commitment to early intervention and remediation. The standardised testing program, together with teacher and parent observations, ensures that students who may require additional support are identified and offered assistance. We are fortunate to have Wendy Sakul and Penny Brown concentrating in this work as they have significant experience and expertise in remediation and working with small groups. Their work is supported and enhanced through the volunteer parents who so generously give time to the Macquarie Reading Program. This work is vital and much appreciated.

The Hutchins School has continued bringing Professional Development in Gifted and Talented education to this state and this year hosted sessions conducted by Bronwyn Macleod from the UNSW as well as the Director of the Future Problem Solving program.

Future Problem Solving experienced a steady growth during 2003 and we were able to register two teams in the middle competition. John McQuillan, Cyton Tong, Daniel Hocking, Adam Wylde-Brown and Callum Hyland represented the School in the national finals that were held in Sydney in October.

The teamwork at the Centre makes for an extremely supportive environment both for the staff and students. I wish to publicly acknowledge the hard work and dedication shown by all who work at the Centre for Excellence and to thank them for their professionalism and good humour. The 16 Habits of Mind are certainly challenged at the Centre!

The students involved in this program have all made significant gains and deserve congratulations.

The Hutchins Foundation

The Hutchins Foundation Ltd & the Development Office

2003 was a busy year for the Foundation and Development Office, with major fundraising, marketing and restructuring activities being key aspects of the year.

Fundraising

The annual appeal raised \$43,000 towards the cost of new playground equipment for the Junior School and Early Learning Centre and a multi-station gymnasium weights training machine for use by Middle and Senior School boys. The support for the appeal by parents, grandparents, staff and old boys is very heartening. The support from the school community for the Dinner Auction was also very pleasing. With many hours of work from Mr Tony Smithies and the Foundation P&P Committee under its Chairman Judy Smith, the evening was a great success and raised \$19,985 for the school. The P&P Committee also worked closely with the staff and boys in the Music School to present a stunning evening of cool jazz, hot food and chilled wines at the annual "Jazz on a Winter's Eve" concert.

From Strahan to Stuttgart ...

Hutchins reaches out to the world. With students from Hong Kong, Japan, Taiwan, Korea, Germany, South Africa, USA, Thailand, Malaysia, China and Singapore, Hutchins is establishing firm links with the wider world. New multi-lingual brochures have been produced to promote Hutchins and Collegiate in Thailand, China and Hong Kong, Brazil, Germany and Japan.

Hutchins also participated in a series of education exhibitions arranged by Austrade and other organisations in Berlin, Leipzig, Munich, Stuttgart, Hamburg, Cologne, Dusseldorf and Frankfurt. Hutchins and Collegiate were invited to visit the Wilhelm-Rabe-Schule in Lüneberg where students in English classes were given details of life and schooling in Tasmania and parents were given details of the exciting opportunities of studying in Hobart. In Bangkok, Hutchins and Collegiate held a joint education seminar at a leading city hotel, and were guests at a luncheon at the Ladprao Bilingual School.

Marketing

This year the enrolment numbers were higher than anticipated – attributable to the school's marketing activities and to the growth in the number of new arrivals in Hobart. The popular ELC Information Evenings drew appreciative crowds keen to increase their knowledge of reading, writing or spelling methods in children's early years. At each evening, the guests included Hutchins parents, teachers from other schools and members of the public.

Open Day and AgFest are also popular events in the school's calendar, and play an important role in promoting the name of the school to the wider community. A "community awareness" series of newspaper advertisements for cultural, educational and alumni events was another edge to the marketing sword in 2003. Work has begun on a new design for the school website – to make it easier for people to find the details they need to be able to enrol their sons at Hutchins.

Exchange programs with The Chinese High School (Singapore), The Regent's School (Thailand) and with the University School (USA) have continued to be attractive options for Hutchins boys. New exchange programs with schools in India and the United Kingdom are being developed.

An exciting tour to the West Coast is planned for the Big Band for early 2004. While this is partly a "cultural gift" to the towns of Strahan and Queenstown, its value as a marketing event cannot be underestimated. Part marketing and part fundraising, the new summer schools and study tour programs will commence in 2004 and much preliminary work has been happening in 2003.

Staffing

We welcomed Mr Tony Smithies to the Development Office this year. As the newly-appointed Deputy Director of Development, Tony has specific responsibility for fund-raising, old boys and the Parents' Association. His contribution will be significant and greatly appreciated. I thank continuing members of the Development Office – Mrs Pam Daly, Mr Don Camm, Mrs Louise Young and Mr John Ancher – for their enormous contribution to the work done in this busy part of the school. In the early part of the year Mrs Ann Reimer was again of great assistance and I extend thanks to her.

The Hutchins Art Prize

With entries from all corners of Australia, and from artists who regularly exhibit internationally, the Hutchins Art Prize (now in its seventh year) is an important marketing and international link. The Art Prize organising committee, under Chairman John Ancher, arranged a splendid exhibition which was visited by over 1500 people during its two-week opening. The winning entry – Celtic Tool Tiger – by Victorian artist Daniel Moynihan, is sure to attract controversial comments when it is displayed. The new Governor of Tasmania, Dr Richard Butler, has accepted the invitation of the committee to be Patron of the prize.

Old Boys

New archival displays and arrangements for the old boys' reunion dinners locally and interstate (2004) have kept John Ancher and Tony Smithies busy during the year. The links to the school's old boys world-wide are of great importance.

I thank all Foundation Committee members and Directors for their work during the year.

There are near-life experiences, moments of transformation, and we also have our own "living dead," as in the cartoon! They include staff caught up with writing reports, those who admit to watching Big Brother, and the lad who vacantly chews gum in Chapel.

Cursillo

A wonderful transforming and near-life experience for me this year was attending a Cursillo weekend. Men from Anglican parishes went away to be "reconnected" and blessed. There were many unexpected moments of grace, and I recommend the Cursillo course to all parents. To you who have done it, I say, "De Colores!"

Inspired by this course, I asked the Year 4s to become "agents of God's grace", and they sent anonymous notes and gifts and written blessings to some boys in other classes. That was good and life-giving.

The living dead occupy a tragic space! We all have our moments of sitting in this space from time to time! Sadly this year there have been cases of real tragedy that have shocked and saddened our community. There have been the unexpected deaths of grandparents, parents, staff and old boys, including Nick Smithies and Ray Stacey.

These times of sadness brought together a community. At present there are other Hutchins families carrying the burden of ongoing illness, and for them we have been, and are still, praying for God's healing.

We pray because we are people of faith and hope, and we believe in the presence among us of Jesus who wants us to be transformed into his likeness.

Near Life

At Hutchins there are many near-life experiences. This is an "alive" place!

There have been near-life experiences in our worship this year. There were boys baptized and confirmed. The ELC boys' were typically effervescent. If you want to see people fully alive, come to one of their services! (But don't blame me for the theology they take home – certainly not after one boy in Kinder told my wife that she was married to God!)

There were times of enthusiasm and humour, some unrehearsed and zany religious scripts, and some sparkling student reflections and prayers. There were "peak" times when singing was inspired, listening intent, and silence prayerful.

The Glory of God

I have witnessed the glory of God in people fully alive in plays, at Southport, on the coast with the bike-riders, and in enthusiastic participation in sport. I have come close to the truckload of daffodils when I have witnessed respect for others, generosity of spirit, and such determined and sacrificial service that led boys and staff, mainly from Stephens' House, to take part in the all-night Cancer Council's Run for Life on the Domain.

We are working to bring the Chapel more "fully alive". A group of boys and I are making leadlight windows to add colour and sparkle. De Colores!

I hope that our school will be a community of faith, "fully human and fully alive", marked by hope, fun, and the glory of God. Lookout for the truckload of daffodils!

2003 SRC Report

The main aims of the Student Representative Council for 2003 were to improve general welfare and support for students and to provide services to both the school and the broader community. These important goals for our council were reflected in the events and services that we offered. As well as running many events and programs for students, our council raised money from fundraisers, plain-clothes days, BBQs and other school events. This money was either donated to charities or used to financially support Hutchins students representing the school, state or nation in a chosen field.

The 2003 SRC was quite different from that which existed in previous years. The structure of the council was changed so that there is only one executive, and within this executive there are five portfolios. The new structure was able to better balance responsibilities between the different portfolios and between individuals. In this way, we were able to better focus our efforts and ensure that all activities were done well.

General Secretary

The General Secretary for 2003 was Jared Sheppard. Jared had the role of recording and publicising the minutes of each meeting. He also had the huge task of organising the 40 Hour Famine for World Vision, which raised nearly three thousand dollars.

Sports and Activities

Ronan Fenton and Josh Phillips were responsible for organising and running activities for the Senior School, which included Indoor Soccer, 3-on-3 Basketball, Torporama and Indoor Hockey. They also implemented a system of sports gear lending for lunch and recess times, which has been well supported and appreciated by the Senior School student body.

Environment

An Environment portfolio was introduced this year after hearing fantastic reports of the success of such a portfolio in other schools. Matthew Bowditch and Martin Mulcahy took an internal and external focus to their

portfolio. They organised "clean-ups" within the school, and promoted activities such as "Bushcare" Clean-ups in the school's neighbouring environment, Lambert Park. A recycling program for within the school has also been investigated. This is an ongoing project.

Student Enrichment

Sam Stove and Matt Graver were responsible for a variety of activities which supplemented the Senior School program. They provided support to students on the academic front by publishing the Study Tips handbook and by running Study Skills sessions for all Year 9 students. Sam and Matt updated and published a brochure displaying the Clubs and Societies available to students. They also ran a chess competition, and were responsible for the promotion of Dancing Classes for Year 12s in their preparation for end of year formals.

Socials

Simon Linardi and Dylan Viney were responsible for the fantastic running of each of the Hutchins Socials for this year. This included promotion of the events, the conduct of competitions for ticket design, and supervision of these socials.

Community and School Service

David Creak and Richard Gard were responsible for the organisation of fundraising events such as "Shave for a Cure", the selling of "Wuppies", the annual School Raffle and a Senior School fundraiser called "The Big Event". Throughout the year we were able to give financial support to many organisations including the Leukaemia Foundation, Royal Guide Dogs, Children's Cancer Institute, Special Children's Christmas Party, World Vision and the Rotary Magic Show.

Many thanks to Ms Jodie Schafferius for her supervision, administration and guidance. Thanks also to all members for their hard work over the past year, which has helped the council improve the life of the school and of the broader community.

This year is the International Year of Fresh Water. In Tasmania we are extremely fortunate to be able to access fresh drinking water. However, we know that by the year 2005 as much as 2/3 of the world's population will be living in conditions of serious water shortage. Already 31 countries face water scarcity and more than a billion people lack adequate access to drinking water. It is easy for us all to take our access to water for granted. Just as it easy to take so many things for granted here at Hutchins.

A productive year!

Academically the boys have continued to achieve at a very high level. The various state and national testing programs confirm that the larger proportion of Hutchins boys are scoring well above what is expected of them at their current grade level. The breadth and range of activities is great and this year has been no exception. Along with the World of Trivia, Maths Olympiad, Eisteddfods, soirees, sport carnivals, assemblies, socials excursions, community projects, and performances there have been the myriad of extra curricular choices and full class programs. We have also introduced a Melbourne cricket trip, remodeled our outdoor education program and expanded our Learn to Swim Program – thus the boys have had a most productive year in and out of the classroom!

A school community is like a freshwater system. When it stands still it stagnates and is no longer a source of life or nourishment.

Certainly in the building arena Hutchins has not stood still but flourished. Over the past five years the school has built a new Early Learning Centre, a New Music Block, a new Centre for Excellence and an underpass. For the first time the boys were actively involved in the design process of our new playground and by the end of the holidays the remodeling and refurbishment of the Junior School should be completed.

We know that the success of any school rests not with the facilities or buildings but with the staff. Hutchins has an exceptionally high calibre of staff. Marc Horton Stephens, Lesley Salter and Nicole Bury have all received national excellence in teaching awards. Judy Smith also received a medal at the inaugural Tasmanian Quality Teaching Awards.

In the Junior School we are constantly trying to refine our vision to ensure that we are steering a course rather than being buffeted by the winds of political change. We have reviewed and updated our English curriculum and have focused intensely on literacy skills. Our Maths curriculum is currently going through the same process and we hope to have that finished by early next year. We are exploring the Essential Learnings and have decided to go ahead with the international model of the Primary Years program, but we will be able to tell you more about that next year. Our behaviour policy has been under intense scrutiny by staff and we are aligned with the best models in current practice. Our

School is not just about academic excellence. Of course we want to equip children with a sound educational grounding but we also want to nurture all facets of a child's development. We want to challenge them in a variety of contexts to assist them to discover their own unique pathways. There is an old parable that reminds us of this.

A Vietnamese peasant was carrying his two water buckets down to the river to fill them....

One of the buckets was rusty and full of holes. The bucket apologized to the peasant for not being shiny and strong like his counterpart particularly as he continually spilled most of his contents on the way back to the village. The peasant smiled and said "Haven't you noticed the beautiful flowers and vegetables alongside the path to the village on the side that I have carried you and look what you have produced, they wouldn't be there if it wasn't for you..."

Everyone has gifts and talents and something to offer.



school is a community of learners and our teachers are constantly learning and searching for ways to offer the best in education. To that end we have spent a lot of time reflecting on the hallmarks of quality teaching. We have developed a comprehensive appraisal system and have tightened up and improved our professional development plans.

Senior School

It is two centuries since the first European settlers arrived on the shores of the Derwent River. Now in 2003, key features have been:

- the growing number of international students joining our community
- the challenges arising from a broader multicultural mix
- staff taking up teaching appointments in Asia
- considerable growth in the school's overseas exchange program.

Previously, exchanges were largely restricted to University School, Ohio, USA. While maintaining this excellent exchange, links have now been forged with The Regent's School, Thailand and Chinese High School, Singapore. In 2004, this is likely to continue and encompass more schools across the region.

Staff and students deserve credit for the considerable effort invested to ensure both inclusion and connection for our new arrivals. In part, the growing number of international students can be attributed to globalization, but also to the school's encouragement.

Life around the campus has been very settled

The community has benefited considerably from a Year 12 cohort which has actively taken on board developing a greater coherence and connection with the school. Underpinning this has been the leadership of the Senior Prefect (Jack Madden), in particular his ability to be an effective bridge between students and staff. The organizational skills of the Second Prefect (Lewis Halliday) and the input of the Prefect body have also proved invaluable.

Within the school pastoral structure, the Houses have continued to provide opportunities for student growth in personal relationships, peer management and charity work (which raised in excess of \$9,000). In this diverse pastoral program, the Student Tribunal (Chairman: Ben Harvey) has been a vital and somewhat unique component, as has the SRC through its many activities.

Students in Years 9 and 10 have excelled

Jet Holloway (9) won an award in the Intermediate Section of the Australian Mathematics Competition while, at the state level, Hutchins boys achieved five of the sixteen awards in the Intermediate Section, including the top award in Year 9 (Jarrod Brelis). Teams in Years 9 & 10 also achieved placings in the UTas/Engineers Australia Spaghetti Bridge Competition. We acknowledge the combined efforts of the Mathematics staff for their mentoring.

In Science, Tom Leworthy achieved the highest mark at Year 10 in the state division of the Australian Schools Science Competition. Brett Williams (9) was one of three students who represented the state at the national Questacon Invention Convention. In modern languages, Tom Ryan won the Year 10 Poetry section of the Alliance Francaise Competition. In Business & Enterprise, the following boys won the state award for the group division of the CPA Australia Plan Your Own Enterprise Competition: Nathan Street, James Roach and Nick Slugocki (10).

In the craft area, Louis Balcombe (11) won an outstanding design award at the Tasmanian Wood Design Collection Exhibition. Nick Perndt (12) also produced an exceptional piece for external assessment in Art.

Cultural pursuits provide great pride and enjoyment

Students have participated with success in the Tasmanian Music Industry Association Rock Challenge. Others have met with major success in City of Hobart Eisteddfod competitions in vocal and instrumental divisions, notably the Hutchins String Quartet, with Ramanan Daniel on piano. Others have participated in the UTas Conservatorium of Music's Gospel Choir. This year has also seen Jacob Cook performing in community production 'Oklahoma' and Alex Morris in 'Jesus Christ Superstar'.

Drama department productions were a source of enormous enjoyment, including 'The Government Inspector', 'St James Infirmary' and 'Who Cares'. Sadly, due to widespread illness in the school at the time, House Drama could not be held. The Poetry & Prose Competition was again keenly contested by a large field of students, with Matthew Mulcahy (12) taking out the Senior Division and Andrew Hutchens (9) the Intermediate Division. In the field of public speaking, Harkiran Narulla was selected in the State Secondary Schools Debating Team.

Another major challenge was widespread illness late in the winter season. Leading the way were the:

- Sailing team (coach: Murray Jones) winning its second consecutive national title against very strong opposition. They represented Australia in September, again against a very powerful NZ team which successfully defended its title
- Rowing club's considerable success, including victory in the Head of the River by a youthful 1st VIII (coach: Russell Hookway)
- 1st XI Cricket team (coach: Mr Irons), following an outstanding (undefeated) season, secured back-to-back state premierships with a young side in a rain-marred drawn final
- Swimming team (coach: Mr Morris) maintained its dominance, convincingly

Stephens was Cock House, but congratulations to all Houses for the sportsmanship displayed and the pleasant atmosphere that so often prevailed.

- winning the state title again
- 1st XI Soccer team - deserving premiers in the Southern U18 competition (coach: Dale Itchins)
- 1st & 2nd IV tennis teams (coach: Mr Crofts) won their way into the state finals.
- First teams in Hockey, Rugby and Australian Rules made it to the preliminary-finals.
- In the case of Rugby, Hockey, Soccer, Water Polo and Cross Country, several boys were selected to represent the state in their respective codes.
- The indoor sports of Badminton and Table Tennis have also met with considerable success. They have been strengthened by the inclusion of skilled overseas boys.

Some notable individual achievements

- Joe Pemberton (12) produced personal best times in the Australian Short Course Swimming Championships - he has given outstanding service over many years.
- Andrew Bennett (11) was placed in the Australian National Junior Archery Championships.
- Douglas Copson represented Australia in the International Cadet World Championships.
- In Water Polo, following the national titles, Jesse O'Hara (10) was selected to join the AIS Youth Training Squad.
- In Orienteering, Lee Andrewartha (12) came fourth in the Australian Schools Championships and was a member of the winning relay team.
- And Matthew Wilson (11) won his age division in the state titles.
- Dane Johnson was selected in the Tasmanian Youth Rowing VIII.
- Edward Bouchier (9) has again met with considerable success at state level in tennis.
- Finally, congratulations are extended to recipients of Honour Badges, namely Jack Madden (6 caps), Jonathon Cook, Piers Symons and Matthew Mulcahy.



Principal's Assemblies were memorable

Presentations on trips to Asia and the USA were warmly appreciated, as were some fine musical performances. This was the setting for Jack Madden's unforgettable speech early in Term 3 on behalf of Year 12: it was very clear from the applause, that he captured and eloquently presented the challenges confronting them in a year of necessary but unwelcome change, and how best for them to respond.

Awards Assembly was memorable for guest speaker William Hamlyn-Harris, who was met by thunderous applause, so appreciative were the boys of his words. Finally, commitment to the wider community has again reflected well on the student body - for example, the extent of support for the Royal Hobart Show Animal Nursery; and the annual Mariners' Service at St Georges, Battery Point.

In conclusion, I thank all students who have responded to the opportunities and contributed so positively to the life of the school. Staff too deserve special thanks for their dedication, guidance and support of the students in their care.

As a staff, Hutchins has spent dedicated time this year looking at the model of Essential Learnings as a way to organize its curriculum. Various areas of the school have successfully used it, enabling the boys to acquire the relevant knowledge, skills and dispositions. As we plan for the next three years we continue to hold the Essential Learnings framework firmly in mind while we concentrate on Reflective Practice, Curriculum Review and Internationalising.

Reflective Practice denotes the professional responsibility teachers have to reflect on their teaching, learning, and the subsequent actions they take as a result.

Curriculum Review allows teachers to audit present day curricula in light of current thinking, then design and implement relevant and engaging programs.

Internationalising is about encouraging the growth of a global citizen whose characteristics include tolerance, respect and the ability to firmly grasp the strength of diversity.

Such a focus is strongly represented in the philosophies being employed in the:

- Early Learning Centre with **Reggio Emilia** (an early childhood philosophy originating in Northern Italy) where the focus is on supporting the child's learning through strong community involvement, and
- **Junior School and ELC Primary Years Program** (the primary program from the International Baccalaureate).

Teachers and learners alike – we look forward to invigorating times ahead!

Curriculum Visionary

Information & Communications Technology (ICT) planning and online learning

The school continues to be challenged by the need to be flexible and respond appropriately to the impact of the new learning technologies. The information technology network infrastructure has to support students' online learning beyond the formal curriculum.

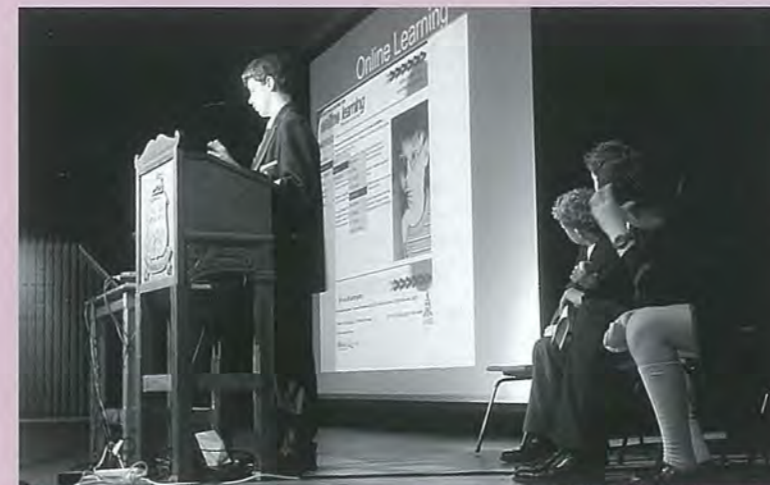
Internet, email, online chat, and mobile phone SMS amongst the students have become important and personalised forms of social interaction in the school day. In addition to our goal that students leave school as confident, creative and productive users of all new technologies, we recognise that students need to become global citizens, using these technological tools in morally and ethically acceptable ways.

In reviewing the school's ICT planning, a strategic alliance with Acer Computers Australia continues to provide value-added service and support. By early 2004, all the school's computer labs will provide Acer desktops with Windows 2003 and Office XP. Outsourced Internet filtering and bandwidth management services from GetBusi were installed successfully prior to a move to faster broadband connections in 2004. Continuing importance is given to the HUTnet Intranet, email and Masterfile access

Our aim has been to enable the school's curriculum resources to be delivered 'anywhere, anytime' – ie 24 hours x 7 days; to the students at home, to the wider Hutchins community, and to provide remote access to some report and assessment services for teaching staff.....

from home or school, online forums and the online course materials in our Centre for Online Learning site, and the ICDL (International Computer Drivers Licence) courseware for recognising students' IT competencies. The Centre for Online Learning is a dynamic website developed in-house by Mr Ian MacRae, the IT Manager, to meet the information and course needs of teachers.

WebMaster Kent Moore has undertaken to provide an interactive external website to be launched in Anniversary Week 2004. It will feature virtual tours, and a digital prospectus available on CD-ROM which may be constantly updated from the website.

Community Service

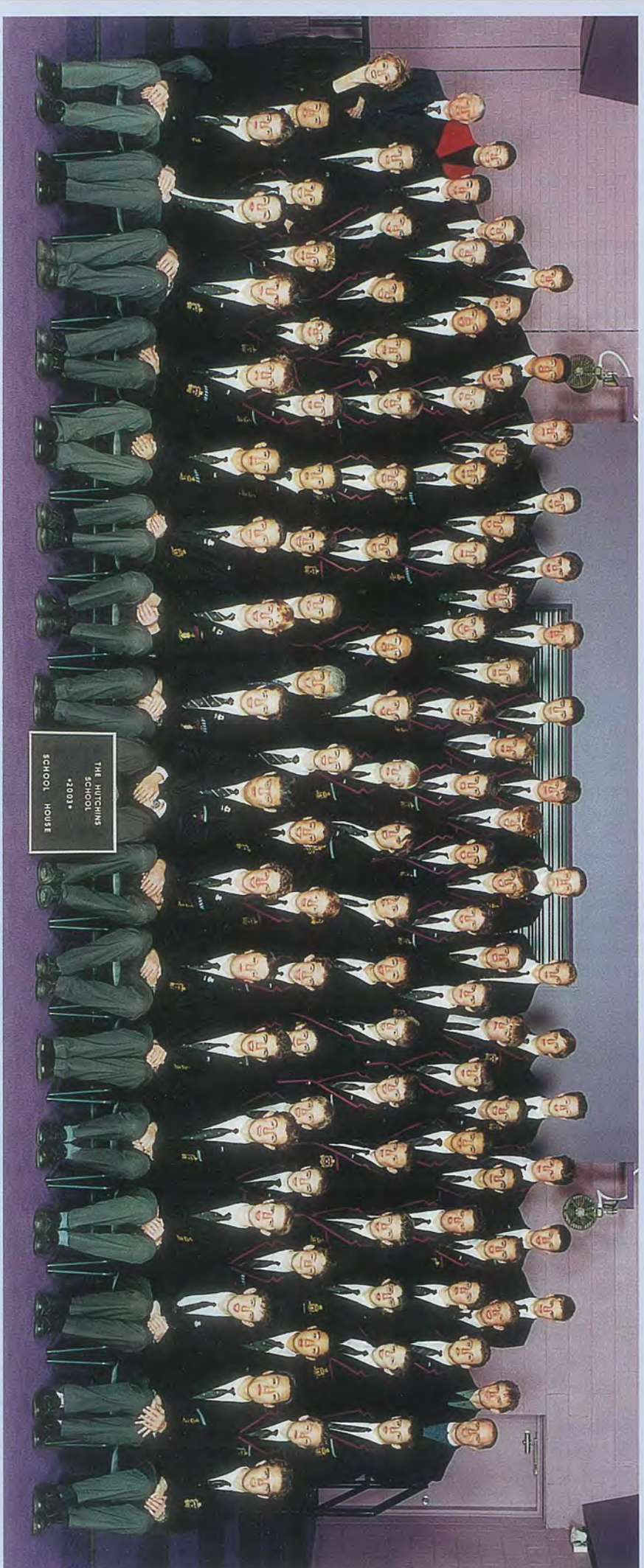

This exercise is part of life and there are five pillars that support human life: spiritual, mental, physical, cultural and social. Using this position, Stephens House was restructured into five portfolios with a House Prefect responsible for each. All activities and areas of the House were organised into these portfolios. The House Prefect usually took an area within each and then assembled a team of other members of the House to look after each activity. This system seemed to work well with only minor teething problems.

Participation is very important for members of Stephens. The next logical step was to structure the House Colours to reflect the five pillars and also give due recognition to participation. Now in order to gain House Colours, students must show participation across all five pillars. With recognition being given to taking part in House assemblies or contributing to the House website, it was felt that House Colours should be obtainable by the end of Year 10. Once a student had obtained their Colour braid they then could work towards obtaining a second level by continued participation through Years 11 & 12.

I have felt for some time that Stephens House should adopt a floral emblem. After much discussion within the House it was decided to adopt a local native plant that produces a massive yellow floral display in spring and summer. The Golden Guinea was chosen - a genus of Hibbertia.

The Guinea became the symbol for the second tier of House Colours and a badge was fashioned. I would like to thank John Ancher (School Archivist) for his design, Kent Moore (Graphic Design) for his development of the design on computer and Peter Symons for his production of the badge. Nine boys managed to achieve a standard to be awarded a Guinea in its inaugural year.

To recognise those students who go well beyond what is expected by their service, participation and perseverance, a third level was developed. This is the House Lion. Students who achieve this award are exceptional in their commitment to the House. The standard was set appropriately high. As a measure of the exceptional Year 12 group in Steves this year, five students gained their Lion. I congratulate them and thank them for their service.

As a lion has its pride, so does Stephens. This year all the School Honour Badge recipients were in Stephens House and they also won House Lions. It has been a good year when this is added to Cock House. I would like to thank Jon Cook, and all the leaders and tutors for a fabulous year.

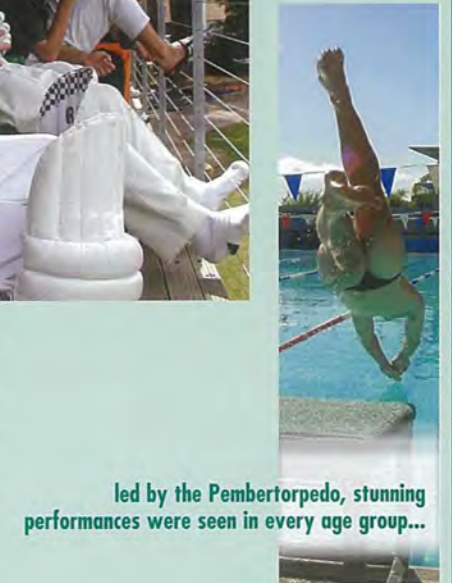

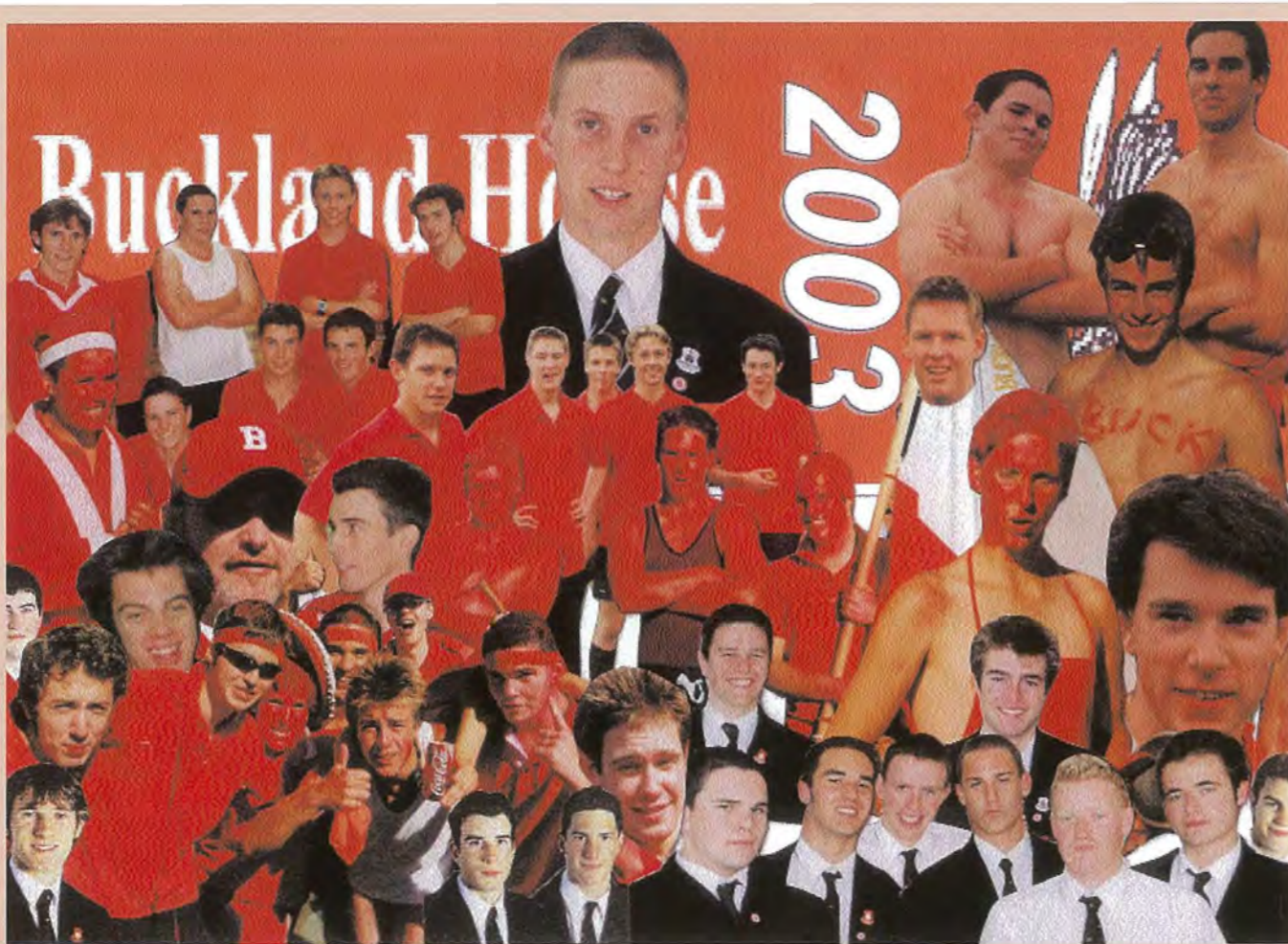

English as a Second Language (ESL)

The International Student Club has grown from 12 students in 1999 to 75 in 2003. Students from both Collegiate and Hutchins attend classes from Years 7-12. This year, as part of an assessed task, small groups of pre-tertiary students organized activities so that the students from South East Asia and Germany were able to experience Australian culture first hand.

The highlight of the year was a Halloween party - whilst this is not Australian culture it was a chance for the students to really put their planning and organizing skills to test. My final task for the award was being put in charge of organising the Fahan Year 9 camp, under the watchful eye of Mr Jeff Thomas, their Outdoor Education Teacher and all round nice bloke. I had to work out the budget, location, staffing and other logistics of the camp. This was a huge challenge above and beyond the requirements of the award, but it was an amazing experience from which I learnt so much.

The Duke of Edinburgh Award scheme has given me the chance to learn new things, meet some amazing people, and make friends for life. I have experienced parts of Tasmania that some people will never see. And now, thanks to the people who were completing their award and got me started, I can pass on my experience and show people this amazing place.

Under 14s

Coach: **Mick Arnold**

VET: Maritime Studies

This year Hutchins ran the second of its Maritime Studies courses with sixteen students from Years 11 & 12, of whom three were from St Michael's Collegiate School. This was a large class to manage when one considers the amount of practical work expected of the group, but they were equal to the task.

The class follows one of the Australian Maritime College's programs and gives certification under the title of the Coxswain's course. It is a bi-annual program and represents a considerable time commitment; it is not for the faint-hearted. The next class will run in 2005.

This class does not do the usual things the average class covers in school. It helps enormously to be a keen sailor, and passionate about the sea or boating. Large portions of class time are spent learning theory about how inboard and outboard engines work, how to check them for serviceability, change the oils and filters, trouble-shoot problems, refuel safely and adhere to environmental protection procedures. Students get practical experience with pumps, fire-fighting gear, safety equipment such as life-rings, EPIRBs, flares, rafts and buoyancy aids as well as expert instruction on how to find and rescue a person overboard, how to tow a stricken vessel, and what to do in a range of emergency situations at sea or on the mooring.

Navigation skills and voyage planning feature, as well as log-keeping, conflict resolving and crew safety, and health management skills ranging from following typical deck protocols to food preparation suggestions. The acquisition of qualifications in Radio transmission and Radiotelephony are part of the course, as well as Workplace First Aid and a small boat licence.

Part of the practical work is done in the north at the College's specialist facilities. The fire-fighting is done in specially constructed buildings simulating a ship's deck, houses and holds – where the intricacies of coping with black fires and backdraught firestorms are learned, working the big hoses in teams, upon which your lives depend. Then there is learning to cope with abandoning your vessel in a storm, releasing the liferaft, jumping into the waves in lashing rain and darkness, and finding your way into the raft. That's where the work really begins!

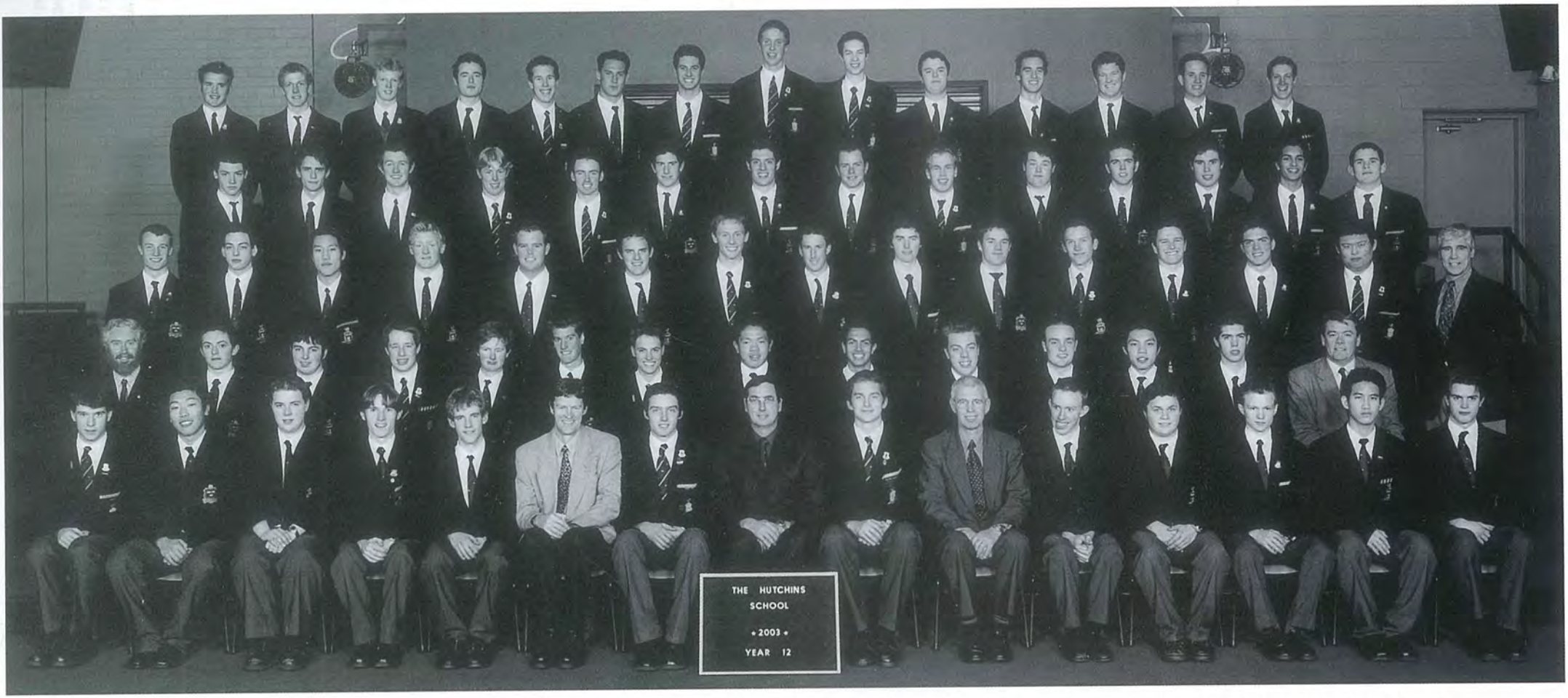
